(By the State Dept. of Agriculture) The recent strike and the so-called car-shortage are being used by the cotton gamblers and speculators to break the market and scare the farprice that may be offered. This scheme is used to justify the present

When cotton declines, quit selling. Farmers, when the gamblers put the price down, quit selling; do not sell a bale on a declining market, but hold for 45 cents, and make it plain that you are going to hold for the farmers' price. Grouping or collective selling is a good rule, provided you use your collective power to secure your fixed price. Do not be led into grouping your cotton merely to sell at the exchange price and probably without any competition on the part of buyers because of a previous un-

San Angelo, Texas, Nov. 30.—Owing to fuel shortage, each hour becoming more serious, the Texas division of the Texas City, Mexico & Orient Railroad Saturday instructed all agents for the present to accept no freight shipments except foodstuff, livestock, feed for them, and perisha-

ble goods. The Orient has only a few days' supply of coal, and unless speedy relief is furnished all traffic over its 477 miles of track may have to be sus-

CRISIS APPROACHING IN

MEXICAN SITUATION If the Carranza Government of Mexco should continue in its refusal to ignore the note from the Govern-ment of the United States demanding the immediate release of William O. Jenkins, American consular agent at Puebla who is held in jail by Mexican authorities on a charge of conniving with bandits who kidnapped and held him for a \$150,000 ransom, it will be confronted by a serious situation. It is freely admitted in official circles Washington that relations between the United States and Mexico are exceedingly strained. Officials say also that the three departments, State, War and Navy, are ready to meet any contingency that may arise out of a persistence by Carranza in his pres-

ent attitude.

It is said that the official and private record of Jenkins has been carefully investigated by Government agents with the result that there is believed to be no foundation whatever for the charge made against him

by the Mexican authorities.

The latest reports from the American Embassy showed that Jenkins is still imprisoned; that he is ill, and that bail has been refused him. It was also pointed out by Federal of-ficials that, under the Mexican Constitution, state courts have no juris-diction over cases involving diplomatic or consular officers, such jurisdiction being lodged specifically in the Mexican Federal Court. It is contended also that the Federal Court of Mexico should at once assume juris-diction and take proper action in the

TEXAS HOLDS OIL LAND IN DISPUTE

Titles of Texas citizens to lands embraced in the Red River boundary line dispute between Texas and Oklahoma will not be questioned at this time by the Federal Government, according to Assistant United States Attorney General Frank N. Nebeka in Washington.

It is possible that the Department of Justice may bring suit in the Supreme Court to recover title to the land south of the south bank of the river, as it existed in 1785, in behalf of the Indian allottees, it was further

The decision of the Government is based upon a report of a special commission, headed by Representative Parrish, which recently investigated these lands. As the matter now stands the validity of the Texas claims to approximately 64,000 acres of land, some of it valuable oil property, is recognized by the Government. Tex-as is at present in control of the dis-

puted area. Final determination in the case must await the decision of the Supreme Court in the boundary line case pending before it. In the meantime, however, under the Department of Justice decision, Texas will remain in control of it as far as the Government action claiming title for the Indian allottees has been raised by the

Texas claimants, it was stated.

WOOD SELLS AT \$12.50 The coal famine has turned our peo ple to wood and they are glad to buy it wherever they can get it. Wood is not so plentiful as it was a few years ago and where it is available at all, in most instances must be hauled six or seven miles. There was a time, and that not long ago, when people would bring wood to town and beg the town folks to buy, but that is not the case now. The people in town are begging the farmers to haul it to them and they are willing to pay them their price. It has been selling at \$12.50 per load for several days. It is not a question of how much the wood is worth. It is a question as to what it is worth to keep from suffering on account of the cold weather.

