WEST TEXAS UTILITIES ELECTS NEW COMPANY PRESIDENT

Following a meeting of the Board of Directors of the West Texas Utilities Company, Wednesday afternoon, Roff W. Hardy, President of the Company since 1965, announced his resignation as a Director and as President of the Company, effective January 1, 1975.

Earlier Wednesday, the Board of Directors of Central Power and Light Company, meeting in Corpus Christi, Texas, elected him as a Director effective October 2 and Chairman and Chief Executive Officer, effective January 1, 1975.

In other actions, the Board of West Texas Utilities Company elected R. E. Kennedy as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer and Durwood Chalker as President. Both elections to become effective January 1, 1975. Kennedy who has served as a Vice President since 1961 has been with the Company for more than forty years. Chalker who was elected Vice President in 1968 has been with the Com-

pany for the past twenty-four years.

In his new position with Central Power and Light Company, Hardy will succeed Barney M. Davis who is now President of that company.

Both West Texas Utilities Company and Central Power and Light Company are operating companies of the Central and South West Corporation.

Central Power and Light Company with headquarters in Corpus Christi, Texas, provides electric service for more than 340,000 customers in South Texas. The service area extends from Bay City on the East to Del Rio on the West, Southwest to Laredo and South to Harlingen and the Rio Grande Valley.

West Texas Utilities Company with headquarters in Abilene, provides electric service for 167 towns and communities in a fifty county area extending from the Oklahoma Border through Central Texas to the Rio Grande.

BULLDOGS WIN DISTRICT OPENER 22-11 AGAINST HAMILTON

CLYDE — Clyde High School Bulldogs downed Hamilton's Bulldogs 22-11 in Hamilton last Friday night to take the district opener for both teams. After a defensive battle through the first quarter, Clyde broke the ice in the second with a 58 yard drive to paydirt. Quarterback Johnny Arms capped the drive from one yard out, but the pass for extra points failed. Hamilton came back just before half-time and kicked a 35 yard field goal to make it 6-3. Clyde mounted a 71 yard drive in the third period which terminated with Arms going off right tackle for a 4 yard touchdown. Arms then circled right end for the bonus points and Clyde led 14-3.

The fired-up Hamilton lads, backed by a Dad's night and reunion crowd, then rallied to put together a 65 yard effort, most by tailback Mike Schrank who scored from the one yard line. Schrank also got the bonus points bringing the score to 11-14.

Clyde then drove 51 yards with halfback James Stevens hitting a trap play up the middle and sliding to his left for a 32 yard touchdown romp.

Clyde's stout defense which was led by Jackie Brown, Miller Scott, Jimmy May, Chuck Swofford and Mike Dugan held off Hamilton and Clyde ran out the last minute for the 22-11 win.

This week Clyde entertains Cisco High School here at 8 p.m. Friday. The Cisco Lobos are returning District (AA Champs with 9 offensive and 7 defensive starters from last year. The Lobos gathered 20 first downs and 385 yards of offense last week, but failed to score against stingy Breckenridge in a 0-0 tie. The Breckenridge Bucks have given up only 24 points all season, mostly against AAA teams. The Lobo Offense features all-starters, halfback Kelly Kent and lineman Jesse Prescott, and a bevy of all-district performers, including quarterback Ronnie Powelson, halfback Jimmy Kanady, guard Polo Jimenez and tackle Mark Huffmeyer. Tackles Huffmeyer and Clark weigh in at 210 lbs. and 225 respectively. This will be the toughest test the Bulldogs have faced this season.

Major Changes In School Milk Program

The Secretary of Agriculture has announced major changes in the Special Milk Program regulations. The changes affect all schools participating in the Special Milk Program. The Baird Public Schools participate in this program. The most significant change in the Special Milk Program provides that students who qualify under the Free Lunch Eligibility Income Scale selected by the school district, and who have approved applications on file, shall be eligible for one-half pint of free milk (in addition to that served as a component of the Type A lunch) in schools that participate in the Special Milk Program.

