#### Appoint 4 of 5 board members

The agreement establishes the powers and duties of a five-member joint airport board to construct and operate the yet-to-be airport.

Smith, state highway department resident engineer, to a two - year term on the new airport board and Thomas W. Gamblin, local attorney who served on the Chamber's successful airport committee, to a me-year term.

The city named Jimmy Hundley, World War II flyer, to a two-year term on the board and Giles Dalby to a one-year term.

#### Library Week has new meaning here

The philosophy of a successful rebel general in the War Between the States was, "Get there fustest with the mostest."

By straining a point or two, we can see where that Confederate general's philosophy has been adopted by the group of Post people who are doing the spadework for organization of a Garra County chapter of Friends of Texas Librarieswith a public library as their goal.

The library boosters aren't too strong in numbers at the moment, but they expect to gain in numbers-and strength-as the weeks go by.

Right now, members of this group are selfing memberships in the county chapter of Friends of Texas Libraries, the organization of which they expect to complete at a meeting Tuesday night.

The membership fee is \$1 a year and everyone who joins this first year will be a charter

Incidentally, April 17-23 is National Library Week, and what better way could we here in Garza County observe it than by paying our \$1 membership fee in the new library organization-by getting in on the "new library movement," as it is appropriately called.

This new library movement has been making friends and influencing people right along. One of the most encouraging developments yet came last week when the City Council decided to make vacant space in the city hall building available for a library and to ask for remodeling and repaint-

This could well be one of the first major steps in what might one day be a city-county-

library of which any town the size of Post and any county the size of Garza could be proud.

The city hall quarters would not be adequate. of course, for what the new library group has in mind, but it would be a good start and with the proper development the library would grow into what the library boosters do have in mind.

Also, National Library Week is a good time for us to remember that it symbolizes a service and a need that are of the utmost importance in this complex modern world.

A library is many things. It is, first of all, a respository of the thoughts, the wisdoms, the failures and successes, and events great or small which marred or brightened the centuries which have passed. It holds, within its confines, the history of man and nature

A library exists to provide knowledge and understanding. It has no limits-everything ever known under the sun is within its province. A library is timeless, in the sense that it embraces

It is impossible to conceive of a world without libraries. Never in the endless reach of history has knowledge been so important. That is true of the knowledge that lies behind the miracles of science and invention which are transforming life more swiftly than we realize. And it is true, abouve all, of the knowledge that comes out of the past and that deals with the principles and attitudes and values that transcend the material and give true meaning to the existence and perpetuation of mankind.-CD

#### Medicare off to jumbled start

The jumbled start which Medicare is making gives us the shudders.

There doesn't seem to be anybody "in the know" as yet as to exactly how the multi-billion dollar federal health program for the aged will

Congress had to rush through a special bill extending the sign-up for Medicare's voluntary insurance plan and added benefits for 50 days. It had to be done. There were a million Americans over 65 who haven't responded. The trouble is-how to reach those million old folks. They didn't reach them the first time-and they prohably won't the second go-round either unless they devise some new stratgey.

But what bugs us the worst about Medicare is the seeming void which now exists over qualifying hospitals to handle Medicare patients.

One of our hospital trustees told us over the weekend that according to hospital qualifications now known for Medicare that the only hospital in Texas which would qualify would be the big Parkland complex in Dallas.

This is so stupid it almost define comment.

Plans must be devised to qualify virtually every hospital for Medicare patients because those patients need to be as close to home as possible so their family and friends can visit

If Medicare rules for hospitals are too stringent it will throw the hospital situation throughout the nation into complete chaos. The big well-equipped hospitals will be swamped with Medicare patients and won't be able to handle them, or anybody else either.

This doesn't make sense. All of which will be discovered in good time. But it does seem sensible for the government planners to look far enough ahead to see what a mess Medicare is headed for as it draws ever closer to its July

Proper hospital qualification rules should have been drawn up long ago-rules everybody can five hy. Hospitais right now ought to be qualifying for Medicare, not waiting around with the fidgets wondering what comes next.

As we said at the beginning of the editorial, Medicare gives us the shudders.-JC
