### Will we get Mississippi River Water? The problems of moving Mississippi River

It certainly isn't cheerful to look forward to, but the Ogallala formation, which furnishes the underground water that supports the South Plains' agricultural economy is going to be depleted by 1985 or 1990.

When that happens, what will West Texas and New Mexico do for water? The immediate need, we are told, will be from 7 to 8 million acre-feet of water a year, and by the year 2020, the need will be up to about 18 million acre-feet annually. That is more water than that impounded by all the present reservoirs in Texas.

Joe G Moore, Texas Water Development head, says the answer to this question should beforthcoming soon in the first federal report on a proposal to move Mississippl River water to West Texas, possibly by atomic power.

Moore said the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation is expected to make at least a preliminary reportduring this session of Congress.

The question now before the bureau is whether to pursue the idea of building a network of canals, pumping stations and reservoirs across several states to furnish irrigation water to the South Plains.

water to West Texas are as enormous as the proposal. Between the Mississippi and West Texas, the

water would have to be lifted a total of 3,300 feet. That would require 60 or 70 pumping stations if the canal route follows the Red River basin, which appears to be the most logical route at present.

Pumping the water would require more energy than the total electric energy output of Texas at present. Moore said. "We may have to consider atomic power as a source for this energy.

Another big problem is that the withdrawal of water from the Mississippi would have to be regulated to keep the river navigable and to maintain enough flow to keep salt water out of the New Orleans water supply. This problem, Moore said, "led us to the conclusion that we probably could pump only about seven months out of the year and those months don't necessarily coincide with the irrigation season."


So, when and if those of use who are still around see Mississippi River water moving to West Texas, we may well be looking upon one of the new seven wonders of the world .-- CD

### Our cotton seen in different light

image in the nation's cotton industry has begun to fade, and that's encouraging.

At the National Cotton Council's Beltwide Production and Mechanization Conference held Jan. 11-12, three of the featured speakers called attention to great strides being taken on the Plans toward solutions of the area's problems, and a fourth candidly admitted past USDA errors in assessing market demand for the shorter staple cottons for which the Plains has been noted.

Speaking on "Progress in Variety Improvement," one of the speakers. Dr. Levon L. Ray, agronomist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, pointed out 1967 moreases in both



Something over 35 per cent of the Plains crop in 1967 will staple an inch or longer, and Dr. Ray stated that possibly as much as half the 1968 crop will be 1-1/32 inches or longer.

Pressley, or fiber strength, went from an average of 73,000 pounds per square inch in 1966 to over 79,000 psi in the current crop year. This, too, is due for improvement as producers switch to varieties with longer and stronger fiber potentinh

There's still a ways to go before the Plains will be singled out as a model area of cotton production, but losing that "problem child" image staple length and fiber strength, and left no doubt certainly is a long step in the right direction --CD

## Bushes must be beat for best prospects

IN THIS WORLD

(Editor's Note: This is the fift and final in a series of articles from the Texas Industrial Commission on the five major points considered necessary to a community getting new industry.)

#### By JAMES J. RELLY Assistant Executive Director **Texas Industrial Commission**

If you have read the first four 'points" in this series, you will understand why vigorous prospecting for new industries should begin in earnest only after these four concepts have been given full consideration and at least partially implemented.

Community betterment programs must be under way, ideally with a long range plan and set of goals for the community

Research and analysis must have been carried out, resulting in the identification of "candidate" industries.

All available means of financing must have been examined and, preferably, an Industrial Foundation formed.

Sites and buildings must have been inventoried and evaluated in terms of your "candidate" indus-

THESE FOUR points are on-going processes and should be well under way before concerted prospecting will be worthwhile. However, because industrial development is a very long - term, continuous process, every community that has a program must inevitably get out and beat the bushes for prospects.