If you feel that your child is eligible for the free lunch program, and have not made application to the school, please contact Mr. Moore at the Elementary School. Those students in Kindergarten and grades one and two who receive milk in their classrooms in the morning or afternoon are not entitled to an extra milk with their lunch.

Well, on July 7, 1974, another type storm hit Clyde in the form of an accident, which in the life of our son HIGHWAY PATROLMAN JOHN OLDHAM and his partner HAROLD HAMBRICK. This time we were in the state of Colorado on business. We expect to wake up from this bad dream and find it is not true. But it is. Mom and I are looking for words, which will not come, to say to the fine people of Baird and Clyde how fortunate they are to live in small towns where they know each other on a first name basis. We would like to thank each and everyone for accepting our son and making him feel at home in these towns. We would like to thank all the fine people who came by to offer their sympathy and the many who drove to Mansfield to pay their last respects. You fine people don't know how lucky you are to have friends and neighbors like you have. When all headlines cry out about the national political scandals, and we see what a fine group of dedicated officials you have, then America can't be too bad off. Our hearts cry out for Patty Hambrick and her children. Our son loved Harold and Don and the people of West Texas. We

spent the last weekend with John in Baird. He and Harold took us down to the Courthouse to show us their new office. We owe so much to so many for their prayers. Our son was proud of his commission as a law officer and loved his job. A special prayer and thanks to all the men who worked many, many hours without sleep during this tragedy. We have just received a letter from a lady whose child was killed near Clyde. She called John one Sunday morning and his words to her were, "Accidents occur, incidents happen, but only God can take a life; an act can be committed but only God has the power and decision of life and death."

May God continue to bless each and everyone of you.

LIFE'S GREATEST DISCOVERY

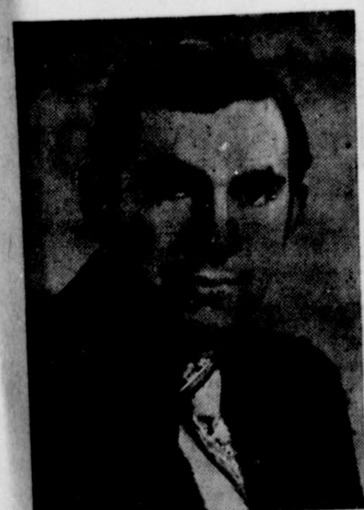

Colds increase when the winter heating season begins, because the dry air in heated rooms parches the nose and throat membranes, which are then more susceptible to virus infection. 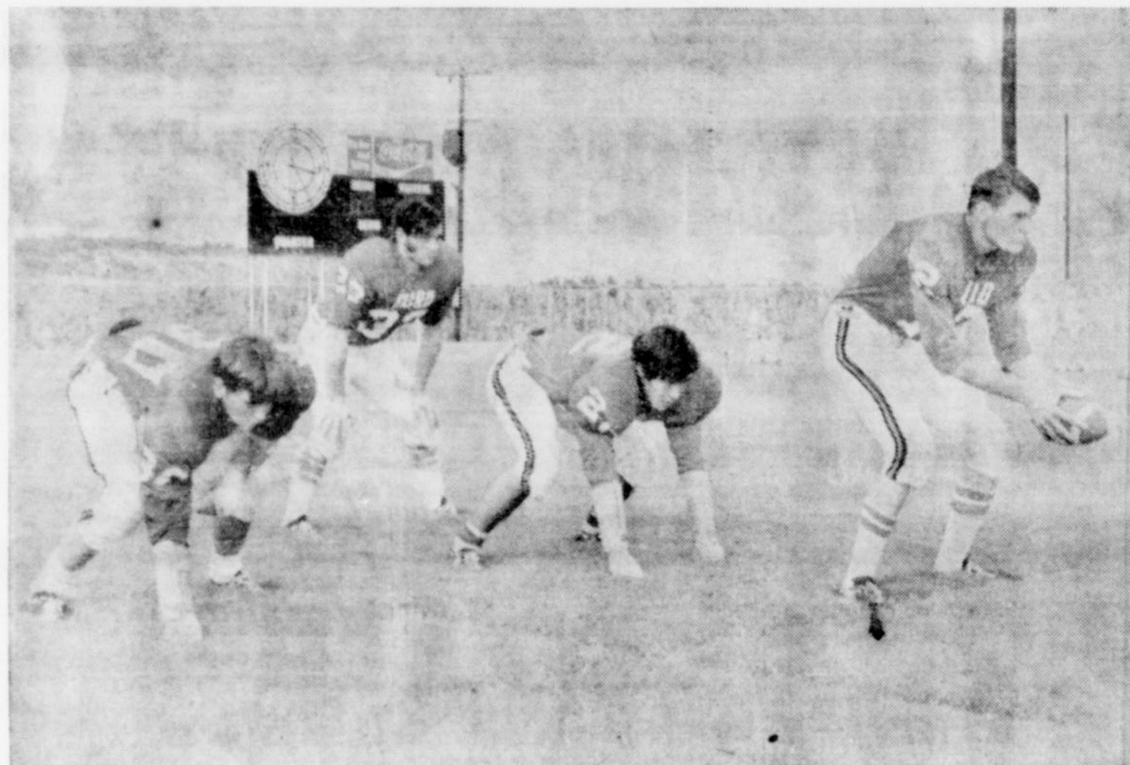

