#### Let's reawaken auditorium interest

It's time everybody got Post's municipal auditorium proposition back into focus.

For months now the city has been awaiting a clear legal title to the former bowling alley building before paying the purchase price and taking ownership.

During this period of time, considerable has been accomplished, but certainly far less than could have been done had the city taken the building by purchase. The auditorium board of directors has established some rules of operation and set a rental price because it is only from these funds that building expenses can now be

We hear the insurance firm balieves it is close to clearing the title so that the city can complete the purchase.

When this happens everybody should be ready to shift into high gear.

Visiting with members of the auditorium board, we were told the board hopes to visit communities in the area to see how they are handling such community centers and how they are meeting the same kind of problems which always crop up.

Biggest complaint at present to the municipal auditorium operation is the rental cost per night.

If the auditorium can be placed on some type of firm financial footing, the building could be made available for use without a rental cost which now prohibits its use for many functions.

The municipal auditorium board last week presented a budget request to the city seeking \$17,000 over five years for a systematic devel-

opment of the building's facilities. Clubs and organizations have not rushed forward, except a few instances, to offer financial assistance.

The Dispatch is convinced of several things which it wishes to propose in meeting the auditorium problem:

First, during the interim period in which the building has remained in the ownershp of the insurance firm, a lot of the community momentum for an auditorium has been lost-and needs to be regained.

Second, that as soon as the city takes ownership of the building the city council should decide the degree of control it wishes to retain over the auditorium and delegate the remainder of it to the auditorium board of directors.

Third, that both the council and board refrain from putting restrictions upon the use of the building that would prevent its full use by all responsible organizations.

Fourth, that the operation of the municipal auditorium be placed on firm financial footing Certainly, a five-year development of the facilities is needed, as auditorium directors proposed to the council, but perhaps an even more comprehensive agreement needs to be reached concerning auditorium finances.

Essentially, what is needed now is a reawakening of interest in the auditorium by the community as a whole and a coordinated effort to put this fine building to its widest possible use as an auditorium and community center.

The municipal auditorium board has worked hard during the interim period and deserves wholehearted community support -JC







However, past experience shows that God has amazing powers of recovery. Considerable ferment both inside and outside the church seems to indicate signs of new health. Why not stop by church next Sunday and see how the patient is coming along?

#### Early plantings prevents root rot

cotton planting and root rot "escape" could be combined to give root rot control plus higher yields, De Luther S. Hird, professor in Texas A&M University's Plant Sciences Department, says.

"Work here has shown that cor ion can be planted two to three weeks earlier than usual and the damage by the root rot fungus can he lowered. By moving the planting date up to about the middle of March instead of early April, we have had good results at picking time," he says.

By early planting the cotton can reach the stage where there is about three to four weeks free of disease during July. The cotton can set and mature bolls before it begins to die and the yield is not

One particular strain tested here has withstood freezing temper atures and progress is being made. to breed this cold-tolerance into other cotton strains, according to the professor.

"Escape" from cotton root rot is an inherited factor of certain plants and although the process is complicated, progress is being made in breeding the cold-tolerant cotton with the cotton which has this "escape" factor, he says.

Not only can earlier planting lower the incidence of root rot, but the earlier maturing process can take advantage of the moisture which comes earlier in the season Bird points out.

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
