Accomplishments were impressive

get through in the Texas Legislature's final regular session, which was Monday and is all over now as you read this Saturday-written editorial. But, most of the legislators' far-reaching record of achievement in many areas had been accomplished before the final hectic day.

No one can deny that there were some notable failures. But the accomplishments were im-

Here is a random look at some of the session's highlights.

BUDGET-Lawmakers agreed on \$2,400,000,-000 in spending (\$446,800,000 from general revenue) for 1968, without passing a tax bill. They will come back next year to budget for 1969. Funds provide for substantial increases in all areas of state government, including education, health, general administration and welfare.

SCHOOL TEACHERS - After requesting a \$68,000,000 salary increase program and being offered \$55,500,000 by the Senate, teachers finally

STATE EMPLOYES-These workers came up with their most substantial salary benefits in history. Raises averaged about 14 per cent and sanged up to 30 per cent and more in some sal-

MEDICAID-Title 19 hospitalization and medical aid to the needy-most dramatic step in public welfare since launching of social securitywas implemented for Texas by passage of a speceal act and appropriation of nearly \$25,000,000.

EDUCATION - Money was made available for 2,300,000 public school pupils and a 26 per

cent increase in higher education spending. Junior college appropriations were increased from \$13,600,000 to \$24,400,000.

CITY SALES TAX - Cities got the authority they sought to supplement their property tax income by levying one per cent sales tax on vote of their citizens after next August.

TRAFFIC SAFETY - Major part of Gov. John Connally's recommended highway safety program was approved. It included a new drivers' license act, an auto inspection bill and establishment of a traffic program to be administered by the Governor

OPEN MEETINGS - Another Texas legislative first, an act to require open meetings of governmental agencies at all levels was signed into law by the governor, who termed it " a great step forward to provide a means whereby the public can be more informed on governmental and public affairs."

REAPPORTIONMENT - Legislators agreed on both congressional and state House of Representatives redistricting. However, they could not get together on judicial reapportionment.

SUNDAY CLOSING - Lawmakers tightened Sunday closing laws by repealing the "emergency purchase" provisions of the old law.

Key recommendations of Governor Connally which failed to clear the Legislature included his proposal for legalized sale of liquor by the drink.

The bill to legalize parimutuel wagering on horse races never came to a showdown vote, but a referendum on the issue was approved for inclusion on next May's Democratic and Republican primary election ballots.

Garbage disposal 'two-way street'

City of Post officials request householders to cooperate to the fullest on trash disposal regulations, now that warmer weather is here with flies and mosquitoes posing a threat to the community's health.

Residents are asked to deposit their trash in trash cans and to keep the lids on the cans until the garbage is picked up by the trash haulers. They are asked not to pile trash on the alleys nor to deposit it in pasteboard boxes or other makeshift receptacles.

City officials admit that there have been justifiable complaints from some householders

of the city's trash haulers being careless with trash cans and lids after dumping the garbage into the disposal truck. This has resulted, they say, in cans being bent to where the lid does not fit at it should, and also in some lids being lost.

Like everything else, the trash problem is a "two-way street." If the householder is to be expected to "do it right" in getting his trash on the alley for hauling away, then certainly the sanitation department employes should be expected to see to it that the trash cans are back in place after their contents are dumped into the
