Also destroyed by the fires was the accumulation of mulch which has been built up over several years. Plant mulch on the ground helps reduce evaporation of soil moisture. Drying winds pull out tremendous amounts of moisture from bare soils. Litter helps to keep the wind from touching the soil and greatly reduces this loss.

The torrential type rains we normally receive have a great the surface so it seals over and soil. These drops also loosen soil particules which then wash away with the runoff water. and erode the soil. A good mulch cover is the best insurance against soil and water loss, according to Ringhoffer.




