Even though the situation is changing, a producer must not abandon sound agronomic planning needed to produce profitable returns from his investments in plant nutrients. The principle of applying nutrients according to the soil and crop requirements still hold.

Better planning, more lead time and alternative combinations of analysis as well as methods of application will need consideration of analysis as well as methods of application will need consideration by producers. For example, it may be more economical to make more than one application in order to get the best combination of nutrients and make the supply go over more acres. We canplying nutrients that are not needed - - - - primarily for convenience. Perhaps the most meaning-

ful statement that can be made about nitrogen fertilizer materials is that their use requires a higher level of management skill than either phosphorus or potassium fertilizers, if optimum efficiency is to be attained. Nitrogen is used in larger amounts than any other essential nutrient. Nitrogen usually does not accumulate in soils except in the form of organic matter.

Most of the nitrogen taken up from the soil by plants is in the nitrate form. Soil conditions that are favorable for the biological conversion of ammonium nitrogen to nitrate n'-

What, the, of fall applied ni-trogen? Producers should make an effort to provide the needed nitrogen at a time that will most adequately meet the crop requirements. Fall and winter application may not be the best time to apply nitrogen fertilizers for field crop such as cotton, grain sorghum and corn. Fall applications of the crop requirement should be considered only in those areas where soil temperatures remain less than 50 degrees F. three to weeks before planting, where winter rain fall is expected to be low.

The foregoing is not meant to imply that early application nitrogen is hopeless, it should, however, be recognized that certain hazards are involved and that every effort be made to follow proven agronomic and soil management



The House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on National Security Policy and Scientific Developments opended hearings on the legislation today.

In testimony submitted to the subcommittee, Price said, "The record is clear. The North Vietnamese signed agreements designed to facilitate the full accounting of U.S. Servicemen Missing in Action during the recent military activity in Southeast Asia. They have not lived up to those agreements.

another important soil nutrient and that is phosphorus. A history of five or more years of annual application of 50 to 60 or more pounds of P2 O5 per acre per year has contributed at least 250 to 300 pounds of P2O5 per acre. Since crop removal is generally less than this, a buildup of phosphorus occurred and further additions may not produce any increased yields for sometime.

Apply phosphorus in the most efficient manner to obtain best results. Phosphorus can beapplied to soils considerably ahead of the growing season. Phosphors can be banded in the fall for spring planted crops and show good results in the growing season.

Producers are urged to use fertilizer at the recommended rate and to strive for maximum efficiency and if these steps are followed that will probably be plenty of fertilizer to go around.




