### 1967 may well be our turning point

Post and Garza County can look forward to the future - and 1967 in particular - with more confidence than most small towns and rural

The confidence comes from a new unity of purpose which was quite evident here this year with the organization of an \$80,000 industrial foundation for the promotion of new industry, construction of a city-county joint airport, and the start of the Post Public Library, a real "doit-yourself" effort on the part of our public spirit-

Each one of these three projects took a vast amount of planning and work and in the case of the industrial foundation the extra essential ingredient was backing it up with \$80,000 in cash

The three projects are good indicators that this community and area is facing up to its economic challenge "grow or die." This is the challenge faced by all smaller communities as the population trend to the cules continue. The experts tell us it will be another decade or more before the population pendulum will swing the other way-back to the small cities from the too-

In the meantime, the towns which want to survive must find a new unity of purpose among their leaders, a determination to improve living and economic conditions, and a drive and spirit which will carry them forward.

It wasn't a good cotton year, but even here there is hope for something better. The new federal cotton program which has three more years o run is aimed at reducing the huge cotton surplus. 

A. Yes. You report the full amount before any deductions. pensation from the VA?

A. An exemplary rehabilitation certificate may be issued when certain requirements are met such as evidence that over a period of not less than three years the veteran has rehabilitated himself. 
