The sale of such certificates shall be approved by the appropriate assistant in cotton adjustment, whose approval shall be price of the certificates has been paid therefor in the presence of the Navy.

The term "Surplus Certificates"

been set at five cents per pound.
The Special Pool for sale of certificates carried over from last year was held open fifteen days and closed July 15. The regular National Pool, which will accept both 1934 certificates and surplus 1935 certificates, will be opened some time in September.

If there should be insufficient 1935 cotton crop, certificates from the National Pool will be available at the local county agent's office
