HOW MUCH TO REAR A KID?

(Editor's Note: "Our Readers Write" column is indebted to Louise Herring of San Angelo, formerly of Post, for the following clipping on a subject "dear to the hearts" of most of us.)

Dear Uncle Sam:
Hey, Uncle, how much does it cost to rear a kid? You allow us tax-paying parents only \$600 a year to clothe, feed, house and train a youngster. In your federal Jobs Corps you spend \$7,000 a year! Now which is the correct figure? Either we're allowing you too much or you're not allowing us enough.

You allow tax-paying parents \$600 deduction for the care and feeding of each child. Yet, under the Cuban refugee program you assume minimum upkeep requires \$1,200 a year, and if the Cuban boy or girl is attending school an extra \$1,000 a year.

How come you short change the home folks, Uncle? In the austere environs of a federal prison, you have discovered that it costs to maintain one person, with no frills, no luxuries and no borrowing Dad's car, \$2,300 per year. By what rule of thumb do you estimate that Mom and Dad can do it for one-fourth of that amount?

Under Social Security, you will pay \$150 a month to maintain the elderly. What makes you think we can maintain our young'uns for \$50 a month? And, Uncle, your Vista (Volunteers in Service to America) program spent \$3.1 million last year to train only 202 trainees. That indicates that the cost of maintaining and training one you-

th for one year is more than \$15,000. Then how come we taxpayers get an exemption of only \$600 to maintain and train one youth for a

year?

Or let's see how much you spent upkeeping one youngster in military uniform. House, \$55 a month. Food, \$30.27 a month. Clothing upkeep, \$4.20 a month. That comes to \$1,074.04 a year. How in the world do you expect parents to provide all these things, plus clothes, recreation, books, medicine, for \$600 a year? With your figures, Uncle, you admit it can't be done.

Is it possible, Uncle Sam, that you expect us parents to manage more efficiently than you do? With all-out expenses, we American individuals have more than enough in savings to offset our debts. You don't.

Regardless of how we try to rationalize and explain you and excuse you, it is still a hurtful affront when you allow us working, dues-paying home folks only \$600 a year to rear a legitimate child, while you, under ADC will pay more than \$800 a year to upkeep an illegitimate one.

Oil allowable cut for month of September

AUSTIN — The Railroad Commission has set the September statewide oil production allowable at 41.3 per cent of potential, the second straight reduction in the flow.

The September percentage factor will permit maximum production of 3,213,193 barrels daily, compared with 3,414,999 in August under a 44.8 per cent allowable.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR17)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graded or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall

have printed on them the following:

"FOR the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

"AGAINST the amendment of Article III of the Constitution to provide that Dallas County may issue road bonds under Section 52 of Article III upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and to provide that bonds hereafter or hereinafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be determined by the Legislature to be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services for:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;

"(4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define

the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 51 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

BACK TO SCHOOL WITH POST LIBRARY: Acquisition Chairman Helen Cornish has just placed a large order with Campbell and Hall, book suppliers, for new junior and young adult non-fiction selections. The new books should be in the library by the middle part of September — just in time for those school themes coming up.

An interesting item passed on by Editor Charlie Didway: "How to Open a Book" from "Modern Bookbinding." "Hold the book with its back on a smooth or covered table; let the front board down, then the other, holding the leaves in one hand while you open a few leaves at the back, then a few at the front, and so on, alternately opening back and front, gently pressing open the sections till you reach the center of the volume. Do this two or three times and you will obtain the best results. Open the volume violently or carelessly in any one place and you will likely break the back and cause a start in the leaves. Never force the back of the book.

I almost fainted. He had broken the back of the volume and it had to be rebound."

from the State Capitol

AUSTIN — Texas Democratic party politics are in the national spotlight again — this time at Chicago during the national Demo convention.

Hearings were scheduled Wednesday before the convention credentials committee on a liberal group's demand that the Texas delegation led by Gov. John Connally be reconstituted to insure proportional representation of ethnic groups.

Texas Democrats for an Open Convention also asked for scrapping of the unit rule under which all the state's delegates are bound to vote as the majority determines. Delegates were instructed at the state convention in Dallas June 11 to vote normally as favorite candidates.

For president until he leaves town. After release, all 134 vote-carrying unit probably will go to Hubert Humphrey.

TDOC in a brief filed with the credentials committee, demands 50 seats — 48 per cent of the delegation. Proportional representation is asked for Negroes, Mexican-Americans and non-conservative loyal Democrats who have always supported the party. Delegation now includes six Negro delegates and 11 alternates and five Mexican-American delegates and five alternates, but TDOC claims they are "unrepresentative of their communities."

Most active TDOC members are supporters of Sen. Eugene McCarthy for president. McCarthy backers also have filed challenges in Alabama, Connecticut, Indiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, Georgia and Washington.

Decision of the committee will not be known until next week, and challenges likely will go to the convention floor. Connally forces maintain the Texas delegation is representative and was selected at a fair state convention which they counted 2,835 votes to 490.

TEXAS REPUBLICANS — Despite the fact that only two Republican presidential nominees have ever carried Texas, Richard Nixon's chances appear to be as high as 50-50 — depending largely on whom the Democrats nominate.

First successful Republican in Texas was Herbert Hoover in 1928, carrying the state by 367,000 votes to 341,000. Dwight Eisenhower was the only other GOP'er to win a majority of Texans, in 1952 and 1956.

However, there are several factors which could shake up Texas' habit of going with the Democrat. One is the fact that, in 1960, Nixon missed carrying the state by a slim 46,000 votes — and Lyndon Johnson the Democratic vice-presidential nominee.

And since Hubert Humphrey — almost certain to be the Democratic nominee — is known as being even more liberal than John F. Kennedy and Johnson, Texas' traditionally conservative-to-moderate voters could easily find Nixon more attractive.

This should be especially true since Nixon picked Maryland Gov. Spiro Agnew for the No. 2 spot on his ticket, and the two appear to be running a "law and order campaign" to offset the influence of American Party Candidate George Wallace.

Also of course, Nixon will have the challenger's advantage of being able to attack the incumbent administration on touchy issues — in this case, the war in Vietnam, the monetary crisis and the racial situation in big cities.

On the other hand, Humphrey will have several pluses in his column when Texans go to vote a November. One could be his vice-presidential pick, who many people think Gov. Connally has a good shot at.

Another will be Wallace's candidacy. As an extreme right-wing-

er, Wallace will probably draw considerably more votes away from Nixon than from Humphrey, and some estimates of Wallace's vote are as high as 50 per cent in West and East Texas and 30 per cent in Central Texas.

SEWAGE TREATMENT GRANTS — Eighty-five Texas cities have filed applications totaling \$12,235,000 for \$10 million worth of federal grants to help local governments build sewage-treatment facilities.

Most of the grants will be for 33 per cent of the total project price, with the local governments furnishing the remainder of the funds.

Texas Water Quality Board administers the program for the U.S.

COMMUNITY ACTION AGENCIES — U.S. Office of Economic Opportunity will continue to recognize the seven local community-action agencies which Attorney General Martin says are illegally constituted until legal action is taken to disqualify them.

County commissioners courts participated in the organization of the seven agencies and Martin's opinion said Texas law would not allow counties to take official part in such activities.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SR21)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

"(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving permissive authority to the Texas Legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation by the State of Texas and its political subdivisions equipment installed on real property to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions and water effluents, provided that the capital investment in such equipment complies with the air and water quality standards established by the State of Texas."