Jay Ringhoffer, fullback Rudy Rodriguez, tailback Mike Doty and slotback Larry Cauthen.

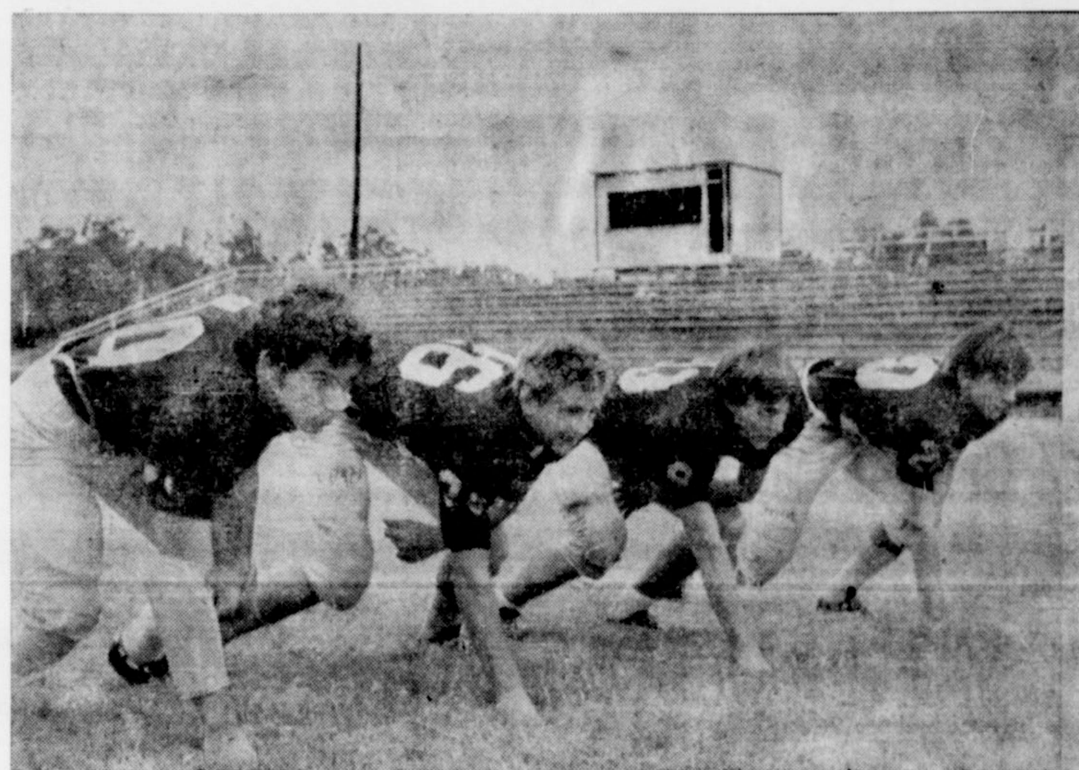
