## Parity And Acreage Allotments Tell Story Of Cotton Outlook For 1955

COLLEGE STATION (Sp.) — Support prices and acreage allotments tell the story of cotton production in Texas for 1955. The state's share of national production next year must come from 7,612,779 acres, which is the '55 allotment for Texas. This is compared with 7,624,000 acres harvested this year. National production for next year is set at 10,000,000 bales of upland and 30,000 bales of long staple cotton.

The support price for upland cotton will range from 82.5 to 90 per cent of parity. John G. McHaney, extension agricultural economist says the total carryover of cotton in the U. S. on Aug. 1, 1955—about the time Texas farmers harvest their new crop—is estimated at 9,200,000 bales. This compares with a carryover of 9,600,000 bales on August 1 this year. Total cotton supply for 1954-55 is estimated at 23,000,000 bales, including the carryover. Last year's total was 22,000,000.

The economist says domestic mills are expected to consume more cotton this year. Exports are predicted to jump 700,000 bales over last year. Smaller foreign stocks and a higher rate of consumption abroad are the

reasons for the expected export increase. The Agricultural Act of 1954 calls for a "set-aside" of some 3,000,000 to 4,000,000 bales in '55. McHaney explains the amount put in set-aside will be counted when marketing quotas are computed but excluded when price supports are being figured.

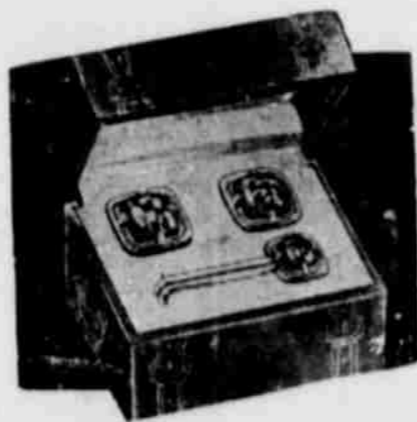

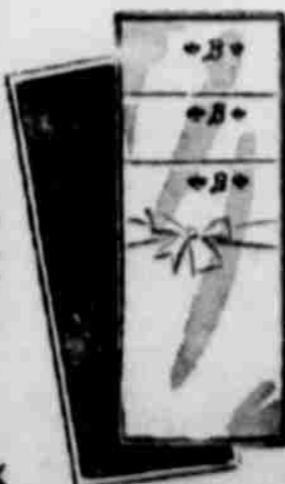

### Late Mailing Seen On New Tax Forms

Quantities of income tax forms are available at all offices of the Internal Revenue Service in the Dallas district, Ellis Campbell, Jr., district director, has announced.

They will be available to taxpayers, accountants, lawyers, and others who may need their forms early. It was announced recently by the national office in Washington that direct mailing of forms would not take place until after Christmas and might not be completed until mid-January.

The late mailing move was planned to avoid the loss which has been very heavy in past years when the forms were dispatched at an early date to the nation's million of taxpayers.

Campbell reminded taxpayers of the Dallas district that the forms for the calendar year 1954 are different from those of past years, as are the accompanying instruction booklets, new material having been added to each to clarify changes in the tax laws as well as questions which arose concerning various types of deductions and allowances.

# Unchanging Christmas Spirit Seen In Yuletide Seasons Of Bygone Years

One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine and ten years ago, the people of Post and Garza County were getting ready for Christmas much in the same manner as they are today.

In the relatively short space of ten years, times have not changed enough for the 1954 pre-Christmas period to be greatly different than it was in 1944, but there were some differences ten years ago, chief of which was the fact that a global war was rocking the world to its very foundations.

Because of a scarcity of materials brought on by the war, there were no elaborate Christmas decorations ten years ago, and in 1944 and again in 1945, The Post Dispatch advised its young readers that it would be able to publish only a limited number of Santa Claus letters because of newsprint rationing.

### First Santa Letter

Ten years ago, the Dispatch's first Santa Claus letter came from Anita Davies, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Davies, The Verbena School, no longer in existence, held its Christmas party on Dec. 20. Mrs. Virginia Williams was the teacher.

In 1944, Red Cross Christmas boxes were going to servicemen in hospitals, and The Dispatch's Christmas edition carried a front page editorial entitled "There Is Hope," which turned out to be prophetic, since World War II ended before another Christmas rolled around.

Nine years ago, in 1945, the first Santa Claus letter came from Joy Laverne and Kathryn Kay Martin. Many homes were rejoicing over the return of loved ones from foreign battlefields, and Post merchants were reported getting ready for the biggest Christmas rush in years.

### Sewing Clubs Meet

The Needlecraft and Priscilla Sewing clubs held Yuletide parties on Dec. 14 to begin the city's round of traditional Christmas events. Two weeks before Christmas, the mercury plunged to a new season low of 13 degrees, and the colder weather was credited with checking an outbreak of influenza. Holiday sales were soaring beyond expectations of merchants, and The Dispatch's Christmas edition came out on Dec. 24—24 pages of holiday greeting ads. One of the best Christmas "presents" for motorists was news that tire rationing

would end on Jan. 1.

In 1946, things had about bounced back to normal, and Christmas lights were strung across Main Street and turned on Dec. 16. Merchants had prepared their stores for the crowds of gift shoppers, and Goodfellows and Lions Club members were collecting toys for Christmas gifts to needy youngsters.

