County Pros Meet

Last Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock representative men from over the county met in the district court room to perfect an organization of the prohibition forces of the county.

T. L. Hughston was chosen temporary chairman. E. W. Muse, secretary. The following officers were elected: Dr. Woods, president; T. L. Hughston, vice-president; E. W. Muse, secretary-treasurer.

The following executive committee was appointed: H. Hunt, Margaret, Texas; W. R. Tuttle, Black; W. G. Chapman, Thalia, Texas; J. B. Fox, Foard City, Texas; Dr. R. L. Kincaid, Crowell, Texas; Lee Thomas, Good Creek; Orville Patton, Vivian, Texas; and Dr. Germain, Rayland, Texas.

The secretary was instructed to write the state chairman of the prohibitionists, Hon. T. H. Ball, Houston, Texas, that an organization had been perfected

in Foard County and to ask him for the information necessary for the campaign.

It was announced by the chairman that on the 8th of April at 2 p. m. the executive committee will have another meeting and that all interested in the prohibition cause are invited to come and co-operate in the work. Bro. Eldridge, Bro. Walker, Dr. Kincaid, Bro. Willhoit, Bro. Billington and Bro. Hamilton made interesting talks on prohibition, and the present outlook of the cause in Texas.

It was moved and carried that the record of the proceedings of this meeting be published. After which the meeting adjourned to meet again April 8th, 1911. E. W. MUSE, Sec.

Dollars vs. Morality

It has been often said that the United States Senate is the most exalted deliberative body in the world. We like to think of it as such. But no one acquainted with the currents of

events can fail to recognize the disquieting fact that for years there has been a steady downgrade movement in the Senate in point of ideals and political morals. The drift has been steadily away from the simplicity of the pure democracy toward plutocracy. Men are there without the least known qualifications for the exalted places. They are there because they are rich and have been able to trade and traffic their way by political hook and crook to a seat under the lofty dome of the capitol. And they are there largely as the representatives. No recent occurrence will more surely work to undermine the confidence of the people in the Senate than the triumph of Senator Lorimer of Illinois in keeping his seat after it was proven beyond doubt or dispute that money was used to buy votes for his election. The Baptist Standard.

The worst part of the whole business is not that a bribery-

stained man may have been seated among other Senators of the United States by their own insistence; that is bad enough, in all conscience, but it is worse that such an example has been held up to the rising generation and offered to their view as a standard of morality which the United States Senate has set for itself by a majority vote. If this Republic is to endure as a government of the people, for the people the power of money must be kept subservient to the power of morality. And yet it can not be done always if money is allowed to usurp first place in the esteem of those to whom has been given the honor of guiding the Nation's policies.—Dallas News.

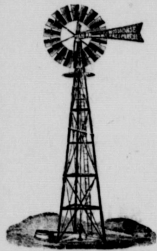

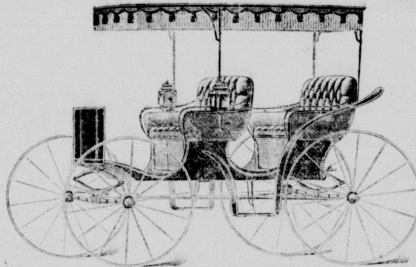

The Legislature Adjourned

The Texas legislature has adjourned after handing the people the following new laws as enumerated below.

GENERAL BILLS APPROVED

The following general bills have been passed by the legislature, approved by the governor and have or will become laws:

Exempting mutual corporations formed under the United States reclamation act for the purpose of irrigation in arid regions from the payment of franchise taxes and charter fees.

Allowing railroad corporations two years additional time in which to meet the provisions of their charters with regard to the completion of their proposed lines.

The wolf scalp bill. This becomes effective September 1, 1912.

Appropriating \$6,074 as deficiency for the department of public buildings and grounds.

Amended safety appliance act. Allowing 25 per cent of the qualified voters of any city or town to demand a primary or convention for the purpose of naming party tickets for city elections.

Prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in disorderly houses.

Appropriating \$10,000 for the erection of a monument over the grave of Stephen F. Austin at the State cemetery at Austin.

Increasing the membership of the governor's personal staff from nine to twelve members.

Appropriating \$2,000 for a monument over the grave of Mrs. Elizabeth Crockett, wife of David Crockett at Acton, Hood county.

Providing for the establishment of rural high schools over the State and appropriating \$50,000 for State aid.

Allowing district judges and district attorneys having more than one county in their districts \$200 a year for traveling expenses.

Appropriating \$50,000 for the construction of a boys' dormitory at the State orphans' home at Corsicana, the dormitory having been recently destroyed by fire.

