Hospital district seen as solution

The first conclusion The Dispatch reached in staking out our editorial position on the upcoming special hospital district election is that a vast enajority of Garza County citizens want Garza Memorial Hospital to continue its operations.

We think this was well proven two years ago by the resolute response of the town and area to our "hospital crisis" brought on by a doctor shortage and tack of revenue.

Therefore, many voters who are FOR the hospital are still weighing the issues as to whether it can best be operated by a hospital district with its own elected board and taxing powers, or as an appendage of the county-dependent upon the commissioners' court for tax funds and operated by a board appointed by the

The Dispatch is convinced, especially from the "long run" point of view, that the hospital district method of operation gets the nod, although we are aware that there are plenty of hospital supporters who will disagree with us.

We have reached our conclusion basically because of the better financial base accorded by a hospital district operation and our belief that in the long run the hospital district actually will cost taxpayers less than if the present county operation is continued.

Garza County, like most other Texas counties, is levying its maximum tax rate.

With costs rising through the years, the only way the county can get additional tax revenue is by boosting its taxable property valuations.

But this is almost doubly expensive to the taxpayer because state taxes we pay are figured on county tax valuations. Therefore whenever the valuation; and blood are go state taxes as well as counts haves

On the other hand, by creating a hospital

district and establishing a separate tax rate for the hospital, taxpayers will pay the hospital tax only with no increase in state taxes.

Also by creating the hospital district Garza voters will give the county some tax rate leeway in the future so it should not be necessary to boost county property valuation again as already have been done once.

The county commissioners court has agreed to reduce its county tax rate by 15 cents if the hospital district is voted. This is the amount the county is currently setting aside for the hospital. The maximum hospital tax permitted under the special law enacted by the legislature to create the district with voter approval is 25 cents.

Thus taxes can go up at present but 10 cents and can go no higher as far as the hospital is concerned until the legislature votes a rate change and the voters approve it.

Voters fearful of creating any new taxing unit must understand it well may be much more expensive in the long run not to do so.

The hospital operation over the long run must have more tax money for improvements and equipment than the present 15 cents will allow. Voting the hospital district should provide those funds.

By not voting the district and keeping the hospital under county control, voters must realize that the commissioners court at any time, especially in financial pinches, can withdraw any and all hospital support funds and can refuse to provide more even in an emergency. That situation already has forced one closing of our hos-

The Dispatch well knows the hospital district is no perfect solution and no guarantee for complote hospital success. But we think it merits a chance to prove itself -JC





'Magnesium is an important me tal in certain enzyme systems, so this could mean that there is an extra amount of some enzyme present in the nervous dogs. It is pos-sible that a compound may exist in excess in the nervous dogs that holds on to the magnesium, therefore, causing more magnesium to be retained.

'At the present time, the specific reasons for these differences are just speculation.

"We plan to have more anaylses performed using larger samples and far more elements. After the differences are measured, we will try to stimulate effects in the normal dogs by injecting them with trace metals that occur in excess in the nervous dogs. We also plant to make exploratory studies on human cerebrospinal fluid to see if any trace metal differences can be related to neuropsychiatric disea-ses." concluded Dr. Wear.
