OS Ranch marker dedication to be Saturday at Green Tank

The OS Ranch, southeast of Post, site of the election organizing Garza County in 1907, will be commemorated at 5 p. m. Saturday, April 22, with the dedication of a Texas State Historical Marker at the Green Tank roadside park, about eight miles southeast of Post on U. S. Hwy. 84.

Erection of the 14 by 24-inch cast aluminum marker was sponsored by the Garza County Historical Survey Committee.

Mrs. A. C. Surman, committee chairman, said families attending the ceremony are asked to bring a picnic lunch and folding chairs. In case of inclement weather, the dedication ceremony will be held at the county 4-H building in Post.

Winnie Tuffing, chairman of the History Appreciation observance now under way here, will serve as master of ceremonies for the following program:

Invocation: The Rev. George L. Miller, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church.

Song: Post Music Club.

Presentation of historical marker: Giles C. McCrary.

Response from Highway Department: Oscar Crain of Lubbock, district highway engineer.

Acceptance and dedication of marker: County Judge J. E. Parker.

History of marker: Walter Duckworth.

Cowboy songs: Post Music Club.

Old-time fiddling: Pioneer musicians.

Roundup of memories of pioneers: Conducted by Mrs. Mary Florence Cross.

Benediction: Sung by Post Music Club.

Coffee will be served from a church wagon to go with the picnic supper. Members of the Post Junior Chamber of Commerce will serve free cold drinks.

Occupational survey will be made in area

An occupational survey of the Post Independent School District is getting under way this week following an orientation meeting of the survey committee with Walter Douglas, a representative of the Texas Education Agency, Monday night.

The results of the occupational survey will be used in planning future vocational course offerings.

Members of the local committee, who will call on business men, farmers and ranchers in conducting the survey, are Robert Craig, Clarence Gunn, Malcolm T. Bull, Jimmy Bird and Ronald Babb.

The occupational survey comes as the result of a request from school officials that a second unit of vocational agriculture be approved by the TEA for Post High School.

School Supt. William F. Shiver told the school board at its regular April meeting that it appears the required number of students will sign up for vocational agriculture for a second state-supported unit to be established for the 1967-68 school year.

The results of the occupational survey will be sent to the survey director at Austin for compilation, upon which the TEA's recommendation will be based.

The number of persons working in each non-professional occupation in the school district, and the number needed in each occupation immediately, in 12 months, 24 months and 36 months in excess of those currently employed is the information sought by the survey.

Douglas told the survey committee members to stress to the employers they interview that "this is confidential information . . . and that no one other than professional school people will see his survey form."

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Don Kinard, principal at the Post Elementary School, said today he had accepted a position as principal at the Ash Elementary School in Plainview.

Kinard taught three years at Plainview following his graduation from Wayland College in 1959. He came to Post from Seminole last summer to take the principal's job here.

The Kinards will move to Plainview this summer. Mrs. Kinard, who is teaching here this school year, does not plan to teach at Plainview, her husband said.

Slaying suspect was fined here on DWI charge

Jack Brown, 25-year-old Texas Tech freshman who was charged Tuesday in Lubbock with murder with malice in the bludgeoning death of his parents at their farm home near Shallowater, pleaded guilty here last fall in county court to a charge of driving while intoxicated.

Brown was arrested the night of July 2, 1966, on the DWI charge by Highway Patrolman Max Knox, courthouse records show.

Sheriff L. E. (Fay) Claborn told The Dispatch that on the evening of July 2 he received a call that Brown was questioning operators of local beer taverns about their beer licenses while posing as a liquor control agent.

Claborn said he brought Brown to his office and questioned him about the beer license inquiries and was told by Brown that "any citizen has the right" to ask questions about licenses. The sheriff said Brown was sober at that time.

An hour later Brown was arrested on the DWI charge, Claborn recalled.

Brown was listed on the arrest complaint under the name Dolphus Jack Brown.

He pleaded guilty Oct. 28 to the DWI charge just prior to the case being called in court for jury trial. He was fined \$100 and costs by Judge J. E. Parker and granted a six months probation on a three-day jail sentence.

The guilty plea came only after Judge Parker denied a defense motion by George B. Gilkerson, Brown's attorney, to quash the complaint and information. A defense motion to suppress also was filed the same day, alleging illegal arrest, illegal search and illegal detention.

The motion to suppress alleged the illegalities because the arrest of Brown was alleged without a warrant and without any offense being committed in the presence or view of officers making the arrest.

Murder suspect's arraignment set

Ray Teel, charged here with murder in the April 10 knife slaying of his ex-wife, Mrs. Edith Robinson, is scheduled to be brought to Post from the Lubbock County jail May 8 for arraignment before District Judge Truett Smith, Sheriff L. E. (Fay) Claborn said today.

Judge Smith is expected to appoint a local attorney at that time to represent Teel if he asks for a court-appointed attorney.

No arrangements have been made for a special grand jury to be called in the case, Sheriff Claborn said.

