

It's a record worth remembering

The current city administration has rolled up an impressive record of accomplishment which merits consideration by local voters on the eve of the municipal election.

The Dispatch has made it a habit under current ownership not to endorse local candiclates for office, believing that our readerswho are also astride the local scene can judge their politics and their politicians without help from us.

But a record of accomplishment by an administration is something else again. It is a day to day, or week to week totaling up of the improvements made.

A record is not so easily left to an individual's memory. A lot of the good can easily be forgotten.

With this in mind, we'd like to call to the readers' attention some of the accomplishments of this administration. You can judge them for yourselves.

1. Two city tax reductions-one of 10 cents and one of approximately nine cents.

2. A cooperative effort with Burlington Industries for water pollution (rewage) control with no cost to the taxpayers.

3. The removal of 450 "junk cars" from

5. Collection of \$35,000 of the city's \$63,000 in delinquent taxes.

6. A debt-free city.

7. The upgrading of all equipment and plant plus the addition of a warehouse by

8. The establishment of excellent rela-

tions with all units of local, state and federal agencies for reciprocal cooperative efforts.

9. Not only recognition but some "clot by having our mayor serving as president this year of SPAG, an association of 50 member towns annd cities and 15 counties.

10. The receipt of over \$87,000 in federal funding for city and county projects here through the community's SPAG affiliations.

11. A joint cooperative effort with Garza County to build the Lorenzo Alexander Community Center and to develop a park and playground in that area.

12. A summer youth program, entering its second year in 1973, another joint venture with the county.

13. Completion of 50 blocks of paving, including paving in the cemetery, at a cost of \$105,000 with no remaining debt to the city.

14. A joint cooperative effort with the county to finance the continuance at a cost of \$3,500 to the city of the Garza County Community Action Program when threatened this spring by the withdrawal of federal fund-

15. The completion of street lighting of every street intersection in Post, plus the lighting of additional "dark spots... to make our town safer for all at night.

16. Has tried to provide all equipment necessary to help Post volunteer fire department be the best for its size in the state of

Total it up and the reader can see that a whole lot of effort has gone into bringing all this to pass. Put your own values to them, but there they are. It's a record worth remem-

THE BIG NEWS in Post last week was the fire at the elemenschool, but "big" 'strunge' news was also happening at other places over the area.

Up at Morton, for instance, four youths, one a juvenile, were apprehended after two heavy explosions rocked the town and "shook up" most of its residents.

ONE OF THE explosions at Morton was on Saturday night, and the townspeople hadn't much more than settled down from it than another blast rocked the town Sunday night.

Soon after the second explosion, police picked up the four youths for questioning and all four admitted making and setting off the "bombs" that caused the blasts, according to a story in the Morton

THE COCHRAN County sheriff reported that one of the bombs was made of a three-foot length of pipe, plugged at each end and a hole drilled into the middle. Homemade powder, thought to consist in large part of sodium chloride. was poured into the hole. The other bomb was constructed much the same way, with a length of exhaust pipe used.

Luckily, the bombs did no damage, but persons in every part of the city heard the blasts, and at least one person in Whiteface, several miles away, said he heard one of the explosions.

AND AT HAMILTON, in central Texas,, a female Irish setter gave birth to a litterof 17 pups to tie the world's record for the most puppies in an Irish setter litter. The pups began coming about noon Monday with five being born in the first hour. They continued to arrive until number 17 put in its appearance about 7 o'clock Tuesday morning.

If students enrolled in mechanics or welding wish to enroll in college classes after high school graduation, they may take an exam to gain advanced standing after ten days of class. If they pass, they would then enroll in the same classes as the college sophomores

There are other new concepts of education to be found in the class-es of the area vocational schools. Most students of diesel mechanics use new engines to learn how to rework the various parts. In the classes at WTC, old, worn-out engines are rehabilitated to factory specifications.

Clark says, "There is no art to taking a new engine apart and putting it together again," so his students learn to check old, worn parts and put them back in usable condition. This includes completely reworking the injectors cylinder heads, pumps, and all systems of a diesel engine.

In welding classes, as well as n diesel classes, the high school students do much the same work as the college freshmen. When the high school student finishes his welding course, he should be able to pass the same job application tests as the college freshmen.

The welders start with arc weldng, then go on to the more difficult vertical, horizontal, and overhead welding. They learn to work with the two most popular welding rods used in heavy industrial weldng, the E6010 and the E7018.

Vocational office occupation classes offer instruction to fit the needs of many different kinds of office employment. When students enroll in these classes, they fill out occupational intent cards. The course of study students follow is then planned to fit their chosen fields. The result is highly individualized instruction.

All of the students do get a very general office course, in which they learn general office procedures and how to use the most commony used office machines. Some of these students fill in for secretaries on campus when they have to be gone for a short time.

Additionally there is something new every semester in auto mechanics. This semester it is chassis and power trains, including front ends, alignment and overhaul, brakes, differentials, wheels, and tires. Students in the auto mechanics classes learn the fundamental techniques on all new equipment which was bought last year.



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
