Wildcats Beat Matador 14-12

The Crowell High School football team won its third victory of the season here last Friday night by defeating Matador 14-12. The Wildcats not only kept their record clean for the season, they broke the winning streak of the team that held the best record in the state, with 14 consecutive wins. Of course, the Bulldogs have been playing most of their games in class B competition, but they have a very potent team.

The Matador boys looked the part in statistics just about every week except in the passing department. One pass that their quarterback, Charles Ezzell, threw was the only one that counted, as Ezzell's left half, Larry Henry, intercepted on the Matador forty-yard line and ran it back to the five to set up Crowell's second touchdown. Another pass from Crowell's quarterback Dan Mike Bird to Henry was good for two points after the TD and spelled the difference in the contest.

The first quarter was scoreless, but it found the Matadors, led by their fine 205-pound fullback, Richard Campbell, picked up more first downs. The Wildcats were able to sustain this big, aggressive athlete until late in the second quarter. It was just three minutes and thirty seconds until halftime when Campbell broke through his left side of the line and scampered 70 yards to pay dirt. The extra point kick was no good to leave Crowell six points behind. Just one minute later, Crowell's fine quarterback, Dan Mike Bird, also broke through the left side of his line to travel 73 yards and place Crowell on the score board. The extra point run was no good to leave the halftime score tied at 6 and 6.

Matador's quarterback did something he shouldn't have early in the second half. On their second series of plays in the third quarter, they tried their only pass of the evening. It backfired as Crowell's linemen pressed the quarterback and caused him to throw short and Larry Henry, Crowell's alert left halfback, intercepted on the Matador forty and ran it to the five. One try at the line cost Crowell two yards, but on the second try, quarterback Bird dashed off his left tackle to score his second TD of the game. The pass that Bird threw to Henry for the two extra points proved eventually to be the winning margin.

The Matador boys came roaring back to drive 70 yards for their second touchdown. They picked up five consecutive first downs to make this score. Quarterback Ezzell plunged the final one yard. However, on his try for the extra two points that would have knotted the score, was no good. He elected to run around his own right end, but Crowell's end, Mike Shrode forced him out of bounds about one foot short of the goal line. This left the final score 14 to 12 in Crowell's favor. Neither team threatened to score after this last touchdown.

Crowell's linemen were smaller and really had a hard time nosing out this excellent ball club. There was some good defensive work on both sides. Fullback Richard Campbell had some other 200-pound Matador boys in the lineup to help him on defense. They did a real job of it, too. Crowell was able to make only 146 yards on the ground and 22 in the air. Matador piled up 266 yards on the ground but none in the air. Other Crowell boys playing in this contest were Ronny Clifton, Otis Johnson, Paul Campbell, Randy Adkins, Mike Payne, Toye McCurley, John Carl Borchardt, Tommy Carpenter, James Corder, Lee Looney, Gary Taylor, Randy Smith and Mike Gamble.

The Wildcats will travel to Quanah this Friday night to play the Quanah Indians. The Indians have been picked to win the state championship in class 2A. They have had three games with class 3A teams this season. They defeated Vernon and lost to Stamford and Rider of Wichita Falls.

Zone 5 Soil Conservation Election Oct. 1

Zone 5 residents of the state's soil conservation districts are an election date to keep on October 1. Joe Burkett, County Agricultural Agent, says the election is very important and he has all eligible voters to cast their ballot.

Zone 5 voters in the Lower River Soil Conservation District will elect a farmer or ranchman who will serve as their supervisor and representative on the Soil Conservation District board for the next five years. Voting will be in the directors' office of the Crowell State Bank.

Burkett says a qualified voter is one 5 landowner who is over 21 years of age or older. Wives of eligible landowners can vote if they should do so since they have an interest in their soil conservation district.

Zone 5 is made up of all the land east of State Highway 283 which runs from Quanah to Benjamin through Crowell.

The agent points out that soil conservation districts are political divisions of the State of Texas and by law are charged with the responsibility of carrying out all water conservation programs in their district. Through such items as technical service, equipment, leadership in watershed projects and many other services are provided to cooperating landowners.

Because of the great importance of the districts and supervisors in their programs, all eligible voters are urged to participate in the October 1 election. J. W. Ayers of the Riverside Community is presently serving on the board of supervisors from Zone 5.

Crowell's City Council Sets Water Rates

At a special meeting last week, Crowell's City Council tentatively approved water rates sufficient to raise \$57,563.40 per year.

Under the proposed rates, the minimum for the first 2000 gallons would be \$4.00 per month. Graduated rates would provide for a charge of 60 cents per thousand gallons for the next 8,000 gallons, 55 cents per thousand for the next 15,000 gallons, 50 cents per thousand for the next 15,000 gallons, and 45 cents per thousand for all over 40,000 gallons.

These rates would go into effect if Crowell should approve the contract with the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority. Approval of the contracts by the member cities would set the stage for construction of a 90,000-acre-foot reservoir on the Salt Fork of the Red River northwest of Hedley.

The rate structure would raise the \$36,000 needed to purchase water from the Greenbelt Authority at 37 1/2 cents a thousand gallons and the additional money needed to retire Crowell's bonded indebtedness on its present water system.

The present water rate of the city is \$3.00 for 4,000 gallons. The next 10,000 gallons have a charge of 60 cents per thousand; 50 cents per thousand for the next 10,000 gallons; and 40 cents per thousand for all over 24,000 gallons.






