Capitol News Letter

The Soldier Bonus

It looks like the final chapter will be written in the payment of the balance due on the adjusted service certificate before this letter reaches you. The Senate is due to vote today (the 18th) on this question.

The leading three Veterans' organizations of the Nation—the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Disabled Veterans have all agreed to this method of payment. Congressman Patman and his steering committee on yesterday unanimously went on record agreeing to concur with the Senate amendments providing this method of payment so no further serious opposition is expected in the House on this question.

The Constitution and the AAA Decision

The recent divided opinion of the Supreme Court on the AAA has again caused nationwide discussion as to the constitutional power of Congress to declare Acts of Congress invalid. Looking back through the years to the first decision so rendered by the court declaring an act of Congress invalid (Marbury vs. Madison) in February, 1803, which was then, as now, recognized the result of political controversy between John Marshall and Thomas Jefferson. The court has followed that view point and has usurped the power to declare Acts of Congress invalid which power was never given them under the constitution.

Since the Supreme Court has declared six of the Acts of this Administration invalid, it has again brought this question before us. Who shall govern—the duly elected representatives of the people or a majority of the Supreme Court appointed for life, responsible to no one except good behavior? From telegrams and letters received from over the district it seems that the people are overwhelmingly in favor of replacing the AAA decision with similar legislation that will meet the objections expressed by the leaders of the farm organizations.

