The First National Bank topped the \$11,000,000 mark in total deposits for the first time as of the close of its 1968 business Tuesday afternoon. The new deposits record is


\$11,068,549.82. This is over a million dollars more than the 1967 deposit peak

Effective Jan. 1, social security payment deductions from wage and salary checks rose to 4.8 per cent of earnings up to \$7,800. This means that any employe with earnings up to \$7,800 will pay \$174.40 in social security taxes. Employers will pay an equal amount. Thus, the total tax take in the name of "social security" will reach nearly 10 per cent of taxable payrolls.

Under the increase, nearly 10 per cent of every dollar up to maximum taxable earnings will go to the federal government to pay for social security and medicare-as much as \$748.80 per-

One of the great joys of the beginning of a new year is the fact that we have the privilege of starting over again. It gives us another chance in every area of our lives.

God created our world in such a manner that man could always have a chance to start anew. The Apostle Paul wrote in the book of Philippians words that gave direction and meaning to a new beginning. "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before. I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 3:13-14).

In these words Paul was telling us that he had not reached the ultimate, or the goal, for there was still much to be done. Surely every person would say that concerning his life for the past year. We have not reached the ultimate as individuals, as churches, nor as a community in the things that we set out to do some twelve months ago. "This one thing I do" is evidence that he knows if victory is to be achieved then he is going to have to place all of his energy, work, and effort into the thing. He realized that he could not afford to scatter his life out in all directions and still accomplish anything.

The second thing that is necessary in the new beginning is the ability to cultivate a wise forgetfulness of the past. "Forgetting those things which are behind" is absolutely necessary to a new beginning. Our past blunders, losses, injuries, sorrows, and our sins are to be wisely forgotten. Yes, even the wrongs that we consider others have done to us or to our cause must be put behind, and wisely forgotten. If these things are not wisely forgotten then they will drag us back to their level and we cannot start over again.

The third part of the new beginning is a right anticipation. "Reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark . . ." With great eagerness and earnestness the Apostle was able to see the goal that was before him, and set his sights there. Everything was behind him and he could do nothing about it, but the prize he sought was still in front of him, and he could strive toward that with all of his energy.

God has given us a new year and a chance for a new beginning, and we must ask ourselves just what we will do with the opportunity and privilege to start all over again.
