

THE PARK TRIP There is a continuous overflow from the Devil's Punch Bowl, which keeps its cone always in many colors. Only a short distance away and several feet lower, is Black Sand Pool, from which a small rivulet is always running. The flow from this was out over Specimen Lake, simply a large tract with fallen timber in a semipetrified condition, and anyone could walk over the lake without going over shoetop in water. In the overflow from Sunset Lake were as many and varied color tints as ever seen in the most beautiful clouds at sunset. Rainbow Pool and Emerald Pool were springs true to name and beautiful to look upon. Three Crater Spring is one fed from three sources, yet connected at surface by narrow channels. Bee Hive has a formation 4 feet high, 7 feet in diameter at base, tapering to 4 feet at top. It is a powerful geyser, from a small crater it sends the water 220 feet high.

The morning we left the Upper Basin there was a magnificent display of many geysers simultaneously. On our way south came Kepler Cascade, six connected falls with a total of 150 feet. They were in a deep and timbered canon. In a country like Texas such scenic beauty would draw people from every direction, but here we saw stage after stage pass without a halt, as these were tame in comparison with many other scenes. Lone Star Geyser has a tall and very simetrical formation in its cone, at top an opening 6x10 inches then a number of smaller ones lower down, from all of which the water spouts 50 feet when in action. We witnessed two exhibitions of its power at a time when the sun was right to reflect the rainbow tints from its spray. Up Spring Creek Canon was a lovely drive, the eanon winding and narrow with fantastic rocks and evergreen trees, also a crystal mountain stream near the

Where we crossed the Continental Divide were two lily covered ponds on doubtful ground between the two great oceans; Craig Pass and Isa

At West Thumb we are again on the shores of Lake Yellowstone, 7,741 feet above sea level, with an area of 239 square miles and a shore line of 100 miles, its greatest depth 300 feet with an average of 30 feet; its source of water supply, the Absaroka Range snows that keep its waters cold, while Hot Springs and paint pots were numerous on the shore at this point. 

We talked with parties that had visited them, also have a short history by one who had a geological knowledge. The Fossile Forests revealed by the great erosions in the valley of the Lamar River. Here has been traced the remains of nine distinct forests one on top of the other with a layer of volcanic rock between each, but heat not intense enough to consume them. Now in the words of one who speaks from scientific authority: "Beginning with the first or lowest, it is clear that conditions prevailed at that time which were highly favorable to vegetable growth, and that these continued long enough for giant trees to attain mature size. Finally this season of growth was rudely interrupted by the violent outburst of a volcanic eruption. Vast masses of ejected material overwhelmed and submerged the land. In the course of long ages since that time the percolation of siliceous waters has turned the organic forms into stone by the process of substitution, and has thus preserved a most of the agencies that destroyed it."

"Some of the petrifications are perfect. Roots, bark, parts showing incipient decay, worm holes, leaves all are preserved with absolute fidelity. The rings of annual growth may be counted, and these indicate for the larger trees an age of not less than five hundred years. Some of the stumps are fully ten feet in diame-
