It is reasonable to make "all-day" or "half-day" parkers go to a public garage or parking lot and pay a fee. But the present system of using parking meters is driving shoppers away or causing them to go home with fewer purchases. Any merchants whose Christmas business falls below last year's can blame it on their city government. Failure on the part of city authorities to provide sufficient free parking space is the chief cause of business failures







This compares with a carryover of 9,600,000 bates on August 1 this year. Total cotton supply for 1954-55 is estimated at 23,000,000 bales, including the carryover. Last year's total was 22.000,000

The economist says domestic mills are expected to consume more cotton this year. Exports are predicted to jump 700,000 bales over last year. Smaller foreign stocks and a higher rate of consumption abroad are the







They will be available to taxpayers, accountants, lawyers, and others who may need their forms early It was announced recent y by the national office in Washington that direct mailing of forms would not take place until after Christmas and might not be completed until mid-Jan-

The late mailing move was planned to avoid the loss which has been very heavy in past years when the forms were dispatched at an early date to the nation's million of taxpayers.

Campbell reminded taxpayers of the Dallas district that the forms for the calendar year 1954 are different from those of past years, as are the accompanying instruction booklets, new mater ial having been added to each to clarify changes in the tax laws as well as questions which arose concerning various types of deductions and allowances.

Persons desiring the new forms prior to their mail release may call for them at the Internal Revenue Service Office at the VA Building, 1600 block on 19th Street, Lubbock,
