Hospital is turned down for renewal of Medicare

Unpaid billings total \$13,000

Hospital trustees and Administrator Kenneth Sledge haven't giv-en up the fight, but - unofficially. as of new - Garza Memorial Hos-

Medicare billings since Dec. 18. It was at the conclusion of the

Dec. 18 inspection of the hospital for Medicare that the inspector

virtually assured trustees federal approval would be forthcoming. Since last Friday, the hospital has lost eight medicare patients who probably would rather be in the Garza Memorial Hospital than anywhere else.

The Medicare inspector who assured hospital authorities here of approval for the federal program shortly after the hospital had reopened is no longer with Medicare. He was reported to have been dismissed for advising hospitais they could expect approval at the close of his inspections.

Administrator Sledge finally learned of the hospital's rejection by Medicare last week in a long distance telephone query to Medcare authorities.





Library easy on delinquent borrowers

Friends of a Public Library are hopeful that certain length of time.

the library's new drive-in- window service at the City Hall will help get library books back on time

The drive-in window is certainly a convenience to library users and if it does belp get books. back on time. If might well prove to be one of the best gimmicks the library has come up with since it was established.

Slowness in neturning library books is universal. Many tolks who are principled to the point of annoyance in other things are unprincipled about retarming books barrowed from the library.

The library staff made it easy on delinquent book berrowers a few months are by outling out the collection of fines in overdise books. It is, doubiful, however, that this generous gesture has helped get books back on time

It should though if for no other reason than that very few public libraries are as easy on. their renders as the Post library, and local book. borrowers should show their approxiation by taking their books back when they are due.

As an example of what we're getting at, let's, take Stamford, Texas, where the city council has passed an emergency measure making it a misdemeanor to keep library books out beyond a

As in the library here and in most other towns, books are checked out of the Stamford library for two weeks. If a book is not returned. at the end of three weeks, a notice is sent out. This is followed by another notice at the end of another week

The new Stamford ordinance provides for the city to mail a registered letter to the borrower a wook after the second notice. If the book is not returned within two weeks after the registered letter is multed by the city, a charge of misdemeanor will be filed against the borrower.

The ordinance provides that a fine of as much ar \$200 may be levied upon conviction.

Also included in the ordinance are provisions for providing penalties for damaging books, manuscripts, records and periodicals.

Goodness knows, being a frequent offender purself, we're not trying to put ideas in the library staff's head about what should be done in regard to overdue books. We're merely attempting to show procrastinating book-returners why they should be appreciative enough of the library's good nature to return their books within at least a reasonable length of time after they are due. What if they lived in Stamford?-CD
