After Cattle Haul

Frisco Surv vs Line to Roswell, New Mexico

The Frisco Railroad Company contemplates building a line from some point on the Fort Worth & Denver City through several of the best counties in Texas to Roswell, N. M., a distance of between 300 and 320 miles.

Two surveys have already been made, one from Vernon and the other from Quanah, but the former route will likely be chosen, should the extension be built, as it furnishes the easiest route and the most feasible to construct. The road would run through Cottle county and strike many of the big ranches, among them the 3D, the Matador and the O X. Heretofore these ranches and many others have been so far from a railroad station, consequently shipment of cattle has been to a great disadvantage. A road through this as well as other cattle counties would be hailed with delight by the large stock growers of these sections.

Representative Witherspoon of Cottle county, has made the trip over the line with the railroad men from Quanah and says that he feels confident the company will build the road.—Ft. Worth Telegram.

The yellow fever may prove a godsend to Texas and other states. All over Texas the city fathers are passing ordinances compelling the people to clean up around their premises, and imposing heavy fines for failure to do so.

Don't you think it would be a pious idea for the road overseers, Commissioners or some body else to see that the snailfowers in the public roads be cut down? The roads off the county are simply in an awful condition.

Yellow fever report at New Orleans August 8: New cases, 60, total to date, 925, total deaths to date, 117.

It will now cost the fellow who is coward enough to carry a pistol, \$100 and a month or two in jail if he is apprehended.

Verdon has shipped about 100 cars of cantaloupes up to date, and it is estimated that by the end of the season she will have shipped out 400 car loads of watermelons and cantaloupes.

A call meeting was held in the Court House Monday morning to discuss and consider what kind of a proposition should be offered Mr. McCauley, of the K. C. M. & O. Ry. Co., who is to be here in the near future. No definite proposition was brought before the assembly, but a committee was appointed to interview the people and ascertain what they are willing to do when Mr. McCauley arrives.

2,425,000 acres of Government Land to be thrown open for settlement August 28, 1905.

Advices are received to the effect that the Uintah Indian Reservation in Utah will be thrown open by the Government for settlement on August 28th, and that on account of same individual registrations for the land will commence August 1, at Grand Junction, Colorado, and at Vernal, Price and Provo, Utah, such registrations to close August 12.

Drawings to determine the order in which selections of the land may be made, will be held at Provo, Utah, commencing Thursday, August 17, and the applications of those participating and drawing numbers from 1 to 50 inclusive, must be presented at Vernal, Utah, August 23, when they will be considered in their numerical order during the first day; the applications of holders of numbers 51 to 100 inclusive to be presented on the second day, and so on until all numbers have been disposed of. Between the time of registration and the drawing, applicants will be given certificates permitting them to examine the lands. All applications for entry must be made individually, and can not be made by agents or representatives except in the cases of honorably discharged soldiers and sailors, who may submit proofs of their qualifications,

through agents of their own selection. No person, however, will be permitted to act as agent for more than one soldier or sailor. The reservation is reached to advantage via a new transportation line from Mack, Colorado, known as the Uintah Railway, also by stage line from Price, Utah, a station on the line of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad.

On this account and in order to admit of interested persons participating in the very unusual opportunity thus presented, at nominal expense, The Fort Worth & Denver City Ry. Manufacturing Incense.

A itinerant traveler from the Lau River in Mongolia says he passed thirty-one rapids in one day. The most of them were water mills for the grinding of aromatic trees into powder to make incense. The trees are chopped into small pieces and thrown into a mill, with a heavy millstone, which revolves on a larger stone as the water rushes through below. In the rainy season, when the river flows full and fast, a pair of mills can grind 200 cwt. (263 pounds) of incense a day. It is made up into bundles of this weight and sold on the spot for fifty strings of cash (about 6¢).
