The community was shocked and saddened Sunday by the passing of Malcolm T. Bull, a civic-minded Post businessman who for the last several months had fought a losing battle against cancer.

The fortitude shown by Malcolm in his fight against the disease that finally claimed his life was no surprise to those well enough acquainted with him to know that he was a survivor of the Corregidor 'death march. Taken prisoner in January of 1942, he spent 39 months in a Japanese prison camp.

Malcolm was one of a large number of servicemen who returned home following long months of imprisonment to once again take their place in the mainstream of American life and make material contributions to the welfare and progress of the communities in which they made their homes.

He served several years as a member of the board of the Post Independent School District, and was an active worker in his a church, the First United Methodist, where he was a former member of the board. He helped in the guidance of the community's youth by serving as a Scoutmaster and a Cubmaster, and was a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Malcolm, soft-spoken and accommodating, numbered his friends by his acquaintances. He was one of those men whose passing leaves a void in the pattern of things that go to make up a good community.

I suppose it's that way in most any line of business, but I couldn't be sure, since I've never been in any line except the newspaper business long enough to lose a couple of days.

AFTER GETTING out the paper Tuesday morning of last week, The Dispatch force spent the rest of the day clearing the decks for a front office remodeling job, then took off the rest of the week to enjoy Thanksgiving.

Those extra days off were among the many things we here at The Dispatch office were thankful for this Thanksgiving, but at the risk of sounding ungrateful, we're going to have to consider those days off as "lost" days as far as getting any work done toward getting out this week's Dispatch is concerned.

SO, THIS MONDAY morning we're thankful for a newly-remodeled front office, for the extra days we had off to enjoy Thanksgiving with our families and friends, and for a much-needed rest-but we're miles behind as far as getting out this week's paper is concerned!

Several years ago, a newspaper up in Nebraska found itself in the same shape-miles behind-but not for the same reason. Here is how the Nebraska editor explained his dilemna:



# Thanksgiving Epilogue-1929-1971

## By Bernard S. Ramsey

Thanksgiving in the year 1929 will always be a vivid, memorable day for me. In May of that year I began my "career" in the business world as an accountant. That part of my life lasted 21 years-almost all of them with the same firm. So, as of this year, 1971, I have given 21 years of my life to the god of Commerce and 21 years to my Lord Jesus Christ as His minister. If I have any real regret for the way I've spent my life, it is to be unable to say I've given my Lord all 42 of those years . . . And yet sometimes I feel as if He has poured 42 years of living in the short 21 years I've given him.

But, like most preachers I digress: On that Thanksgiving Day 1929 it was necessary for me to work from early morning until very late hours that evening. Some of you remember what happened in November of that tragic year of 1929-the Stock Market crashed, literally wiping out unnumbered businesses. No business in America was unaffected by that financial debacle. Naturally, a great deal of pressure was placed on all accountants and auditors.

As the weary hours of that day wore on, I became more and more resentful of the fact that I had had to spend that entire Thanksgiving Holiday pushing a pen-turning figures this way and that trying to come up with a reasonable facsimile of the true fiscal affairs of our company-and what, if anything, the future held for it. About 9:30 p. m., after a quick sandwich (and it wasn't even a turkey sandwich) and a cup of coffee, I became so disgusted that I pushed all the papers and books off my desk onto the floor, folded my arms on the desk, rested my head on them, shut my eyes and tried to blot out the mess of a job that lay before me.

Suddenly I sat erect in my chair. That whole day had passed and I had not uttered one word of thanksgiving all day long! Not a single expression of gratitude to God for the exceptionally wonderful way he had blessed my life during that year . . . that terrible year when so many other people had had to face complete, total financial ruin; lost all they had and in many cases far more than that-wiped out-everything gone and sadly enough quite a few unable to face the catastrophe and seemingly hopeless future, just slipped out of life by the back door. But that had not been true of my life. Even though I was quite young in the business world, good fortune just seem to gravitate my way. I suppose I was one of the few who had a good and promising future ahead . . . and yet I had forgotten God completely; not even a quick "Thank you God." I was so ashamed.

-I just had to do something. In a few moments you are going to know that I am not, nor have I ever been particularly poetic -I have too much genuine appreciation for that art for me to ever think I could write a poem . . . but I just had to write a poem . . . a thanksgiving poem-right then and there. It was such a simple composition-not very good poetry at all. My younger and late brother, who was then a minister, thought differently when I showed it to him. He told me it said everything, he thought, a thanksgiving poem could say.

He sat down and made a copy of it and had it published the very next week in the weekly paper of the University where he was doing some graduate work. This is the heading he gave it: THANKSGIVING EPILOGUE-1929.

That simple little poem has come to mean a great deal to me in the last four decades (plus two years). It said exactly what I felt in my heart that November evening in 1929. In every one of the 21 years I've been in the Christian Ministry, I have always felt a strange compulsion to find some way to use that poem sometime during the Thanksgiving Season .... in a sermon ... in a letter to a friend ... over the radio ... in a conversation.

That's why I want to share it, and the story back of it, with you this Thanksgiving Season, 1971. I do not apologize for its lack of poetic artistry-that isn't what really matters. It is just that in some strange way, it stills says what I feel in my heart when God's goodness and love seem to overwhelm and conquer my deep sense of thankfulness. Here it is, exactly as I first wrote it (on the back of a Profit and Loss Statement) that Thanksgiving Evening, 1929:

Give thanks to the Lord in heaven above. And praise His name for all His love. For He's the Redeemer of every man . . . O'er all the races in every land. He gives us all the things we need, And cleanse us of each
