Foard County A. S. C. Office Releases Information on Foard County Soil Bank

The Soil Bank is now getting underway in Foard County, according to Ray Hysinger, chairman of the Foard County ASC Committee, as a part of the national farm program.

Even if farmers have already planted 1956 crops, Mr. Hysinger says they can make adjustments and earn Soil Bank payments this year.

The Soil Bank was enacted to check the build-up of excessive farm supplies which are today depressing farm prices and overflowing storage. By encouraging needed production adjustments, the Soil Bank provides a means of reducing stocks to manageable levels, while protecting farm income and conserving the nation's soil and water resources.

The Soil Bank has two parts: 1. The Acreage Reserve — to reduce surpluses of wheat, corn, cotton, peanuts, rice and tobacco by adjusting acreages below established "allotments" and the "Soil Bank corn base acreage."

In 1956, this reduction may be accomplished by underplanting, by loss through natural destruction, or by plowing or cutting the crop before the deadline.

2. The Conservation Reserve — to cut back excess production of crops in general by shifting acreage to long-range conservation uses.

Farmers taking part in the program will designate (in agreements or contracts with the U. S. Department of Agriculture) the specific acreage to be included in the Acreage Reserve, the Conservation Reserve, or both. The same acreage, however, may not be designated under both parts of the program. Acreage Reserve agreements must be signed by the farmer not later than July 20, 1956.

The Soil Bank does not supplement any other national farm program, such as acreage allotments, price supports, or the Agricultural Conservation Program. These programs still continue.

Seal Coat Being Applied to Roads in Foard County

Work began in Foard County last Wednesday of applying a seal coat to Highway 283 from the Knox County line on the south to the Hardeman County line on the north.

Strain Bros. of San Angelo was awarded the contract for applying the seal coat to the north-south highway, and also for Farm Road 263 (the Foard City road) and Farm Road 98 (the Margaret road).

The seal coat will be applied to a width of 48 feet from one block south of the square north to the Catholic Church.

Vance Favor, district highway foreman of Quanah, stated Monday that a much heavier grade of rock is being used in the seal coat. The Texas Highway Department, after an exhaustive study, has found that the larger rocks help prevent the road from getting as slick as was the case when smaller rocks were used.

Mr. Favor also stated that the gravel spreader being used by Strain Bros. is the only one of its kind in the state. He stated that it is a new type spreader and has proven very satisfactory wherever it has been used.

farmer may earn payments by: 1. Underplanting his allotment for cotton and certifying that he underplanted either in anticipation of complying with the 1956 Acreage Reserve, or because of adverse weather conditions; or

2. Not exceeding his farm allotment for cotton, and not harvesting an acreage of the crop because of destruction by natural causes; or

3. Plowing or otherwise incorporating into the soil, or clipping, mowing, or cutting an acreage of cotton within the allotment after May 27, and before July 31, which is the final acreage reserve disposal date.

Maximum and Minimum Acreages

For cotton, the maximum acreage which a farmer may place in the Acreage Reserve is half the farm allotment or 10 acres, whichever is larger, except that the "reserved" acreage may not exceed the allotment.

The minimum acreage of cotton which may be placed in the Acreage Reserve is 10 per cent of the allotment or 2 acres, whichever is larger, except that if the allotment is less than 2 acres, the minimum is the allotment.

Payments

Payments which a farmer may earn for participating in the Acreage Reserve will be based on a rate of 15 cents per pound.

For underplanting the cotton allotment, the payment rate will be based on the normal yield for the designated acreage.

For destruction due to natural causes, the payment will be based on the smaller of an appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm, but not less than \$6.00 per acre.

For plowing, or otherwise physically incorporating the cotton crop into the soil, or for clipping, mowing, or cutting the cotton crop, the payment will be based on the smaller of an appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm, but will not be less than \$6.00 per acre.

What Soil Bank Acreage Reserve Specific Qualifications: Any

farmer may earn payments by: 1. Underplanting his allotment and certifying that the underplanting was due to anticipation of the 1956 Acreage Reserve for wheat; or because of adverse weather conditions the payment will be based on the normal yield for the designated acreage. The rate of payment is \$1.20 per bushel.

2. If the wheat is planted for harvest in 1956 and the acreage seeded in the fall of 1955 was less than the farm allotment and the farmer certifies that the underplanting was because of adverse weather conditions the payment rate is \$4.00 per acre.

3. If the compliance with the Acreage Reserve occurred from destruction by natural causes (such as drought, flood, hail) the payment rate is based on the smaller of the appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm but not less than \$6.00 per acre.