Appropriating \$8,000 for repairs and deficiencies at the North Texas insane asylum at Terrell.

The sheep scab bill.

Authorizing the Texas Traction company to purchase the Denison and Sherman Interurban railway company.

Requiring cotton ginner to mark upon each bale of cotton the exact amount of bagging and ties.

Establishing Confederate women's home and making appropriations of \$20,000. The new law makes effective the constitutional amendment recently adopted.

Making Columbus Day, October 12, a legal holiday.

Creating Culberson county.

Creating Brooks county.

Creating Jim Wells county.

Removing the headquarters of the fish and oyster commissioner from the coast to Austin.

Amending the law with reference to the issuance of marriage licenses.

Parole law.

Suspended sentence law.

Granting Bexar county a new district court.

GENERAL BILLS THAT PASSED

The following general bills passed both houses of the legislature and with the approval of the governor will become laws; some of them have been disappeared:

Reducing the number of State depositories from thirty-one to sixteen, one for each congressional district; providing that State depositories shall deposit not less than \$20,000 in securities and as much above as they hold State funds; changing the old law so that remittances come direct to the State treasury and are sent from there to the de-

positories instead of having the remittances come to the treasury through depositories.

Providing that a suit for rent within the jurisdiction of the justice court may be joined by action for forcible entry and detainer.

Providing for suspended sentences in certain criminal cases. Raising the age limit for child labor and placing upon the statute a more drastic child labor law.

Providing the scholastic age shall be 7 to 20 years instead of 7 to 17. Vetoed.

Allowing corporations whose charters and permits have been forfeited for non-payment of franchise taxes to reinstate themselves not later than September 1, 1911, by payment of proper penalty.

Limiting the amount of wharfage front that any person, firm or corporation may acquire on Harbor island to 2,000 feet.

Allowing county commissioners to call an election for the purpose of issuing bonds for the establishment and maintenance of county poor houses and poor farms.

Requiring inspection of air brakes and attachments.

Reducing taxes on circuses.

Appropriating \$25,000 for the use of the attorney general in enforcing the law. Vetoed.

Allowing more compensation to sheriffs for feeding prisoners.

Authorizing commissioner of agriculture to employ an engineer.

Regulating the practice of veterinary surgery.

Creating State drainage board, appropriating \$60,000 therefor.

Establishing a tuberculosis sanitarium.

Amending the law creating the bureau of labor.

Making appropriations for deficiencies in the cost of the maintenance of the government.

Defining and prohibiting pandering and the white slave traffic.

Providing for filing chains of transfer in general land office.

Validating certain sales of public school and asylum lands.

Eight-hour workman's law.

Amending the anti-free-pass law.

Describing proper electric wiring in mines.

Prohibiting feeding of live stock in mines.

Allowing incorporation of concerns for the picking and handling of cotton.

Abolishing the Galveston and Harris county criminal district court and establishing the criminal district court for Harris county.

Election bill. This provides that each side in an election on a constitutional amendment election may demand representation at the polls; farther that anyone may contest a constitutional amendment election, bringing the contest in Travis county.

Amarillo and El Paso appellate court bill.

Amending the jury wheel law so as to require the filing of the wheel annually instead of biennially.

Allowing militia companies to acquire armories and property at one time not to exceed in value \$200,000.

Bill permitting local branches of fraternal organizations to loan funds of order on personal security by filing bond.

Bill making appropriation for clerk in pension department.

Bill relating to advertising by physicians.

Enacting codified and annotated penal code and code of criminal procedure.

Enacting the codified civil statutes.

Appropriating \$25,000 for printing the annotated and codified penal code, code of criminal procedure and civil statutes.

Authorizing incorporation of casualty insurance companies.

Authorizing the widow and eight children of W. E. Collins, who was killed by a state ranger, to sue the state.

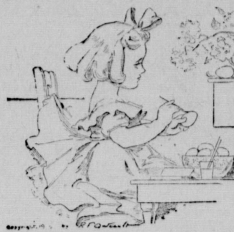

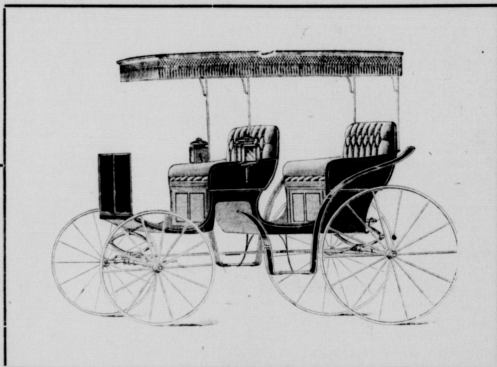
