It doesn't help any to know that of the 73 persons killed last year in 650 tornadoes reported in the United States, 51 of the victims died in Texas. Nor does it help any to be reminded that the 1970 tornado season was unusual because many of the twisters occurred at night. This makes it more difficult for tornado spotters and the weather bureau.

WHAT'S IN IT? By CHARLES DIDWAY

HODGES

Hodge was a common nick-name for Roger in the Middle Ages, and when people started acquiring surnames Hodge caught on, also developing into the family name Hodges,

meaning "son of Hodge." The name Roger, of which Hodge is a pet-form, owed its popularity as a given name to two Norman rulers of Sicily, called Roger I and Roger II, and to Roger of Montgomery, a Norman noble, who was granted vast estates throughout the south of England after distinguishing himself at the Battle of Hastings.

In medieval times the English were much inclined to rhyming when forming petnames. Robert became not only Rob, but Hob and Dob; Richard, Hick and Dick, and Roger, Hodge and Dodge Hodges is not the only family name evolving from Hodge, others including such names as Hodgkins, Hodgson and Hodgkiss.

Although the word "hodge" was used in medieval England to describe a typical peasant, and the food he ate was called "hodge-podge", there were no less than 16 families of the name who owned estates were granted costs of arms and who were listed among the "noble

One of the first of the name to gain prominence in England was the physician. Nathaniel Hodges, who in 1655 during the Great Plague of London seems to have been the first who had the courage to make a post mortem inspection of a plague

A prominent bearer of the name in modern times was Courtney H. Hodges who from a private in the U.S. Army (1906) advanced through the ranks to four-star general (1945) after having become commander of the American

1st Army in France in 1944. Among surnames in the United States, Hodges ranks 402nd, with an estimated 63,-000 persons by the name. Thereare towns named Hodges in Alabama, Montana and South
