

### 'EYES' FOR FALLOUT SHELT

Radiological detection instruments will be a vital component of supplies for community fallout shelters stocked under the Federal shelter program of the Department of Defense.

A nuclear attack might threaten large areas of the nation with radioactive fallout. Some areas could receive a heavy fallout deposit requiring stays in a shelter of two weeks or more, while shelter occupants in lightly-affected areas might begin coming out in a few days or less.

Radiological instruments are needed by occupants of community fallout shelters to tell them when they might emerge safely.



The refund may be received for all gasoline used for agricultura ourposes on a farm or ranch, Bur kett says. Claims should include fuel used by the operator himself or by custom operators working for him, he added. However, fuel used in vehicles on roads and highways is not eligible for re

The procedure is sin le and all farmers who file laims last year will receive Forn 2240 in the mail this year. Farmwho did not file last year may obtain the forms from Burkett. or from the Internal Revenue Service. Burkett also suggests that a copy of Publication 308 of the Internal Revenue Service may be of help to the applicant.

The federal gas tax refund should not be confused with the state refund which is for a shorter period of only six months, explains Burkett. This refund involves a more complicated process and additional information hould be obtained from the State Department of Revenue in Austin

Also, Burkett reminds that any points that are uncertain should e checked on before the claim is iled and that farmers should keep their records to verfiy claims sub-
