#### en years ago

THE WINDS OF change, which have been whipping around the corners here at The Dispatch office for the last several weeks, will begin blowing full force as soon as this issue of the paper is out. That is when The Dispatch will make the changeover from the hot-type process of printing to offset.

We just hope these winds of change don't blow us clear out of the tub.

WE'VE ALL BEEN familiarizing ourselves with the many different facets of offset printing - familiarizing ourselves as much, that is, as we have time to, since it has been necessary, of course, for us to continue with our regular duties of getting out The Dispatch under the old process - which is being blown out the back door this weekend by the same winds of change that are blowing in the new pro-

The Dispatch is one of the last papers in this area of West Texas to change over from hot-type to offset. I say "one of the last" because there are still two or three papers in the area besides us that are still using the old method.

OFSET PRINTING for newspapers is comparatively new. It is entirely new to me, since I've been a hot-type newspaperman all my life. The only offset printing I've ever been around was in the commercial printing department of the Levelland Sun-News when I was editor of that paper. I stayed so busy on the newspaper, which went from semi-weekly to daily while I was there, that I never found time to go into the commercial department and watch the offset press or other equipment operate.

It's the same with the rest of them here at The Dispatch office. They've never had any "dealings" with offset printing, and next Thursday's Dispatch will be a "first" for all of us. We've been trying hard to "learn it all" the last few weeks, and all the equipment is sitting back there in place waiting for us. None of us has any intention of being "blown out of the tub" by this big wind of change; we only ask that you bear with us until we get our "sea legs." After that, it will be like shooting fish in a barrel.

YOU'RE GOING to find that in "new look" Dispatch the pictures and everything else will print better. The reason will be that the paper is not being run through an old flatbed cylinder press that has been in continuous use for at least 60 years, and that sometimes builds up and smears ink in the most unexpected places - even on pictures that were "sharp as a tack" when they came out of the darkroom.

There are going to be a lot of things we'll miss about the old process, however. One of the things we're going to miss most is not being able to get late-break in g news stories into your new Thursday morning offset Dispatch. In other words, if some big news story "breaks" Wednesday night or on Thursday morning, it'll just have to wait until the next week - and that's hard for any newsman to have to take

IN THE LAST several years Publisher Jim and I have "held up" The Dispatch's Thursday morning presstime on a number of occasions in order to run down and get in a late-breaking news story. These have included fires, burglaries, hijackings, murders and auto wrecks. The one that sticks most n my memory as we prepare to leave the hot-type process of printing behind is a wreck on U. S. Hwy. 54 between Post and Justiceburg.
