#### \$17,000 damage suit filed here

A \$17,000 damage suit was filed in Garza District Court here Friday by Robert and Ben Sanchez, two brothers, against an Abilene truck driver as a result of a highway accident north of Post Nov. 30, 1966. Defendant in the case is Cecil Blackburn of Ahilene.

The Sanchezes allege in their petition that Robert, who is 23, was driving a tractor-cotton stripper on FM 122, three and one-half miles north of Post, and had properly signaled a left turn when a large truck and trailer driven by Blackburn coming up from the rear crashed into the stripper while in the turn.

Unusual year faces voters

#### More positions to be filled in each instance

Things are so quiet on Main Street this week that speculation already is beginning as to who will seek city and school offices this spring-even before the two April elections have been officially

It will be an unusual year as voters will name one additional member both to the city council and school board over the normal

FOR THE first time in years, city voters will elect a majority of the city council, with the may or's post and three councilmen's seats up for grabs.

Usually, voters name three to the council each year for two-year terms, but the appointment of D. C. (Billy) Hill last November, to fill the vacancy left by the moving to Houston of Councilman Leo Acker, according to law could be only until the next spring election although Acker's term would have run into 1968.

Mayor Harold Lucas told The Dispatch today that he has "made up his mind" whether or not to seek re-election to the city's highest office but won't announce that decision until the city election is officially called by the city council at their February meeting Monday night. Feb. 6.

#### County needs to pinch every penny

week in The Dispatch by the commissioners court's arrangements with the bank to borrow up to \$85,000 for 1967 operations, is not new.

The trouble has been with us for years and came to a boil well over a year ago.

What happened was that the county over the last few years simply spent more than it took in at the tax window until it found itself a year behind in its finances.

Either it should have raised the "tax take" several years ago or drastically out expenses to make income and outgo balance out.

The county mass collected in the fall, which aboutd he available for 1967 operations, went to may off 1965 berrawing. This not only puts the county behind financially but it adds 5 per cent interest cost for the privilene of operating on somebody size's money

When the court sat down last January and decided to couplize real pro-erty values in the county for the first time in decades, it brought what amounted to hefty tax increases to almost all Garza County taxpayers:

In three to five years the increased tax take was planned to "eatch up" the county's financial. status so it would no longer by a year behind.

It doesn't yet seem to be working out, however. From all indications we can get, fund balances are in no better shape this January with

The county's financial plight, headlined last increased taxes than they were in January a

Which means more tax money was spent for operations-and no real gain made in "catching up" the county

It should now be crystal clear for everyone that the only way the county can ever work its way out to pinch every penny it can in operations.

When individuals lose income they are forced to cut expenses. The same must apply to all levels of government. There is no justification for increase of taxes when the taxpayers are finding that tax money mighty hard to come by unless it is absolutely essential.

A reorganized county commissioners court with two new members is now facing the problem. It is not something to be "forgotten" from January to January either by the court or by the

The county hudget needs to be stared at and worked over every month-every time the court

Frugal operations are essential. The court must keep this unpermost in mind. So must citizens in making any demands for county funds.

Emphasis for the next several years now must be squarely placed on how best to cut expenses, not in considering how to incur any

#### VD control plan taking shape

It always has been a "hard fight with a short stick" when the public schools have tried to take a part in educational and control camgains against venereal disease, but the time may be near for things to start looking up along those

The Texas Medical Association is preparing for an intensive VD educational and control campnign which has the potential of becoming one of the most extensive such programs in the na-

Saturday of this week, a joint Action Conference on Venereal Disease will be sponsored by the TMA, Texas Department of Health, Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce and Texas Parent-Teacher Association.

Attending Saturday's conference will be the key officers and committee chairmen of 11 state organizations which already are actively working in, or have adopted policy action statements about venereal disease control.

The conference is designed to stimulate the state organizations to greater effort and activity. and to coordinate programs in a more effective approach to controlling VD.

It is hoped that this conference will result in public schools officials having more freedom in educational campaigns in the schools against VD. Many of them in the past have drawn criticism from patrons for "subjecting" the students to films, talks, assemblies, etc., on VD control. William F. Shiver, superintendent of the Post schools, told The Dispatch, "We move against VD at every opportunity by showing an occasional film and in other ways, but we rarely escape criticism for it."

The cold facts are that an estimated 140,000 Texans are infected by VD each year; that for the four-month period from July through October. 1966. Texas was one of only two states showing a significant increase in reported infectious gyphilist that Texas reported the second highest number of infectious cases and the largest number of venereally infected teen-agers during that same

This information alone should be enough to provide the impetus for a coordinated multiphased education program in this state. Venercal disease isn't something that will go away just by being shuddered at -CD


