







Unprincipled promoters, through the medium of "tipster sheets," high pressure salesmen and other devious means, are said to extract a billion dollars yearly from hopeful, but financially ignorant people.

In this country we have a group of financiers, stock exchanges and investment institutions that rival, in integrity, knowledge and plain common sense those found anywhere in the world. Sound investment advice

is free for the asking. The major stock exchanges and investment bankers do everything in their power to protect the public by thoroughly investigating the securities they list before offering them to the public.

Yet the trickster flourishes. The old attraction of "easy money" brings the sheep into the fold. And until the investing public realizes that get-rich-quick schemes are almost certainly unsound or fraudulent and that recognized securities alone are profitable in the long run, avoidable losses will continue to occur.

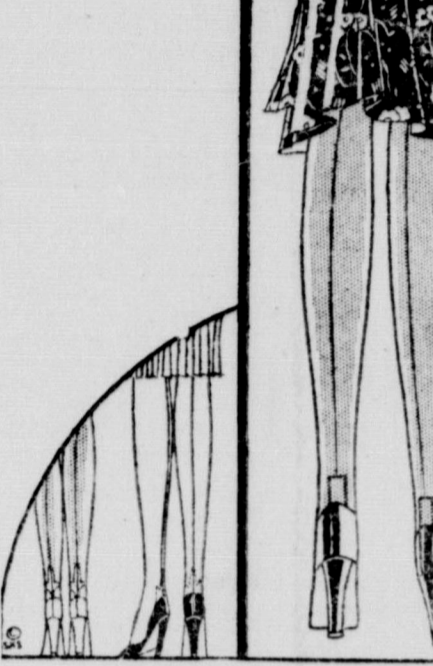

With this idea in mind, Mr. Rennels is now working to increase the number of hogs in Foard County and is continually pushing the dairy and poultry industry.

Considerable interest has already been shown in a plan that he is now perfecting for placing pigs in the

hands of club boys of the county. The project of the combined calf club and bull circle worked out by Rennels and its unique plan of financing which attracted state-wide attention, will be used in the pig project.

Mr. Rennels now hopes that he will be able to place 75 to 100 gilts in the hands of club boys within a short time. Bankers took the club member's notes on the other project after the members had planted five acres of cotton each to retire the notes and with the pig plan, the boys will plant two acres of cotton to take care of their notes.

Excellent profits can be made from hogs if they are properly cared for. Authorities state that hogs should not be kept more than six months for in that time they can be made to top the market if cared for and fed properly. It is unprofitable to feed hogs the year round according to Rennels and it is not necessary to do so.

