BAIRD — Chapel services for Mrs. E. C. (Dollie) Fulton, 90, were held at 10:30 a. m. Tuesday. Officiating was Dr. Ben H. Moore, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

Burial was in Ross Cemetery under the direction of Godfrey Funeral Home.

Mrs. Fulton died at 6:20 p. m. Saturday, Sept. 8th, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Helen Thompson, in Tucson, Arizona, where she had lived for the past 16 years.

She was born in Baird on December 31, 1882, the daughter of an early pioneer family, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Scott. She made her home in Baird 75 years before moving to Arizona.

She was a member of the Presbyterian Church, past president, charter member of the

Lone Star Chapter, and honorary members of the Delphian Club, former Baird Coming-Home Queen, and was active in a number of other organizations.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Thompson of Tucson, and one nephew, Robert Scott of California.

"Get The Farmer Out Of The Mud" Project of Highway Commission

BAIRD — The Texas Highway Commission has approved development of 2.0 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Callahan County as a part of the 1973 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Engineer, J. C. Roberts of the Texas Highway Department, said estimated cost of the work in the county is \$82,000. This project will complete the earlier approved F.M. 3265 which connects F. M. 880 to F. M. 569 and will be under the supervision of Mr. C. M. Kitchell, Supervising Resident Engineer in Abilene.

Work authorized for this county is part of the 559.4 miles of paved secondary roads statewide which will be developed in this program.

A total of 261.6 miles will be newly designated roads. The remainder of the \$22.2 million program will develop Farm and Ranch to Market Roads and recreational roads which previously have been designated as part of the state-maintained highway network.

The additional mileage brings total mileage of the FM-RM system to almost 41 thousand miles. Much of this mileage represents former county road routes which have been transferred to the state system. FM and RM projects are selected cooperatively by the Texas Highway Department and local County Commissioners courts.

The Farm to Market Road program originally was conceived to "get the farmer out of the mud." On that score it has been successful by opening new economic, social and educational opportunities to the millions of Texans who live in rural areas.

For example, of the newly designated roads, 183-1 miles or 70 percent are school bus routes and 168.3 miles or 64.3 per cent are rural mail delivery routes.

But FM and RM Roads have benefited more than just those Texans who live in the coun-

try. Thousands of miles of FM and RM roads provide primary access to the great outdoor recreational resources in the state.

The FM system also provides access to new industrial enterprise located in smaller Texas cities. Many employees at some plants enjoy a good paying industrial job and the benefits of country living because of easy access afforded by the FM system.

Farm to Market Roads also serve as the framework for distributor of finished goods and supplies moving from commercial and industrial centers. In that sense, the Farm to Market system also could be called the Market to Farm network.

Clyde Bulldogs Trample Winters 36-7 In Season Opener Friday

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs ripped Winters 36-7 here Friday night in their season opener.

After a nervous start that was plagued with penalties and mistakes, the Bulldogs began to roll in the 2nd quarter when Ruben Ramos pitched to Jarrell Hurst on a counter option which went 68 yards down the left sideline for the first TD. Ramos passed to Hurst for two and Clyde led 8-7. The rest of the way was all Bulldog as Ramos passed again to Hurst for a 58 yard touchdown. Tommy Bailey toed in the point and Clyde took a 15-7 lead at halftime.

The Bulldogs played flawless ball in the 2nd half. Ramos passed 26 yards to Hurst for the third touchdown. Fullback Bobby Evans rammed right tackle for the two bonus points following a Winters offside.

Ramos pitched to Paul Beeman on right side option for at 31 yard gain which set up Clyde on the Blizzard 32 yard line. Two plays later, Ramos passed to Beeman on a screen and the speedy halfback took it in for the score. Bailey's kick was good. The Varsity closed out the scoring in the 4th quarter when fullback Evans hit the middle for a 9 yard TD. The Bulldogs amassed 314 yards on offense while the defense held Winters to 87 yards. Ramos completed 3 of 7 passes for 102 yards, and Clyde had a 10-6 first down edge. Defensive standouts were John York and John Straley in the line and linebackers Chuck Swofford, Bobby Evans and Johnny Arms. Offensive line play was led by Dennis Cutbirth, Jimmy May and Paul Morton. 34 Bulldogs saw action.

This week Clyde goes to Hamlin to take on the State's 4th ranked Pied Pipers. The Pipers possess speed in all position, and particularly with tailback Johnny Jones and flanker Bill Cork, who sprinted to Pipers to the Class AA State Track Meet crown last spring. Both have clocked 9.6 in the 100-yd. dash. Jones rushed for over 2,000 yards last season. This should be one of the top AA games in the state as Clyde and Hamlin battle for No. 1 position in the Big Country. Game time is 8 p. m.

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CofC Kicks-Off Appreciation Fund For Local Volunteer Fire Dept.

BAIRD — The welcome rain to badly parched area around the city, helped bring under control a grass fire that had burned approximately 20 sections. The fire started on the ranch of the late Curley Seale, when a spark from a power line started the blaze, which roared into the night, until rain began to fall in the area.

