Callahan County Star **Head Start Program Welcomed In Baird**

Baird recently welcomed a new Head Start classroom. They are located at 100 W. 5th. Hours of operation are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Head Start is a federal program for preschool children with low income families. Since it began in 1965, it has provided children between the ages of 3-5 with nutrition, health, social services, mental health, disability as well as educational and parent involvement services. Head Start offers support services and a chance to be involved in activities that help the entire family. Head Start is divided into seven different components who work together to provide children and families these services. They are: 1) Nutrition--this component ensures that 2/3 of the child's daily nutritional needs are being met at Head Start. Children are provided with breakfast, lunch and a snack as well as assessments such as height, weight, and iron level testing. Children found to be at risk are referred to the appropriate professionals. 2) Health--every child enrolled in Head Start will receive physical and dental exams, and vision and hearing screenings within the first 45 days following enrollment. Health and hygiene are part of the Head Start curriculum: washing hands, brushing teeth, flossing, and safety precautions are taught to the children and encouraged at home. 3) Social Service--the objective of this component is to establish and maintain outreach and recruitment for enrollment of eligible children regardless of race, sex, creed, color, national origin, or handicapping condition. 4) Mental Health--a daily program of activities for children at the centers enhance emotional, cognitive, and social development. Also mental health services for all children and their families is provided when the need is identified. 5) **Disability--Head Start** is mandated to ensure that at least 10% of the enrollment opportunities provided by the program are made to children with disabilities. 6) Education -- A learn ing environment offering experiences which are developmentally appropriate to the children's age and stage of development is provided in the Head Start classroom. This includes child initiated activities, learning center experiences,

directed learning expe-

riences that provide op-

portunities for children to develop, socially, emotionally, intellectually, and physically. 7) Parent Involvement-parents are recognized as the primary educators of their children and as contributors to the Head Start program. Parent participation is attained through direct involvement in the decision making process, program planning and op-

erations of the program, and parents are encouraged to volunteer in the classroom. Baird Head Start recently welcomed ambulance drivers to their classroom during Dr. and Nurses Week. Dr. Monty Ancinec DVM spoke to the class on pet care during the week of Pets. The class attended the West Texas Fair and Rodeo petting zoo in Abilene, they also took a tour of the Baird Post Office during their study of mail carriers. They are anxiously awaiting a visit from Fire Marshal Russell Robbins and his fire truck and Smokey the Bear during Fire



A Blast From The Past From The Callahan County Clarendon

January 24, 1880

Our New Jail The contractors for the construction of the jail--Messrs. Martin, Byrne, and Johnson of Comanche, commenced the work with a full force of workmen, last Monday and will continue to work until the first story is up; they will then return to complete the Buffalo Gap jail before resuming the work on this one. Our jail will be substantial material--the walls of stone lined with three eighth inch jail plates; the floor will be of two inch plank and lined with the same. The size of the building will be 28x30 feet, two stories high; the lower floor will be finished with three rooms and a hall for a family; the upper story will be finished off for prisoners. The main jail room will be 15 1/2x20 feet and the misdemeanor room will be 10x12 feet. There will be but one cage in the jail. The iron comes from Cincinnati, Ohio and is now at Fort Worth. We are informed that the building will be

nearly to the top of them. The work on the jail was suspended yesterday on account of the cold weather. Post Master Parvin and Dr. Largen have been having a railing put around their offices and the office otherwise improved. 




