





Over 28,000 Sign Corn-Hog Contracts For 1935 in Texas

College Station.—Twenty-eight thousand Texas farmers have signed the new 1935 corn-hog adjustment contract, it was announced here today by E. M. Regenbrecht, Extension Swine Specialist.

This is an increase of more than 25 per cent of signers over last

year.
"The progress of the 1935 signup is gratifying," Regenbrecht declared. "Much of the increase, in
signing the contracts, is due to
the new liberal regulations of the contract. The increase is particu-larly noticeable in the 'Black Lands.' Corn-hog farmers may now receive payment from the government by retiring a part of their corn crops and at the same time plant an unlimited amount of other feed crops such as oats, barley and other feed grains.

"Also," he added, "this year the

government has raised the ante on payment. Thirty-five cents a bushel will be paid for the corn, an increase of five cents a bushel

over last year." Each county is allowed to set its own deadline on the signing of the contracts. Reports show that the majority of the counties have set closing dates as between March 1 and March 15 1 and March 15.



among the powerful nations of that part of the world. Let us pass by, then, the record of his official life and touch on

It was after one of the great battles with the Philistines when his little force was surrounded, cut off from supplies and even from water, that David, worn out and thirsty, thought of the clear water in his father's well which had cooled his lips in boyhood. His parched throat yearned And David longed, and said, Oh that one would

give me drink of the water of the well of Bethlehem, which is by the gate!


And the three mighty men brake through the host of the Philistines, and drew water out of the well of Bethlehem, that was by the gate, and took it, and brought it to David: nevertheless he would not drink thereof, but poured it out unto the Lord.

And he said, Be it far from me, O Lord, that I should do this: is not this the blood of the men that went in jeopardy of their lives? therefore he would not drink it.

It is easy to understand why men worshipped a leader like that. The other incident occurred in the campaign against his son Absalom, the boy whom he loved more than all the world and who repaid his love by organizing a revolt and attempting to seize the throne, David gave orders that the boy was under no circumstances to be killed, but the zeal of a professional soldier was not to be curbed by such an order, and word was brought to the king that Absolm was dead. The revolt was broken, his throne was safe, he could go back to the security of the palace, but it all meant nothing. The feelings of the monarch

were swallowed up in the heart-breaking anguish of the father. O my son Absalom, my son, my son Absalom! would God I had died for thee, O Absalom, my son, my son! Perhaps the most poignant cry in history from a father's bleeding

heart. The faults of David are set forth none the less clearly than his virtues; we feel the reality of him in every line. Yet no catalogue of his shortcomings can hide his essential greatness. He was a genius in war, in administration and in literature. He organized a government that lasted more than four centuries as a single dynasty and which lived as an ideal through thirty centuries.