So we are glad to get any kind of fuel and at any price within our reach. That the fuel proposition is a serious one puts it mildly. If possible it is more than serious. Some of the peo-ple of Crowell will actually suffer if they do not get fuel. This is true also in other places. It is up to those who have any coal or wood to conserve as much as possible. This is a thing we have never done before, but it is necessary now in order that what fuel is available may be distributed where it is needed as much as possible.

to have the privilege of voting is to ray their poll tax just like "hubby" That will cost each woman We think the women ought to avail themselves of the opportunity of vot-

ing by procuring a poll tax receipt. First, it will add to the company of good voters in the state. This is not intended merely as a compliment to the ladies. People generally admit them to be better voters, when they will you to the man way. will vote, than men. They are just as capable of casting votes properly, judged from the standpoint of intelli gence and general information on matters concerning the public, and as a rule they are more apt to vote their convictions than are men. LEAVING RUSSIA

If there is one thing that the Entente nations need it is, and for some time past has been, a policy of dealing with Russia. Bolsheviki and anti-Bolsheviki have struggled for some time now, with the end nowhere in sight. All that is certain is that the Russian Reds seem to be able to hold their own against their foes, even while their adversaries are receiving while their adversaries are receiving aid from foreign countries. Whether the withdrawal of allied support to the movement of the anti-Bolshevist leaders will permit the regime of Trotzky leaders to gain the upper hand remains doubtful, but at least about to be tried.

Lloyd George, in his recent appearance in the House of Commons, declared that other countries were in much better position to help the op-ponents of the Bolshevics than Great Britain, but that his government had given the anti-Bolshevist forces more help than France, America and Japan put together. He admitted however that France and Great Britain were in agreement to withhold supplies from Russia. This means the test of strength in that country, and perhaps the victory of one side or the other.

The movement against the Bolsheviki is made of two forces, those who wish to reunite a strong and solidi-fied Russia, and the border states, which wish nothing for old Russia, but independence for themselves. To agree upon a policy is hard when such conflicting elements battle upon a mmon side.

BERKMAN TO BE DEPORTED Alexander Berkman, the anarchist, whose activities in this country have brought him notoriety for many years, is at last to be deported. Berkman's case was acted upon by the Department of Labor when Louis F. Post, route to the Conle the Acting Secretary of that Department, approved the memorandum of the Immigration, providing for the deportation of Berkman. Where he is to be sent has not yet been an-

Emma Goldman, the anarchist agitator most often associated with Berkman, will probably also be deported. Berkman is the author of several booklets preaching anarchy, and formerly published an anarchist periodical called "The Blast," which was suppressed in 1917. On July 22, 1892, Berkman was convicted at Fittsburgh was a charge of attempting to myrr. upon a charge of attempting to mur-der Henry C. Frick and was sentenced to serve twenty-one years in prison. In one of his books, entitled "Prison Memoirs of an Anarchist." he describes his attack on Mr. Frick as "the first terrorist act in America."


Some Tennis Players Object to Word "Love" as at Present Employed in Scoring System.

CALL FOR TEXAS AGRI-CULTURAL CONFERENCE

County Agent Chaney received a etter from the director of Co-Opertive Extension Work in Agriculture and Home Economics at College Sta-tion last week together with a call for an agricultural conference of reprentative farmers at Waco on Dec.

The purpose of this call is outied as follows:

The agricultural situation in Texas and throughout the nation and the world is unprecedented and calls for the serious attention of thoughtful War has impaired the agencies of production while increasing the de-mand for food products and the raw materials of manufacture. The proc-esses of distribution have been disloated, and while plenty abounds in gions famine stalks in others Prices of agricultural products have soared to unheard of levels but with out supplying stimulus for increased production because of increased costs and extra hazards in production and

Our farmers are confronted by conditions they do not fully understand and hampered by circumstances ap parently beyond their control. They realize the world need for increased production but in the fog of con-fusion and uncertainty which envelopes agriculture at this time they are finding it difficult to formulate safe

programs. There is less certainty of remunerative prices now than in a generation. There is less efficient labor on Texas farms than when the nation ad 4,000,000 men under arms. Prices of agricultural products were never so unable and the outlook so confusing. The threat of insect depredations and the ravages of plant diseases were never so great. Summed up in a few words, at a time when the world is calling on farmers to increase production the outlook for a

profit to farmers is distressingly un-The president of the United States with a keen realization of the gravity of the situation has announced his purpose to call a national conference at an early date to consider the problems of agriculture in the United States and their relation to world problems. Such a conference is needed, but in order that it may do work well it should have before it the facts as to the conditions in the sev-