4. If the compliance with the acreage reserve is by plowing or otherwise physically incorporating the crop into the soil, or by clipping, mowing, or cutting the wheat crop, the payment will be based on the smaller of an appraised yield for the field or the normal yield for the farm, but not less than \$6.00 per acre.

Maximum and Minimum Acreages

The greatest number of acres which can be placed in the Acreage Reserve for wheat is the larger of half the acreage allotment or 50 acres. (If the farm wheat allotment is 45 acres, the entire 45 may be placed in the Acreage Reserve). In all cases, if the farm allotment is less than 50 acres the allotment becomes the maximum.

Precinct No. 4, which has been in county attorney's office in the court house, will be moved to Borchardt Chevrolet Co. display room.

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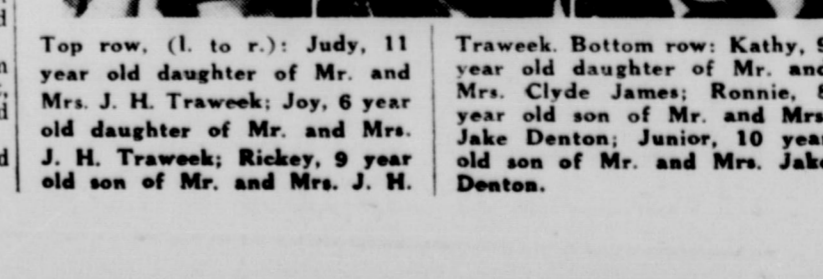

State Capitol NEWS

Austin, Tex. — Politicians are waving their banners. Party leaders seek to rally their cohorts. But right now Texans are far more concerned about water.

Farm and city dwellers alike are hard hit. Years of drought have added up. Sizzling summer temperatures, unabated since the last of May, have finished off crop prospects for 1956 in many areas.

Few expect relief before the end of summer. Most despair some time ago of rains that would "really break" the drought.

In Austin and elsewhere attention focused on the often-bitter scrambles for dwindling streamflows. Prolonged and frequently heated testimony has been heard by the State Board of Water Engineers on water rights from the proposed Canyon Dam in South Central Texas.

San Antonio sought permission to take 100,000 acre feet of water annually from the dam. It is the only way, said San Antonio officials, that the city can meet its future water needs.

Guadalupe Blanco River Authority strenuously opposed the request. Joined by citizens of some

20 small towns in the area GBRA contended that the city allocation would not leave enough for downstream users, nor enough to operate a hydro-electric plant.

Testimony is expected to continue for several weeks. Ultimate decision probably will set a precedent for future controversies.

Farther South, the Rio Grande reached its lowest point since it stopped flowing completely in 1953. Falcon Dam was shut down, and a watermaster was appointed to ration the dwindling supply among Valley cities.

Legislators making up the state water resources committee came out with an idea for the future. They proposed a \$100,000,000 Texas Water Development Fund. Controversy over whether to finance water conservation by an ad-valorem or water-use tax defeated the program last session.

This new approach of financing through bonds would by-pass the difficulty, said proponents. But it would take a long time. First, legislative action; then a constitutional amendment by the people.

Meanwhile farmers are leaving their parched fields and looking for work in town to support their families.

LABOR UNIONS ARE ACTIVE

Members of Texas' labor unions are working hard to place Liberals in control of state and party offices. And, a politically confident vote prevailed among some 1,000 delegates at the State Federation of Labor convention, here.

Union labor leaders, who played a mighty important part in ousting the conservatives from control of the Democratic party, have openly announced that they will campaign to: 1. Elect Ralph Yarborough governor; 2. Elect

legislators friendly to labor; 3. Defeat Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey; 4. Gain control of the state Democratic convention in September; and 5. Elect Liberals to the State Democratic Executive Committee.

NEW HIGHWAY POLICY

An important new step in state policy has been announced by the Texas Highway Commission, for administering the new Federal highway aid program.

If and when the state provides it more money, the commission will begin to assume part of the heavy cost of right-of-way—now borne wholly by cities and counties. This for highways of the primary state system not included in the new federal interstate system.

CAPITOL AREA TO BE DOUBLED

Plans for a vastly expanded, 25-square-block Capitol area have been unveiled by the State Building Commission.

Originally the commission had outlined plans for extending the grounds northward two full blocks to 15th street. This would provide space for the new office building and state courts building, due to be started sometime next fall.

In adopting the official Capitol master plan, the commission designated future Capitol area all the way to 19th street and pinpointed locations of two more future office buildings.