### Santa Claus Rides

On Dec. 21, Santa Claus rode into town on the fire truck in a holiday celebration sponsored by the Post Volunteer Fire Department. There was free candy for the children, and three turkeys tossed into the crowd created a wild scramble. The turkey donated by the City of Post was captured by Bud Everett; Calvin Browning corralled the one donated by the Chamber of Commerce, and the fire department's turkey was chased down by Tommy Wall.

The Dispatch's annual Christmas edition—28 pages of greeting ads and Santa Claus letters—came out on Dec. 24. The paper's front page carried "The Song of Christmas" in pictures and verse.

During the Christmas season seven years ago, in 1947, Mayor John Herd requested merchants and store employees to park their automobiles behind their business houses or on side streets so that there would be more parking space available for Christmas shoppers.

### Boy Scouts Help

New decorations, including lights, were put up downtown by Post firemen, who again sponsored a Santa Claus visit on the fire truck. This time, they threw two turkeys into the crowd and gave away eight others for the benefit of the Boy Scouts, who had helped them put up the

Christmas decorations.

Homecomings, dinners, Christmas trees and parties highlighted the holiday, and on Dec. 24 The Dispatch came out with a 28-page edition carrying the holiday greeting messages of the city's merchants in addition to page after page of Santa Claus letters.

Early in the Christmas season of 1948, the Chamber of Commerce, Lions Club and Boy Scouts were asking for the names of needy families. Santa Claus visited the city twice, and on his first visit two lucky Post youngsters, Sherry Custer and Gayle Ann Parsons, had their picture made with the jolly old gent and the picture appeared on the front page of The Dispatch.

### Hold Special Services

All the city's churches were sponsoring special Yuletide services, and Mrs. J. A. Stallings presented her music pupils Dec. 22 in a Christmas recital. Everybody except the postal employees were enjoying the showers of Christmas cards, and The Dispatch's special edition contained 28 pages, which also added to the postmen's woes.

Christmas lights went up early in December of 1949, and Post firemen announced that their Christmas celebration would include giving away of 10 white turkeys. The Christmas card postage rate was higher, and Yule entertainments included a concert by the year-old Post High School band, of which Merle Jenkins was director.

### Subscriptions Given

Lots of Post Dispatch subscriptions were being given as the "ideal" Christmas present, and Santa Claus sent word for the children to form lines as they passed by the two fire trucks for their free candy. Only two minor

blazes marred the Christmas season, and the Dispatch's annual Yuletide edition contained eight regular size pages and 32 tabloid pages.

Snow ushered in the Christmas season in 1950, with the mercury dropping to 5 degrees. The firemen's Yule celebration included a gigantic parade featuring Santa Claus riding on a sleigh pulled by four live reindeer brought here by Grady Carothers of Goldthwaite.

The city's churches began joint Christmas observances with daily programs of organ music over the First Baptist Church's chimes. The annual Rotary Christmas party was one of many traditional events, and the poem, "The Night Before Christmas," appeared in Pauline Warren's page one column, "Up and Down Main Street."

### "Operation Santa Claus"

During the Christmas season of 1951, Post and Garza County participated in one of the most worthwhile projects in their history—"Operation Santa Claus." On Dec. 9, 144 gift packages were mailed to soldiers, with the Chamber of Commerce paying the shipping charges. "Operation Santa Claus" was sponsored nationally by Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy, and Post's generous response was the means of bringing the pair here later in the year for their radio broadcast.

Approximately 4,500 persons watched a Christmas parade, featuring Santa Claus and his reindeer, on Dec. 20. First place winners in the home decorations contest sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce were as follows:

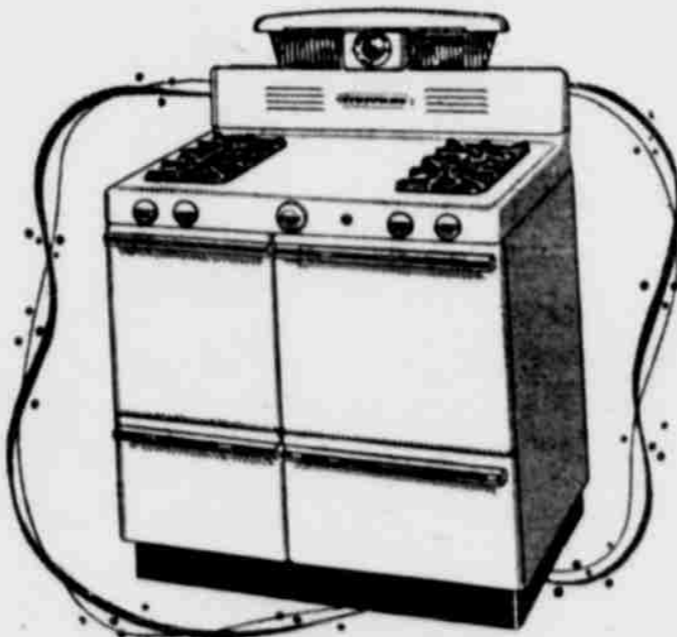

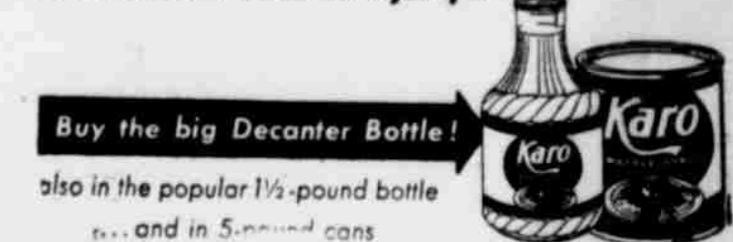
