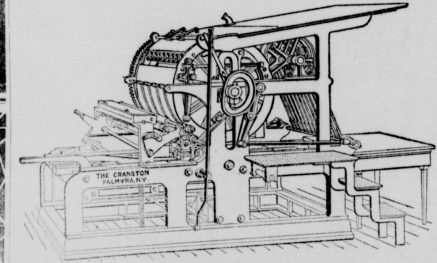

At last we have our big press installed of which we have been telling our readers for a few weeks. It is no small job to install a press such as the News now has. Almost every minute of last week and a portion of this was consumed in this work, but a visit to this shop will convince you that we have a piece of machinery of which any shop might be proud. The press is foot all day and kick the job press, and if our first experience with a gasoline engine is not so worrisome as that we expect the physical labor to be decreased and the work in general to be more pleasant as well as the speed increased rapidly within the last few months, so much that our press work with the old hand press entirely too great. One who has operated a George Washington hand press alone knows what it means to make 1200 impressions a week with it and with a small force keep up the other work. The printer alone knows too what it means to stand on one foot all day and kick the job press, and if our first experience with a gasoline engine is not so worrisome as that we expect the physical labor to be decreased and the work in general to be more pleasant as well as the speed increased

Therefore, to wit, that said special commissioners will convene in the office of the County Judge of Foard county, Texas, at the court house in the town of Crowell, in said county, at 2 o'clock P. M., November 20, A. D. 1908, when and where they will proceed to the condemnation of said lot as provided by law.

## CROP YIELD FOUND TO BE

AT LEAST \$200 PER ACRE

Farming in West Texas for years questioned as a safe and reliable pursuit, but while that industry is settled now as one peculiarly belonging to West Texas, it is not everyone who is ready to admit that a large list of products can be successfully grown here. There are people that have to be shown, and this is being done every year. It used to be said by doubtful ones that sweet potatoes would not be grown in this country, while recent years are proving it to be the best production in the State. Farmers are learning how to grow corn. It was once thought that this section did not belong to the cotton belt, while at this time it is leading the State in this one product. And only in recent years has it been acknowledged that fruit and vegetables do as well here as anywhere. But in this connection we wish to call the attention of our readers to the proof with which only one product of the soil can be grown—that of sweet potatoes.

R. T. Williamson, living in the Margaret community, came to town one day last week and brought with him some very fine potatoes, which would weigh from four to six pounds each. He had something like a quarter of an acre in potatoes and had gathered enough of them to test the yield and found it to be about 200 bushels per acre. These will easily sell for \$1 per bushel, which means a realization of \$200 to the acre. This is putting the price at its lowest. Ordinarily they sell for more than \$1.00.

It has been only a few years ago since people commenced to grow potatoes because they thought they could not be grown. All the potatoes we ate were shipped into this country.

Mr. Williamson is convinced that the sweet potato crop is far ahead of either cotton or wheat as a money making crop, and so it is, when the yield is good. It may be that this crop is not as certain of a yield every year as cotton or wheat, and in that alone would lie the risk of making them an exclusive crop.

There are many excellent products that can be profitably grown here and that is why the farmer ought to diversify. It is not advisable that every farmer turn his whole farm into a potato patch, as for that, but he should plant a little of many products for home consumption which would greatly help to lighten the expenses of a living through the run of the year.

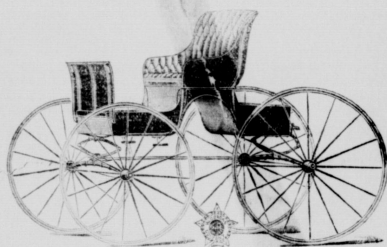
