Grassland Crop World's Largest And Most Widely Distributed

With sound conservation management a rancher can maintain range grasses and plants and harvest a crop of livestock products, according to Gary Gregory, Soil Conservationist of the Baird Field Office. The world's largest and most widely distributed crop is grass. Mr. Gregory contends that if the grass harvest were to fall for a single season, famine would depopulate the earth.

In order to manage our grassland for best production, we need to know a lot about each individual plant that is a part of the plant population on our grasslands, how they grow, how they compete with each other, how they feed themselves, how and when they reproduce and how they will respond to the kind, time and amount of grazing use we give them. By knowing and understanding these things about our grasses, we are better able to pattern our grazing uses to meet these needs. We are then working with nature to grow all the food that our grasslands are capable of producing.

Grass is a hardy plant and is able to endure a wide variation of hardships and conditions. One hardship grasses are not able to stand is continued misuse by overgrazing with livestock. When too much grass is harvested the plant faces a slow death by starvation, because too much of its leaf area has been removed. After all the leaves are the manufacturing part of the plant - 95% of all the nutrients necessary for plant growth are obtained from the leaves.

How much of the plant can we expect to harvest without losing our forage production potential? Most of our good forage plants in our area need to retain about one half of their top growth to keep them healthy and productive. As a rule of

thumb, Mr. Gregory says "take half and leave half," as this practice is carried out both halves will continue to get bigger.

Mr. Evans died at 3:15 p. m. Thursday at Hendrick Memorial Hospital.

