## 2,650-BALE MARK PASSED BY GINS WEDNESDAY

First of Rush Season Reported by Gins This Week

There have been over 2,650 bales of cotton from the 1938 crop ginned in Foard County, according to figures obtained from the five gins in the county. Prior to Oct. of last year there had been about 2,560 bales ginned. Those figures show that the cotton turn out for this year and last are running evenly thus far.

Rush to Start

Gins in Crowell reported that more cotton had been ginned Wednesday than any other day this year and probably marked the sea-son's cotton rush. Yields are favorable and in some farmers have stated that their yields were heavier than expected. Ginners report that the staple is good considering the extended dry weather of the past few

weeks. The Thalia Farmers' Gin leads the county in number of bales ginned and it has experienced the season's rush during the past two days. The first of the rush is ex-pected at the Margaret gin about the first of next week and reports from Rayland are that cotton has been too green for gathering up until the last few days.

#### THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

Last Week in History

Congress met at Lancaster, Penn., September 28-Cabrillo disovered California when he entered the Bay of San Diego, 1542. First constitution of Pennsylvania adopted, 1776.

September 29 — Sir Walter Raleigh beheaded, 1618. American control of Cuba established,

For tea was the consuming interest of Thomas Lipton's life-from the day in 1889 when his first purchase of twenty thousand chests of tea arrived in Glasgow and the loads were drawn through the streets of that great Scottish city accompanied by brass bands and bag pipes, until the day 42 years later when the beloved old man passed away.

Up to the time of Lipton's entry into the tea business, most of the tea in the world came from China. The island of Ceylon was known as a great coffee-growing country. There was not a tea plant on the island. But in 1870, Ceylon was visited by a blight that snuffed out the life of every single coffee plant, and promised to spell economic disaster for

In the gloomy days that followed, young Thomas Lipton and some other adventurous souls thought: "Why not try to grow tea in this rich Ceylon soil and exceptionally gentle climate?" Tea plants were imported and cultivated with scientific care.

Making even a 4-thread stocking last that long is a problem for some girls. Frequent runs are the most mmon complaint.

#### Secret of longer wear

Two girls may start with the very same stockings, yet one will often get twice as long wear.

Here's an important factor: the way they're washed! Stockings should be washed in lukewarm Lux suds after each wearing.