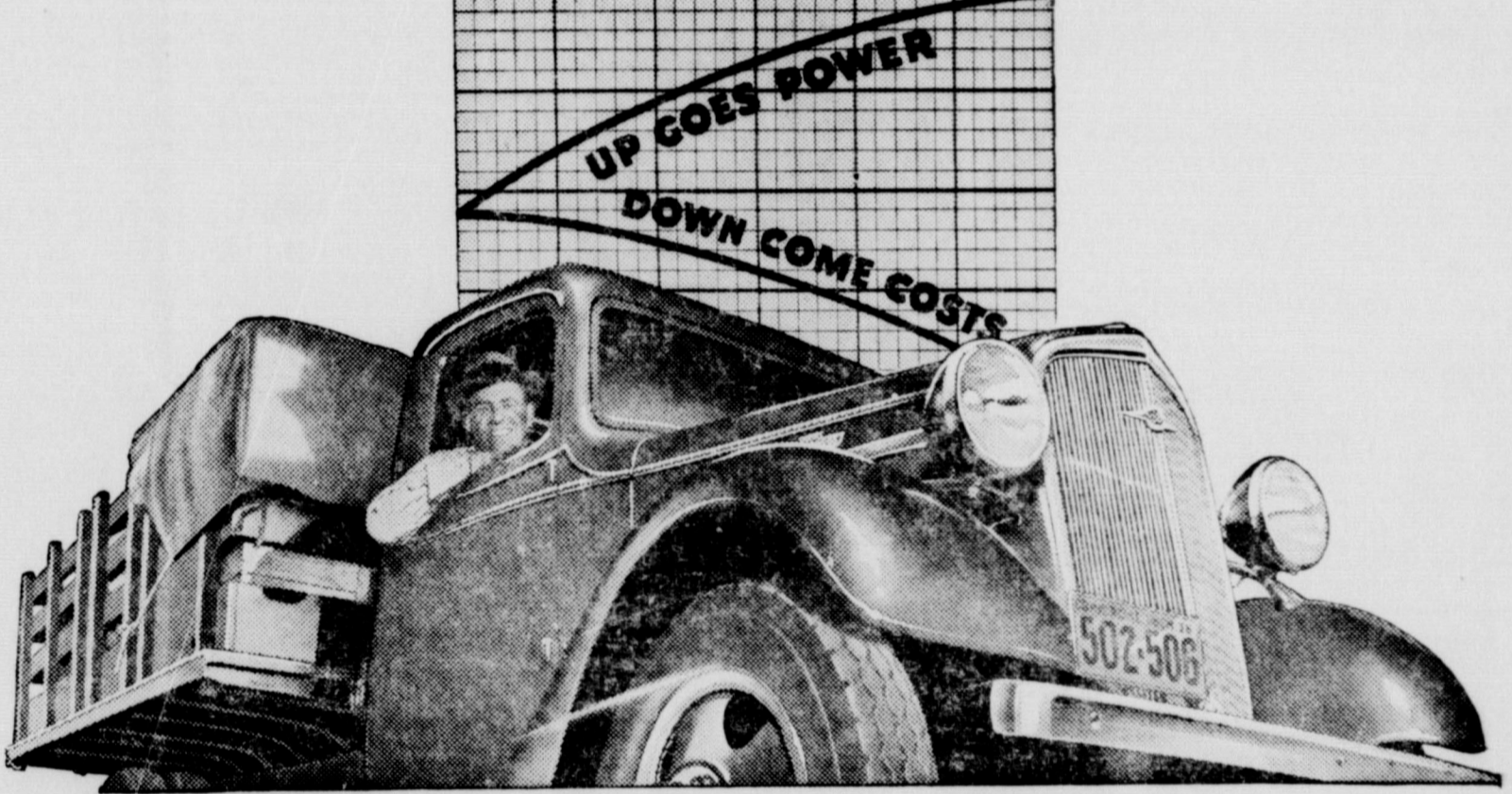

Every operator's license shall expire within three years from date of issuance, and shall be renewed on or before April 1, 1939...

When a license is lost or destroyed the operator or chauffeur may obtain a duplicate or substitute thereof upon furnishing proof satisfactory to the Department...

Forms will be supplied by the Department for the report of facts sufficiently detailing all the data with reference to any highway accident...

TEXAS HISTORY DATES

LAST WEEK

1821—On Jan. 17 Moses Austin received notice of the confirmation of his grant to found the first colony in Texas, but he did not live to carry out his plans.

1836—A second loan for \$50,000 cash was negotiated by the Texas commissioners to the U. S. These funds enabled the Texas agents to purchase supplies and keep the army together at a critical time.

1842—On Jan. 18 the first authentic information of the capture of the Santa Fe expedition was received in the Texas capital.

1844—President Sam Houston sent to the Congress of Texas his secret annexation message on Jan. 20.

1874—E. J. Davis, after near-conflict, vacated the office of Governor of Texas for Richard Coke on Jan. 17.

THIS WEEK

1824—To introduce a more uniform system, Stephen F. Austin published a set of "Instructions and Regulations for the Alcaides" on Jan. 22. This constituted a brief civil and criminal code.

1836—Colonel Francis W. Johnson arrived at Refugio on Jan. 20 and informed General Houston that the council had disposed of Governor Henry Smith, and had appointed Colonel James Fannin and himself agents to raise troops and invade Mexico by taking Matamoros.

1858—On Jan. 20 Governor Hardin R. Rennels, in a message to the legislature, recommended that the resolutions be passed declaring the sentiment of the people of Texas in regard to the aggressions being made upon institutions of the South.

1860—Governor Sam Houston called a special session of the state legislature on Jan. 21 for a discussion of state troubles with the Union.

