

Freeze Cuts Citrus Yield in the Valley

Edinburg, Texas, Feb. 3, (UP). Damage done to citrus trees and fruit in the lower Rio Grande valley by the last freeze cannot be determined with any degree of accuracy until at least three months have passed, according to John W. Kirkpatrick,

county farm agent. Two periods of extremely low temperatures preceding the last freeze drove the sap down in the trees and platform. thereby prevented them from being damaged as greatly as they would have been had the last freeze struck without any previous cold weather, he declared.

Young two-year-old trees and large acreages of seedlings have been hurt immeasurably by the cold wave. Bark has been split from the younger trees and is now hanging from the boles. Some orchards suffered worse than others. Fruit in a few orchards was not damaged at all, while growers from various parts of the county declared that all fruit remaining on their trees had been

frozen to varying extents. Approximately 25 farmers day come to the offices of the farm agent asking for advice as to how they should care for their trees. Kirkpatrick says that the only aid that may be given trees is to bind the splintered bark with cloth and then let nature take its course.



The well is in the approximate center of a block of about five thousand acres, originally leased by the Marland Oil Company of Texas and later assigned to the Continental Oil Company.

Annual rentals due upon practically all of the holdings of the larger companies in the county have been paid, which indicates that at least some measure of activity will be continued during the next twelve

The Transcontinental Oil Company has finally completed the acquisition of its block southwest of Crowell, after buying a total of approximately eight thousand acres in that vicinity. This block was orig-inally meant to be much smaller and leasing was begun probably five months ago. As the forming of the block progressed, however, geological reports continued to include the extra acreage in the block. ceeded very probable that this block will be drilled sometime within the next twelve months, although no drilling obligation exists and the company may, if it wishes, hold the blocks by paying the usual annual rentals to the land owners.
