

Of the 83,262 Indian school children in the United States 67,287 attended a school of some kind during he past year.

The recent report of the United States Indian Commissioner indicates that the Indians do very well, with school problems; but there is a suggestion in the report that the matter of suitable employment of the Indians after leaving the school is still an unsolved problem.

There is an old belief that the Indian likes to "return to his blankets," and doubtless many of them still go back to the primitive ways of their people. The Indian Service has never had a developed and tematic organization to help the young Indian to find employment, or an occupation, during the critical period after he leaves school when he should take up the affairs of life for himself.

"Unless the young Indian or wo-man be placed in and becomes adjusted to an occupation adapted to his interest and abilities, then the whole scheme of education and civi-lization fails," says the government



PROTECTION FOR CHILDREN

Seasonal warnings are being broadasted through the press calling on farmers, contractors and builders. and all others who use blasting caps n connection with explosives, to take special care to see that no blasting caps are left about where children can find them. During the past year approximately 500 children maimed or crippled as a result of explosions of blasting caps which they picked up where they had been left y careless workmen. In some cases children were killed.

Statistics gathered on accidents of this nature show that about eighty per cent of them occur in rural or semi-rural districts. Blasting caps eem to have a fascination for many boys, who try to explode them by hammering, picking or throwing them into bonfires. Numbers of cases at law have resulted from the injuries sustained by boys. Parents have sued and obtained damages against companies and individuals who have been responsible for leaving blasting caps carelessly about. But above all, this carelessness takes a serious toll of the children of the country, because it results in loss of eyes, hands, limbs and other injuries which unfit them for useful occupa-