The blaze was fed by a 35 to 40 mile an hour wind blowing in gusts out of the northwest. The smoke was visible for miles around, and burned across numerous leased pastures, and came within only a few miles of reaching Highway 36, south of Baird.

This is the third fire that has roared out of control in the past month. The Baird Volunteer Fire Department has indeed had a busy summer, having called for aid from surrounding towns in order to save hundreds of acres of grassland. Grazing Should be Deferred On Burned Area to Protect Pastures

BAIRD — Numerous grass fires that have occurred on local ranches during the summer has greatly increased the need of a deferment on those pastures, stated A. H. Ringhoffer, Range Conservationist with the SCS at Baird.

Due to the large amount of dry grass on most ranches at the time of the fire, very high temperatures were reached. Because of the high temperature and low humidity, there was a complete burn of all the current years growth of grass and forbs.

Since all dead grass is destroyed, livestock will concentrate on the recently burned areas where the grass regrowth is tender and is easy to graze.

The burning itself may not permanently injure most grass, but grazing too soon after a fire may destroy them.

In order for pastures to respond, then maintain the production level that was grown before the fire, pastures should be deferred at least until next June. Any use made prior to such time that grasses have fully recovered will delay the time when normal production is reached. Small areas of large pastures could be protected by using temporary fences.

Also destroyed by the fires was the accumulation of mulch which has been built up over several years. Plant mulch on the ground helps reduce evaporation of soil moisture. Drying winds pull out tremendous amounts of moisture from bare soils. Litter helps to keep the wind from touching the soil and greatly reduces this loss.

The torrential type rains we normally receive have a great deal of power as they strike bare soil. Raindrops pound and pack the surface so it seals over and hinders water from entering the soil. These drops also loosen soil particles which then wash away with the runoff water. Raindrops striking grass are robbed of their power to pack and erode the soil. A good mulch cover is the best insurance against soil and water loss, according to Ringhoffer.

Because of the efficiency of the Baird Volunteer Fire Department our fire insurance policies are granted a 20% credit for premiums. The result of this is that the rates that we pay are less than most towns within a 75 mile radius of Baird. Most important, our rates are equal to those rates of the larger neighboring towns that have a paid, full time fire department.

We ask everyone to join us in saluting this organization of great people, who, at the sound of the alarm, terminate whatever they are doing, and answer the call, thus assuring the people of this community that they will be reasonably protected from the ravages of fire.

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PUBLIC NOTICE
SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular session or special session. Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to: Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligi-

ble Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a) which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

Members were reminded that the club will host a birthday party in February for residents of the Golden Holiday Nursing

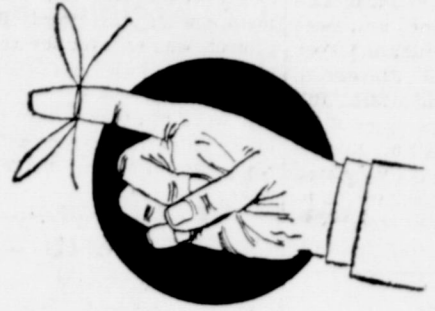

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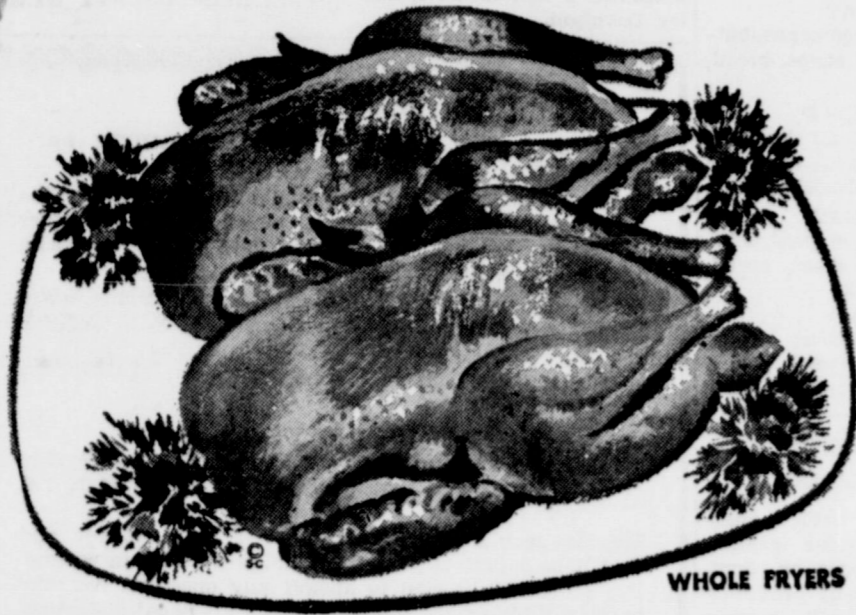
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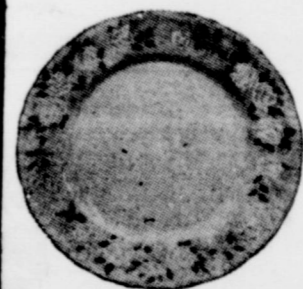
