Others were made by the use of a periscope which enabled him to photograph the cenes over his shoulder.



Beds reserved for annuals (flower or vegetable) should be deeply spaded and the soil left rough for he winter. Stones removed in the all will obviate raking in spring

Don't forget to keep adding to the compost pile every leaf that falls. Whether it be a tree, shrub or evergreen, it should be added to the pile. All the refuse plants from your vegetable garden, provided they are not seriously diseased, should be added to the pile October 21st. Registration hours If you do not like the looks, cover it with a very thin layer of soil There is no need for adding lime If you do not mix garbage in the pile, there will be nothing to attract flies; and unless you have some seeds in it, it will not even tempt rats and mice. By next fall you will have a fine lot of humus to spade into the soil to loosen it or put on top of the ground as a
