A large-scale business operates five days a week in Post, going virtually unnoticed by most of the adult population, and National School Lunch Week, Oct. 12-18, is a good time to recognize that business.

The "business," of course, is the school cafeteria, serving 400 students daily with an emplayment of 8 persons.

Recognizing the necessity to focus attention on these people who daily feed balanced lunches to school children, the U. S. Congress and the President declared the special week for Oct. 12-

The lateness of this year's first bale is just another example of what the county agricultural agent has referred to as the "oddity" of the 1969 cotton crop.

The high cost of hand-pulling is resulting in more and more farmers gathering their cotton by mechanical methods, and that cannot be done as early in the season as hand-pulling. Weather what's the hurry?

Then, too, there is the fact that there no longer is much of a first bale incentive here since no one any longer pays a premium for it. In some instances, ginners gin the first bale free, but it used to be a race every season to see who could gather the first bale of cotton and bring it in for premiums ranging anywhere from \$50 to \$200. Since no one any longer seems to care that much.


THE SHOTGUN solved the problem and, luckily, nothing inside the store was tainted or otherwise damaged by the skunk's reaction to the shotgun blast.