eral states and the judgment of men familiar with those conditions. In view of the premises stated above, we hereby join with the A. & M. College of Texas in calling an agricultural conference of Texas farmers and business men to assemble at Waco, Thursday, December 11, 1919, to consider present and prospective state, national and interna-tional conditions and formulate an agricultural program for which will serve the interests of Texas farmers and properly relate Texas agriculture to national and inter

national conditions. We call upon thoughtful men in all lines of endeavor in the state to contribute of their time and means to the general welfare by attending this conference and aiding in the solution of the many grave problems that con-front us. These problems are so numerous an dvaried that they cannot be accessfully attacked by a single class. Practical armers will be needed to supply information and judg-ment on the many questions relating to production and distribution; bankers will be needed for advice and assistance on matters of finance and credits; business men should be there to present sound views on marketing and distribution; professional men should be ready to give information relative to suppression or control of the menace of insect pests and plant diseases; economists and students of national and international affairs should bring to us a knowledge of our larger relationships.

Without undertaking at this time to make a program for the conference we suggest the following as important subjects for its consideration: Agriculture labor.

BAPTIST 75 MILLION CAMPAIGN WILL RAISE BIG SUM FOR RETIRED MINISTERS.

CARE FOR THE WIDOWS, TOO

Total of \$5,000,000 Included On Program For This Purpose-Insurance Feature Also Included.

Heretofore the average annual salary of Baptist ministers in the South has been less than \$500, meaning that a large number of preachers received ing it necessary that they engage in other occupations during the week in families, and rendering it practically impossible for them to lay aside any money as a support for their old age.

The establishment of the Relief and Annuity Board and the decision to raise \$5,000,000 during the next seven years for the relief of the aged ministers already in need of assistance and the more adequate care of the men who hereafter give their lives to the Christian ministry without an opportunity to save up a competency to tide them through sickness or care for them in their declining days, has met of Southern Baptists, and it is be lieved the provision of better treatment for the ministers in their retirement will not only tend to cause young men to look with greater favor upon the ministry as a life work, but will bring the members of local congregations generally to see the need of paying pastors more adequate salaries before these pastors become old and

helpless. By the addition of an annuity feature it is possible for retired ministers to receive an annuity of \$500 after they have reached the age of 68, and provided they have been in the ministry for thirty years. If they have served less than 30 years the annuity is reduced by a certain proportion. To participate in this annuity a minister must make monthly, quarterly or annual payments sufficient to bring in an income of \$100 per year when in vested, on the principle of regular life insurance, while this is supplemented by \$400 provided by the denomination. A minister's participation in the annufty fund is in addition to his claims upon the relief fund.



BAPTIST WOMEN TO RAISE \$15,000,000

FIFTH OF SUM SOUGHT IN FIVE YEAR PROGRAM WILL COME FROM THEM.

ARE DOING A LARGE WORK

Hospitals, Mountain Schools, Good Will Centers and Church Building Funds Maintained by Them In Addition To Regular Gifts.

Evidencing the larger sphere which women have come to occupy in church life, as well as other activities, when the Baptist 75 Million Campaign was decided upon at the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Atlanta last May, the women, through their regular organization, the Woman's Missionary Union, at once agreed to be responsible for one-fifth of the sum sought, or \$15,000,000. This means that the Baptist women of the kinds, Christian education and benevolences, the sum of \$3,000,000 a year for the next five years, in addition to their contributions to local enterprises and special work.

Through the channels of the Woman's Missionary Union, with headquarters at Baltimore, Md., the Baptist women of the South have since their organization contributed more than \$5,000,000 in cash to various denominational purposes. With the addition of boxes of food and clothing sent to orphanages and other benevolent institutions, the total of their contributions through this channel has reached \$5,710,433.71.

Miss Kathleen Mallory is the corresponding secretary of the Woman's Missionary Union, and in appreciation of the service she has rendered in that connection the Baptist women of Alabama have established the Katheen Mallory Hospital for Women at Laichow-Fu, Shantung, China, Miss