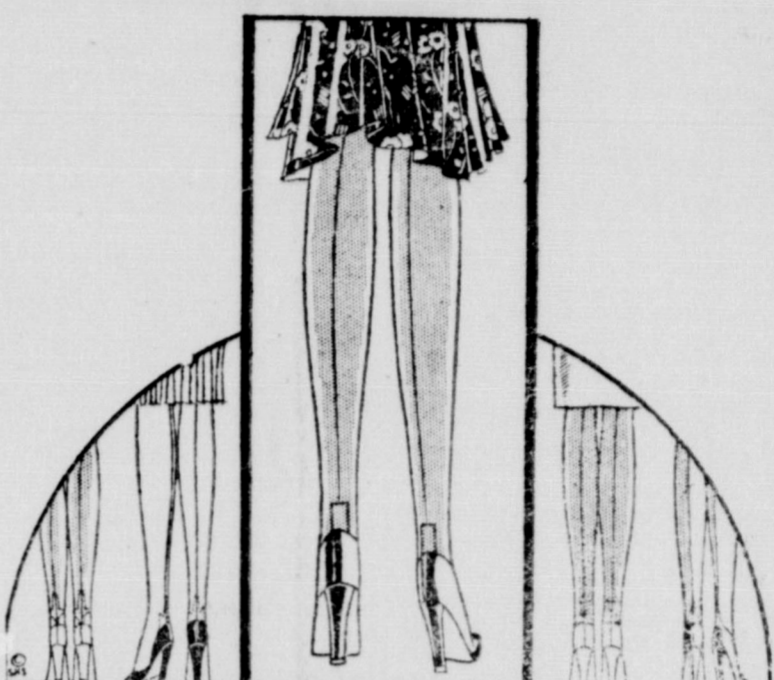

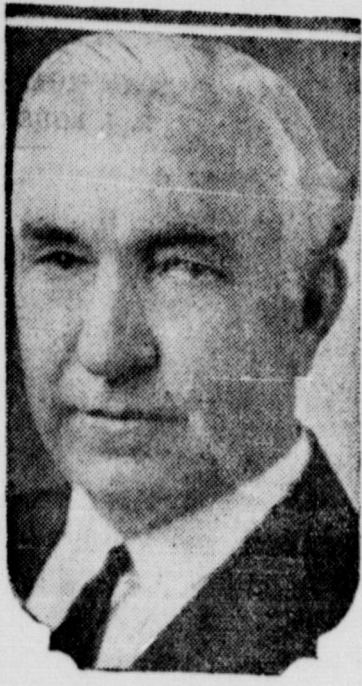

Chevrolets Put Through Freezing Temperatures

The cold room of General Motors Research Laboratories designed to put cars through tests in freezing temperatures is one of the chief reasons for the ability of the Chevrolet six to start easily in all kinds of weather. The cold room was the first of its kind in the automobile industry and was originated 6 years ago by General Motors engineers, since which time it has been used as a pattern by other manufacturers. With the temperature from zero to 45 below, experiments in the cold room can be made singly, and any, with any unit of the car—the manifold, the universal joint, the action of the rear axle, the performance of the fan, the starter, the carburetor, and so on. The engineers are thus able to make a detailed study of how the motor itself reacts to the frigid atmosphere. The cold room consists of capable engineers garbed in aviators' suits, even to helmets, as the temperature in which their work is done is on a par with the bitter cold which fliers are made to undergo at an altitude of 10,000 to 20,000 feet.

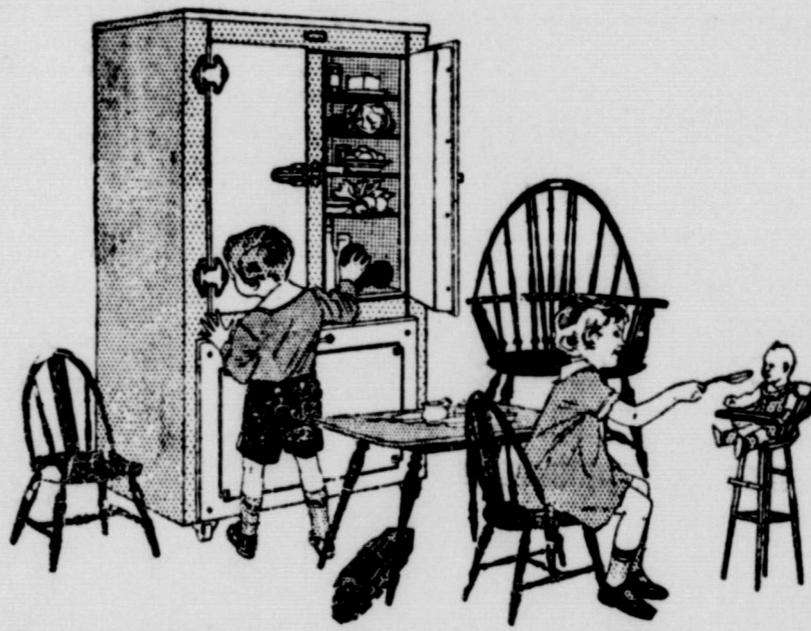

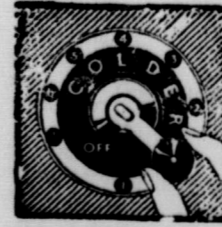

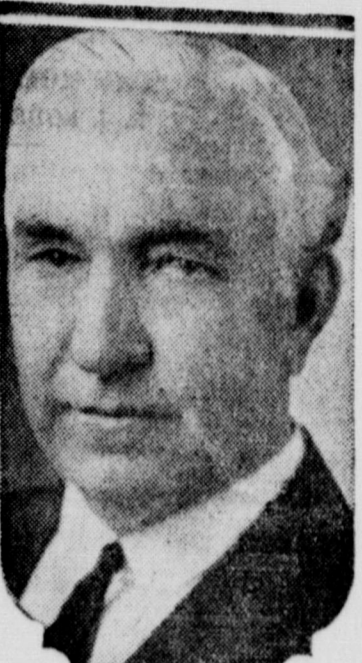

Chevrolets Put Through Freezing Temperatures

The cold room of General Motors Research Laboratories designed to put cars through tests in freezing temperatures is one of the chief reasons for the ability of the Chevrolet to start easily in all kinds of weather. The cold room was the first of its kind in the automobile industry and was originated 6 years ago by General Motors engineers, since which time it has been used as a pattern by other manufacturers.

With the temperature from zero to 45 below, experiments in the cold room can be made singly, and any, with any unit of the car—the manifold, the universal joint, the action of the rear axle, the performance of the fan, the starter, the carburetor, and so on. The engineers are thus able to make a detailed study of how the motor itself reacts to the frigid atmosphere.

The cold room consists of capable engineers garbed in aviators' suits, even to helmets, as the temperature in which their work is done is on a par with the bitter cold which fliers are made to undergo at an altitude of 10,000 to 20,000 feet.

In the opinion of the head of the National Safety Council, the four fundamentals of accident prevention are a belief in safety, acceptance of the principle of personal responsibility by every citizen, an active, not a passive attitude toward the accident menace and leadership to eradicate it.

Automobile accidents are the result of three causes—recklessness, incompetence or ignorance. There are few unpreventable accidents. The tremendous toll in lives taken each year is a shameful illustration of the failure of authorities and citizens to approach the problem from an intelligent angle.

Great industries, such as the railroads, have made amazing success in preventing accidents by study, education and enforcement of working rules.

Legislative accident prevention panaceas such as compulsory liability insurance, begin at the wrong end of the problem by attempting to indemnify instead of prevent. The result has been a tremendous expense to the careful, without accident reduction.

Tests have shown that enforcement of modernized traffic codes will appreciably reduce accidents in a short time. Education of school children has borne fine results in the past few years. Good results follow public interest and cooperation.