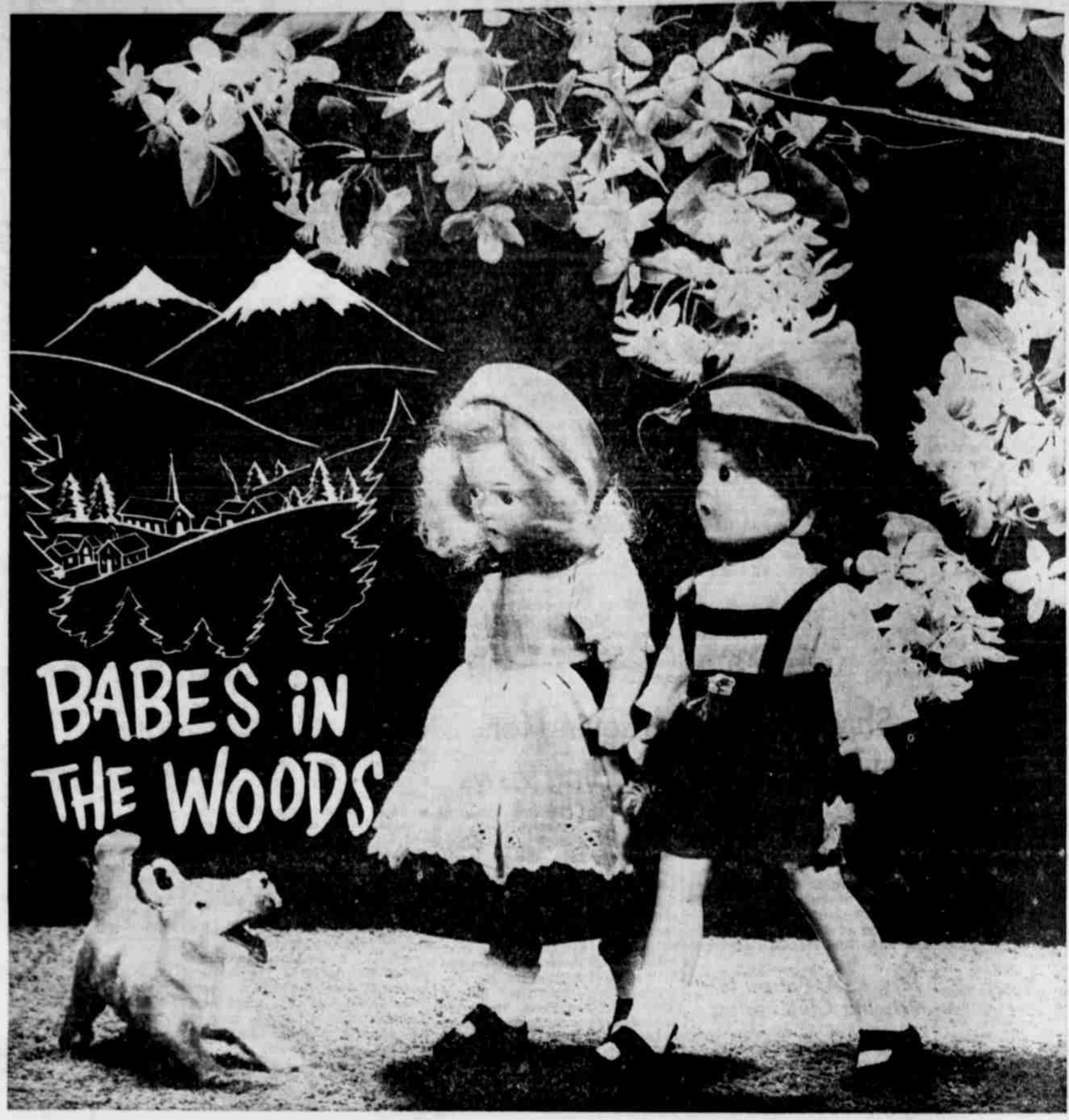

Notaries Public reappointment is due next month

Secretary of State John L. Hill announced that all qualified notaries public desiring reappointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967, and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the county clerk of his residence between May 1, 1967, and May 15, 1967, inclusive.

Hill emphasized that notaries public should not send requests for reappointment or for commissions directly to the secretary of state inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the county clerks approve notary bonds and forward copies of the application to the secretary of state. Each person applying for a com-

mission as notary public must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required application forms may be obtained from the county clerk.

Secretary of State Hill further stated that any person not now a notary public who desires appointment for the beginning of the term should apply to his county clerk before May 20, 1967.

A Colorful Past

C. W. Post, founder of our town, was a man of vast energy and vision.

Establishing this community as a unique colonization experiment in the spring of 1907—60 years ago—Mr. Post's principal efforts were prophetic of what was to come for West Texas.

He drilled for oil and stopped just 300 feet above one of the many oil wells which 60 years later was to see over 1,600 oil wells in Garza County. Wells within the city limits are now pumping from five different pay zones.

He conducted a wide variety of agricultural experiments and pioneered irrigation in this region. Today, irrigation is the backbone of the High Plains cotton industry. Following behind his farm experiments have come scientists and organizations to help improve the cotton which he first planted in this cattle country.

C. W. founded the Postex Cotton Mills which have grown and expanded through the town's 60 year history into the community's leading industry — and the largest cotton mills west of the Mississippi River.

He brought the Santa Fe railroad to Post and fought unsuccessfully to win Tech's campus, which years later was founded in nearby Lubbock.
