Welcome to the smartest, dumbest, loudest, quietest, most concerned, most apathetic. most easily duped, hardest to convince, most independent club in the world - the U.S.

You now have a share in our democracy equal to that of any millionaire or pauper. Your new franchise is one which many who are well over 18 have been fighting for since they were 16 or 17.

Don't take your new voting power lightly. Use it. Register. Become a loyal Democrat, a true-blue Republican, a power-swinging Independent, a conservative or a liberal. Study the issues. 

> When the new year dawned, we closed a chapter of our history and began a new one. Through a special federal grant we were able to secured a modest sum for a fulltime librarian. We hired Mrs. C. K. Pierce as our first paid librarian. Mrs. Pierce is one of the original volunteers who manned the circulation desk the first night we were open. 



WHAT'S IN IT? By CHARLES DIDWAY

WOODWARD

In the England of long ago, one of the most cherished rights of the king was that of converting any portion of the country into a forest in which might enjoy the pleasures the chase. And once the king's hunting grounds had been established it became necessary for officers to be appointed to keep his subjects from poaching.

One of the officers appointed to guard the king's "game prewas the woodward. whose job it was to care for the woods and to bring offenses against trespassers into court. An ancient law provided that to the woodward belongs each wind-felled tree," which would indicate that his services were held in high esteem.

Like other occupations of the late Middle Ages, that of woodward became a source of hereditary surnames. Men who were employed in the occupation became known by the name when the need arose for them to have something more than a first name to go by Then, as hereditary surnames began to stick, their sons and grandsons were also known by the name Woodward, even though they might have taken up some other occupation than

that of forest-keeper. Derived from the Old English 'wuduweard' (forester), the name appears as "Wudeward" in early English documents. One of the earliest instances of the name is Elias le Wudeward, who was listed on the assize rolls in Lancashire in

the year 1246. The surname Woodard is a reduced form of Woodward. John Woodward, a 17th century Englishman, was one of the founders of experimental

plant physiology. Prominent among those of the name in this country was Calvin Milton Woodward, born in 1837, who is credited with the nationwide development of manual training in high schools.

Woodward is the 686th commonest surname in the United States where there are approximately 39,000 persons by the


