The New York Life Insurance Company in its annual report to policyholders, calls attention to this problem, pointing out that twice as many Americans have been killed by automobiles in the past twenty-five years as by all the wars in our history. Moreover, a study indicates that thirty per cent of the deaths caused by automobile accidents occurred under the age of thirty and almost half under the age of

The report also corrects the widespread impression that most fatalities occur in congested areas. As a matter of fact, three out of five fatalities occur in rural areas, although urban mileage exceeds rural mileage substantially.

There may be some surprise in the fact that forty per cent of the victims of the fatal accidents are not drivers or passengers, but pedestrians. In larger cities, this proportion goes up to about two-thirds. Moreover, one-tenth of all pedestrian deaths are children under thirteen years of age. The record shows that, in the majority of cases, pedestrians killed were either violating a triffic law or committing an act they should have known was unsafe.

In view of the fact that the next few years will see a greatly increased number of cars on the roads, there is every prospect that present death rates will be exceeded. Unless checked by greater care on the part of drivers and pedestrians, the annual toll is expected to reach 50,000 in

We call attention to these facts so that the people of Callahan County will be impressed with the necessity of taking definite action to reduce fatalities on the highways. That strict enforcement of traffic laws will help is evident from the fact that violations are a factor in nearly threefourths of all fatal accidents. In nearly a third, fast driving is a principal cause.

Every thinking citizen should support the effort of law enforcement officials and encourage them to rigidly enforce all traffic laws.

USELESS AMENDMENT

A proposed constitutional amendment, limiting the President to two elective terms, is now before the States for action. legislatures of threefourths of the States will put the limit into the Constitution as the Twenty-Second Amendment.

In our opinion, there is no necessity for, and little justification of, ratification. The Amendment would limit the right of the people of this country to elect a President

We think the Government of the United States can be trusted to the people of the nation and that they can safely determine whether a future President be given three, or more, terms in office.

In addition, the Texan points out that the United Nations has no authority to undertake what the United States proposes to do for Greece and Turkey. The organization, he declares, has no funds and, if it had funds, it has no authority to lend the money of contributing nations. SEARCH FOR 1,120 "MISSING"

Amid the pikers who wildly hint that some other nation might use the atomic bomb against this country comes George H. Earle, former Governor of Pennsylvania and U. S. Minister to Austria and Bulgaria, with the statement that puts him. in the front rank of pessimists.

Mr. Earle does not believe that " there is better than an even chance that 10 per cent of us Americans will be alive five years from now." The time limit is March 28, 1952, according to the brother who believes that the country that uses the atomc bomb "first is almost sure to win" and that the American people are so naive and charitable . . . that they never will use

Mr. Earle considers Russia the "terrible menace" and suggests that we use the bomb immediately against any nation that refuses to permit inspection of atomic plants. He admits, however, that the people of this country would not stand for the treatment he recommends.

The Earle pronouncement will not have much effect in this country but the chances are that it will be quoted widely in Soviet Russia. This will not add anything to the development of friendly cooperation between the two nations which is a hopeful possibility regardless of difficulties, misunderstandings and suspi-