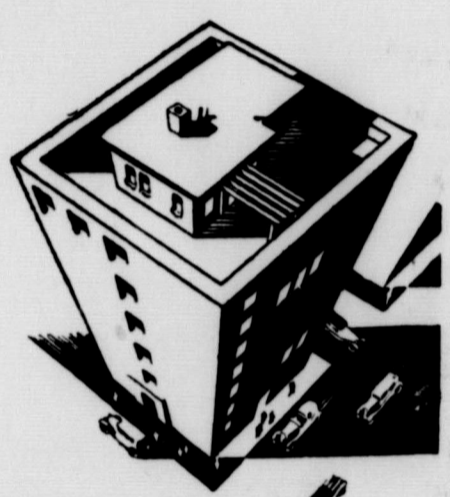

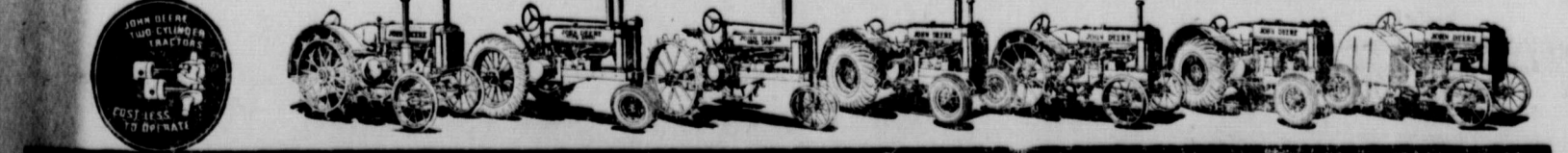

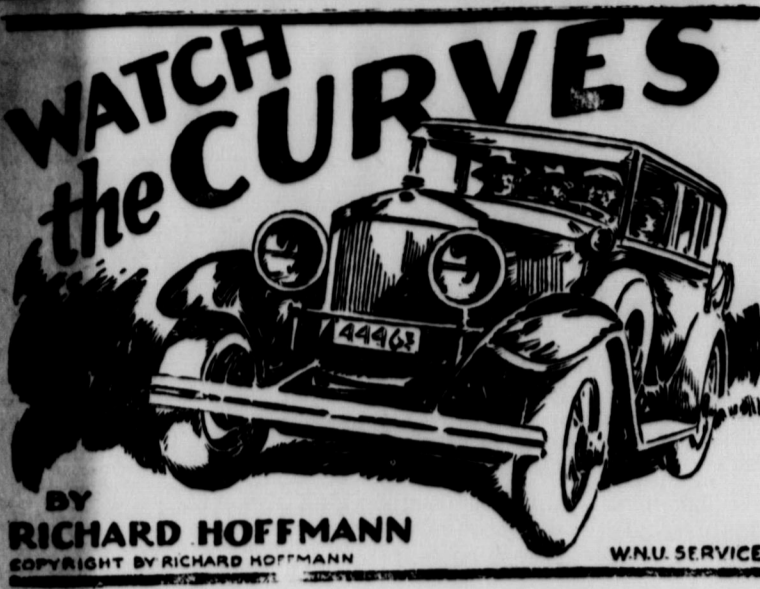

George Moffett is In Race for Texas Legislature Again

The News is authorized to announce the candidacy of George Moffett of Chisholm for Representative in the State Legislature from the 114th district, composed of Hardeman, Foard, Knox and King counties. Mr. Moffett has served with distinction in this capacity for the past few years. We quote the following from the Wichita Falls Record News of recent date concerning him:

"Mr. Moffett has been in the midst of some of the hardest fought legislative battles of the past few sessions. He comes from a small town and has consistently espoused the rural and small town viewpoint in the Legislature, and is the author of the constitutional amendment to be voted on next November, which seeks to limit the number of representatives from the most populous counties to seven. This proposal has attracted considerable attention and may prove to be one of the issues of the forthcoming campaign. A majority of the states have adopted a plan similar in substance to Mr. Moffett's, but it is just now being brought to the attention of the people of Texas. Other than his activities in connection with putting the brakes on the big cities, Mr. Moffett has been active in connection with agricultural legislation, tax questions, and is a leader of the dry forces in the House of Representatives."

Mr. Moffett made the following statement relative to his candidacy: "Since I became a member of the State Legislature it has been my intention to do the things that would best serve the interests and wishes of the people of this part of Texas. If re-elected I promise to continue that course. Only those who have been to Austin can know how constant is the battle and how hard the fight to pass laws that are fair to all parts of the state. Too often have the big cities secured the passage of laws for their own benefit and forgotten us in the small towns and rural areas of Texas. Several of the big city papers have criticized me for trying to place a balance wheel in our governmental machinery that would insure fair and equitable laws for country and city alike. Possibly they would like to see me defeated, but I sincerely hope to disappoint them."

"I have long advocated that Texas, the biggest cotton growing state in the world, should make every possible effort to increase the use and consumption of cotton. If more cotton were used, an acreage reduction program would not be necessary. In the light of recent court decisions, an increase in the use and consumption of cotton, seems the best solution of the problem before us. A great many new uses for cotton could probably be found, if proper investigations were made. The fact that cotton is used in the manufacture of 'gun cotton,' and in the manufacture of automobile tires, and in the manufacture of cellophane, constitute outstanding examples of new uses for cotton, that have been discovered in recent years. The State of Texas could probably render no greater service to its people than by employing a group of trained scientists to search out fifty or more new uses for cotton, thus creating a market for the state's principal product. Automobile manufacturers have employed men that have devised hundreds of new improvements in the use of steel. The same thing could be done with cotton. But since an individual

farmer cannot by himself search out new uses and new markets for cotton, it is the natural and proper thing for the state to help out its citizens by doing so. I introduced a bill in 1931 along this very line, and it received considerable support, but was finally voted down, and most of the big city members were opposed to it. They do not understand agricultural problems and that is one reason why I am opposed to letting them get control of our state government. I expect to continue to push the idea of increasing the uses and markets for cotton, as that is probably the best way out of our present difficulties."

"A great deal is being said about taxes. I do not favor a sales tax on bacon, and beans, and bread, or other real necessities of life. And since cotton is our state's principal product neither should we tax cotton goods. But a selective sales tax on luxuries is a far different thing from a sales tax on the actual necessities of life. In many instances, taxation of luxuries for old age pensions, relief, etc., seems justified."

"When the campaign gets fully under way I expect to announce my stand upon the various issues that arise, and I also expect to visit each part of the district and to personally see and shake hands with as many of the voters as possible. I respectfully solicit your vote and sincerely thank you for your considerations of my candidacy for Representative in the 114th district."
