| today's agriculture outlook, more and more Garza County farmers are turning to the stabilizing influence of crop investment insurance to make certain of a guaranteed income. <br> Mike Custer, field representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation from the district office at Lubbock, says insurance sateguards are now available on cotton in the county to help guarantee a cash return at harvest. <br> Some 28 crops in the county already are protected by the allrisk insurance with their owners underwriting $\$ 126,861$ in guaranteed agriculture income no matter what natural hazard should destroy the vest. <br> Despite the relatively good crop year just past, losses were paid in most areas of the state due principally to early freeze and insects. In Garza County the insured loss totalled $\$ 5,000$, according to official | FCIC insured farmers are using their insurance not only to protect crop investment dollars, but to strengthen credit, to reduce spec ialization risks, to aid in long-term financing of expansion programs and to allow maximum use of operating capital. <br> "All these add up to the sound money management farmers need to cope with the changes and un- certainties in agriculture," Mr. Custer says. <br> Texas farmers pledged more than $\$ 3,051,000$ in crop insurance pro tection last year to secure farm operating loans.
