The goal of Operation Clean Sweep

A pioneer Post resident who cares told us last year in returning from a train trip that "Post is the dirtiest town I ever saw from a train win-

It is doubtful if the highway traveler could think much better of our town looking at it from the "front side."

This is what Operation Clean Sweep is all

Next week this is to be a town-sized clean-up in which not only does the property owner look after his own property but is asked as a good neighbor to look after his neighbor's, too, if the neighbor needs assistance.

But Operation Clean Sweep, conceived by a group of local women, is more than that.

Post's shaggy, unkempt look is greatly compounded by 62 "abandoned houses" which gives 2 neighborhoods a desolate look, 100 junk cars scattered around town-an obvious blight to any attempt at tidiness, and over 200 vacant lots uncared for over the winter which together have collected several tons of trash blown about by tall and winter winds.

Operation Clean Sweep hopes to do some sweeping here, too. The women will be asking

junk car owners to voluntarily permit those junk cars to be hauled off to the junk yard where they belong. They are asking the city to cooperate by tearing down those abandoned hulks of houses of Post's early oil days. They will be asking lot owners to shred their lots and the city to do it if the property owners don't.

In other words, the clean-up jobs Post hasn't ever tackled really are going to be "continuing projects" for the women this summer.

If they can carry these three projects to successful conclusion Post-with YOUR HELP-can be clean again.

Next week is the week to get your home and business clean-ups accomplished.

The women are asking you to "be neighborly. too" and clean up maybe for the old folks who live next door, or by cutting the yard on the vacant rental property two doors away.

The women are going to keep their "strike parties" going along Post's highway streets to give the traveler the best possible impression.

We don't know what to do about the railroad track. Maybe it's a good thing the Santa Fe has taken off its passenger trains.

Will YOU help so everybody can start taking some pride again in Post's appearance?-JC

Soil Stewardship Week, May 11-18

The nationwide celebration of Soil Stewardship Week is May 11-18. This is a week set aside so Americans can take a closer look at their responsibility to the land that gives strength to all.

The responsibilities for the conservation of these resources is by five given to the Soil and Water Conservation Districts and their supervisors in Texas, those they are sponsoring Soil Stewardship Week. The supervisors of the Garza Soil Conservation District imcourage all of the churches in the district in participate in Soil Stewordship Week

The conservation and development of Texas soil and water resources is essential to maintain the economy of the state It cannot afford the loss of land, waste and pollution of water and other abuses to natural resources.

Each individual is dependent upon the soil, whether he dwells in the country, town, or city, or whatever his vocation may be; its blessings and its demands touches all alike.

Conservation is the preservation of natural resources for food, fiber, economical use and for the preservation of the American way of life.

'It is altogether fitting that we should set aside a week when we express unto God our gratitude for his blessings upon our land and our willingness to be faithful to our stewardship." Soil Stewardship Week sponsors said.

"For the people of God, stewardship of natural resources is based upon the word of God-The Bible plainly sets out that ownership of the resources is God's. Stewardship, including use and conservation, is man's responsibility. In Deuternoomy 8:6-11, we find these words: "A land wherein thou shalt eat bread without scarceness, thous shall not lack anything in it; a land whose stones are iron, and out of whose hills thou may diggest brass. When thou hast eaten and art full, then thou shalt bless the Lord thy God for the land which He hath given thee.

JUST MOM

The greatness of a mother has been better told than when an old woman was chosen by her community for a special honor and she replied, 'Who, me? Why, I've never done anything. I've just brought up a houseful of kids to be decent men and women. That's

'She never did anything," yet she was a soldier who fought her battles as bravely as any general whose breast is covered with medals and whose deeds live in song ind story. Eight times she faced death through torture that has become the synonym for suffering to oring her children into the world. Her life was always a hand tohand fight with poverty and ill health and discouragement, but she never once ran up the white flag.

"She never did anything," yet she was the financier who would have been Secretary of the Treasury if she had gotten her just deerts. Balancing the budget would have been no trick at all compared to spreading her husband's thin ony envelope over the needs of a big family. Yet she did it.

She never did anything, ver she was a jack of all trades and good at them all. She was a judge who had to use the wisdom of Solomon in settling the disputes between her children. She was a doctor who knew what to do for minor juvenile ills and who could kiss a bump and make it well. She was a nurse whose hands had healing in their touch, and who could go without food or sleep or rest while a sick child clung to her who would only be quiet in Mother's arms.

"She never did anything," yet she was the character builder whose work made the kind of men and women who are the glory of our country. She had rock - bottom principles and she founded her children on them. She had high ideals that she always held before her sons' and daughters' eyes, and she bred in them honor and honand deceney until these qualities became as much a part of her youngsters as their own skins,

"She never did anything," yet she was a day laborer who had union hours and no forty-hour week. She had no holidays, no vacations, not even a Saturday afternoon off. For there was always so much to do in a poor household where there were no servants and where the babies trod on each other's heels.

'She never did anything." yet she was a heroine because her own hands she raised her children above herself and opened doors for them which would be forever closed to her. She went shabhy that they might have good clothes. Hungry that they might be fed. She stayed put that they trave!

'She never did anything." ye she cooked in the kitchen the good food on which her children entertained their friends in the parlor. She sat up nights making pretty which her lovely daugh ters would dance at parties, and washing the shirts so that her boys would be spick and span and efficient looking when they went to

"She never did anything," yet for years and years she slaved and pinched pennies and denied herself even the medical attention that she knew she needed, that her sons and daughters might have the education that would forever put them out of her class.

"She never did anything," n.o. Of course not. She was just Mom. and even her children never knew how great she was.







White River Lake is almost full

The White River Lake, thanks ose to full as it has ever been. The lake has risen 2.2 feet in the past week due to runoff of heavy rains in the White River drainage area. A total of 3.7 inches of moisture has fallen at the lake

since last Thursday.

According to filtration plant employes yesterday the lake level is "the morning glory" or the open end of the concrete spillway which runs under the dam to take the overflow once the lake reaches its normal level.

The lake's water elevation is now 2,367.2 feet.

Should the lake ever rise 11 feet over the "morning glory" intake (or normal) level, it will pass into the emergency spillway around the west end of the earthen dam.

He sent for his mother, and she made a home for him there, making the furniture for the two rooms out of the packing cases in which she had shipped her goods. She dedicated herself to his career, working day and night that he might have the funds to continue his lessons. Said he: "I learned more about how to enunciate my words from my old Negro mother than from any singing teacher I ever had."

In his home Roland Hayes had a shrine for his mother, an oil portrait by a famous artist. Showing her in simple dress as he had known her, the picture was lighted by a spotlight and had a vase of fresh flowers on either side at all times. Said he: "I have met the great women of the earth, but I have never met one who was inherently finer than my own mother, white or black."

It is in homes like that—plain homes, simple homes, God-fearing homes, homes of faith and prayer-that dreams are kindled, and the qualities of courage, sacrifice and industry are developed that make men great in character, achievement and service.

Thank God for homes like that today. God saves us from homes of selfish snobbishness and help us to make our homes rich and wholesome backgrounds for lives of useful leadership. For Christian homes dare not be homes of dilettante self-interest, but homes that make a creative contribution to Christian society.

One question: How can any home really be Christian unless it is a Church-going home?
