Looking behind re-districting controversy

It's about time the people in Texas understand what the Texas House of Representatives re-districting controversy is all about.

At least what The Dispatch is convinced is right down at the core of it. We see it as the efforts of the dominant Democratic conservatives to maintain control of the Texas Hause via recognized over-all voter majorities in some of the state's larger metropolitan

In Dallas, Tarrant and Bexar counties (Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio being the cities involved) candidates for the house are forced to run county-wide races instead of the cities being divided into single representative districts (as they already are in Houston, Texas' biggest metropolitan area).

So what happens, large black residential areas are denied their own representation because overall whites outvote them. Also large Mexican-American areas are similarly denied their representation for the same reason. Also Republican areas, which normally would choose Republican house members are submerged beneath the vote tide of the total

As a result conservative Democrats conceivably could elect all 10 house members of one of these cities-if that be the total the metropolitan area is entitled to by population count-while blacks, Mexican-Americans, and Republicans would have a representation totaling zero.

In the same theoretical city, through single member district voting the totals might have been vastly different.

Fairly drawn house districts in metropolitan areas are the next bridge Texas somehow has to cross in achieving government directly responsible to the people.

As in virtually every other state in the nation, the state government of Texas should pay for the costs of primary elections just as it does for general elections.

The Dispatch's editorial voice has been raised for progress in the last decade in each one of these battles to give the people a freer apportunity to choose the men and women who will govern them.

We raise it again today in pointing our finger into the House redistricting muddle and calling it just another one of the many political delaying actions which have been waged

And we point it, too, at the next "political battle" to be won - that of letting state government pay the cost of party primaries (both parties at the same polling place with registered Democrats and registered Republicans being given the ballots to which their registration entitles them).

Texas voters for their own protection need a fair and open two-party system. Thus, they can protect themselves against such happenings as the current stock fraud scandal in Austin by simply going to the polls and turning out the party in power which succumbs to political excesses.

But until all the roadblocks are removed to a robust two-party system (and that primarily is what all the monkey business has been about), Texas will be ruled by a class of politicians who make a career out of "political chairs" in Austin.