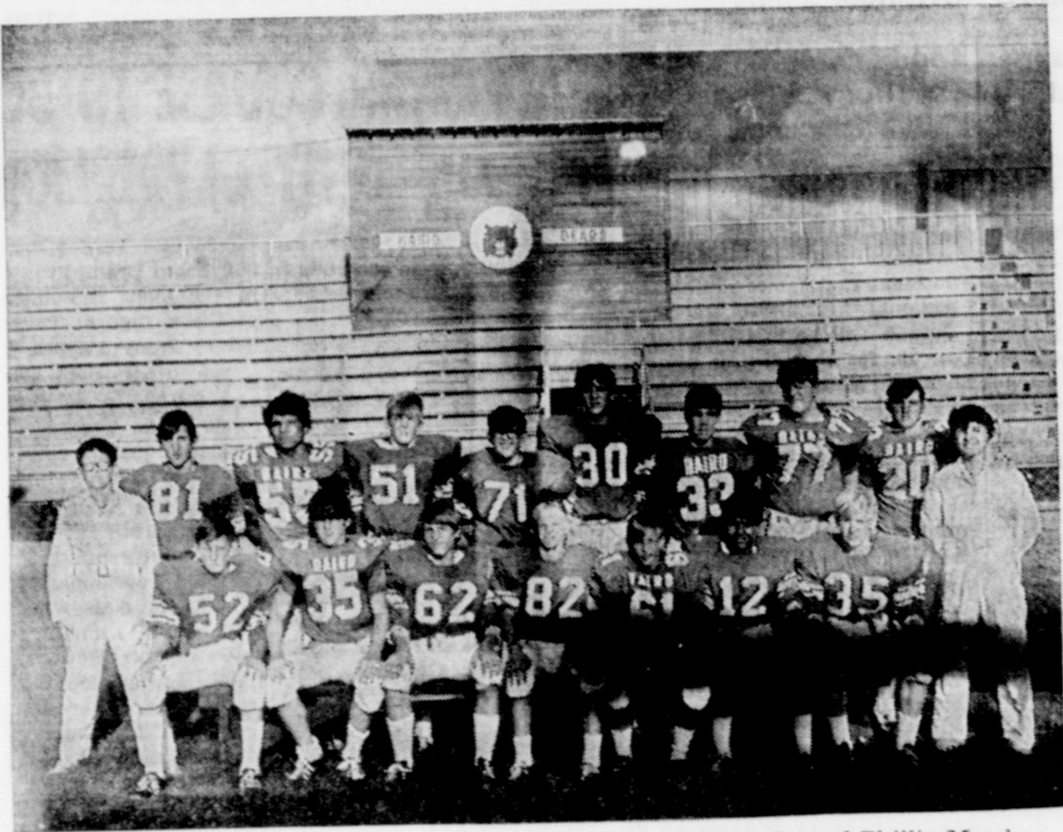

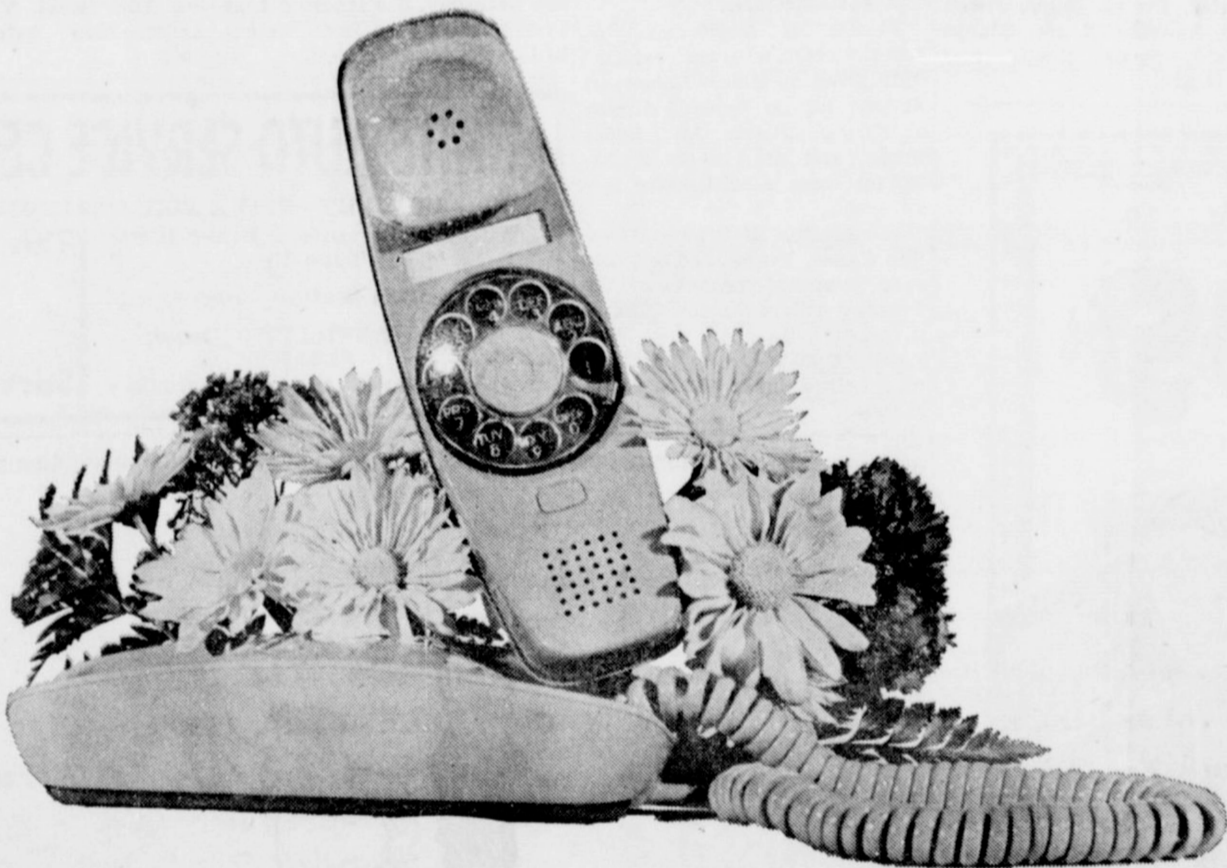
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Country & Western Musical Friday At Putnam Community Center

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BULLDOGS SHUT OUT BLUECATS 28-0 HERE FRIDAY NIGHT

CLYDE — The Bulldogs shut out Coleman's Bluecats Friday night, 28-0. Clyde made 402 yards on offense and 18 first downs, while limiting the Bluecats to 185 yards and 7 first downs. Fullback Bobby Evans rushed for 135 yards and was followed closely by Johnny Arms with 97, Marty Clifford with 73 and Paul Beeman 60.

The Bulldogs scored, one minute deep, in the 2nd quarter on a 38-yard pass from Ruben Ramos to Jack Longbotham. Tommy Bailey kicked the first of four extra points to give the Bulldogs a 7-0 halftime lead. Clyde controlled the clock in the 2nd half, with 25 and 72 yard touchdown drives, which were capped by Arms around left end and Clifford off right tackle, respectively, to stretch the lead to 21-0.

In the 4th period, Evans blasted the middle for the fourth TD following a 68-yard drive. Interception by Tony Weaver and Ramos kept the Bluecat drives from materializing. Weaver's interception in the 3rd quarter set up the Bulldog's second TD.

Clyde played errorless ball, had no turnovers, which picking up three Coleman scratches.

Clyde linebackers John York, Chuck Swofford and James Stevens played outstanding defense, as did Tommy Bailey, Dennis Cutbirth and Randy Brown in the offensive line.

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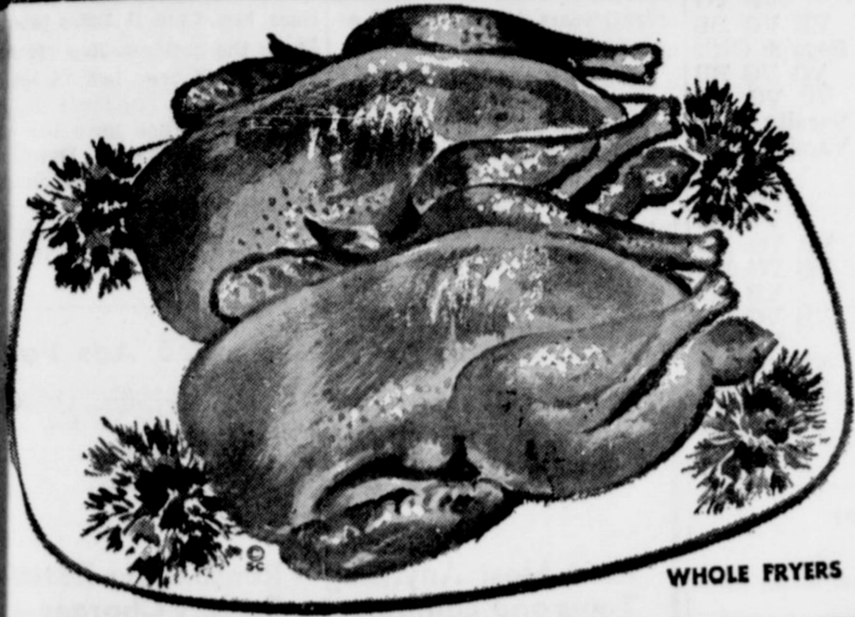
