

A NATIONAL PROBLEM

Somebody with a passion for mathematics has figured that the annual fire loss in the United States costs each citizen \$5. This is a graphic way of presenting a problem which ought to be given every consideration by all responsible people during fire

prevention week.

When we are told that each of us is permitting negligence on a national scale to take a \$5 bill from us and reduce it to ashes we are likely to see fire prevention in a new light. This is something that concerns us as well as the neighbor whose premises have been visited by the destructive force. So long as negligence is prevalent in a community all citizens, including the cautious ones, are pay-

ing the fire bills. The last official estimates showed that the average fire death toll was also appalling. The figures for a year put the death toll at 20,000. Studies based on a year's reports produced the conclusion that we build eight new buildings and permit fire to destroy one of them. The national board of underwriters says our annual property loss would if concentrated, amount to total destruction of a city with 10,000 homes and 40,-





Schimmelpfenig, whose poultry farm is near Chaska, Minn., whose electrical service cost him more than the average because of the fact that it required a two-mile line to serve his farm alone. His story gave the details of his farm operations-how he had used it to increase the average of eggs from 100 to 130 to the hen; how he had used it for incubators which gave him, at the same cost of oil burners, a 9 per cent increase in the hatch because of the better heat control; its use for brooding and the sale of two-weeks-old chicks instead of day-old at a considerable profit to him; of an electric milking machine, of electric motor for pumping water and various other power purposes about the place. "I doubt very much whether my farm would be on the profit side of the ledger if it were not for electricity," he said.
