INDUSTRIAL JUSTICE SHOULD BE PROVIDED

Charles E. Hughes Urges Settlement Of Disputes Peaceably.

Pittsburgh, Pa.-Machinery for in dustrial justice which would prevent the interruption of service essential to the community, was advocated by Charles E. Hughes in an address on "The Antidote for Holshevism" at the world's Christian citizenship confer-

Referring to public servants, trans-portation and basic industries, he said: "If the community provided just means for the settlement of complaint and for the redress of wrongs which might be suffered by those engaged in the essential activities we should have a right to prevent concerted attempt, that is, through any sort of combination, to hold up the community and enforce demands under threat of widespread suffering and want."

For industrial activity outside the essential services he urged collective bargaining with decisions binding in

"The time is at hand," he said, when we must furnish suitable machinery for industrial justice, at least so far as those vital enterprises are concerned upon which life depends.'

RED CROSS GIVES FULL ACCOUNTING

War Council Tells How Millions Contributed by Public Were Used For Relief.

BIG TASK IS DESCRIBED

In Twenty Months \$154,000,000 Was Spent Overseas and \$119,000,000

In the United States.

Washington. (Special.)-Through a complete report of the work of the American Red Cross in the war by Chairman Henry P. Davison, on be-half of the war council, the organization on the eve of its annual enroll-ment of members during the Third Red Cross Roll Call, November 2 to 11, has rendered an accounting of the many millions given it by the Ameri-can people to help our fighting men and our allies. The statement is, in

part, as follows: "The war council of the American Red Cross is now prepared to make a complete accounting to the American people of money contributed and ex-pended, as well as the work done by the American Red Cross during the period in which the war council was in control of its affairs. The war council was appointed May 19, 1919, and went out of existence February 28, 1919.

"It was the practice of the council to give complete publicity to now that a picture of the war period as a whole can be presented. It is the feeling of the war council that a report in this summarized form should be made directly to the public which provided the money and gave the ef-fort which made the American Red Cross a success. Cross a success.

"A statement of the American Red Cross effort and finances since the war council relinquished its control will be made to the public through the executive committee, and it is important, therefore, that the fact that this report covers the period only until March 1, should be carefully noted."

Of the \$400,000,000 in money and supplies, contributed to the American Red Cross during the twenty months the war council was in existence, \$263,000,000 was alloted to national headquarters, while \$137,000,000 went the chapters to finance their activities. Expenditures in the twenty months totalled \$273,000,000, divided as follows: By national headquarters in France, \$57,000,000; elsewhere overseas, \$64,000,000; in the United States, \$48,000,000; by chapters in the United States, \$43,000,000; cost of chapter-produced articles distributed in France, \$25,000,000, elsewhere over-sens, \$8,000,000; in the United States, \$28,000,000, making total expenditures in France, \$82,000,000, elsewhere over-seas, \$72,000,000; in the United States,

Austin, Texas.-Governor Hobby has issued a proclamation proclaiming Thursday, Nov. 27, as Thanksgiving Day, which is to be a holiday in the tate of Texas. The proclamation for

"As we near the end of another year

ve are reminded of the many and va tod beings which have been be towed upon us by a Gid of tender mercies and great compassion. It is appropriate and proper that we pause for a brief time and render unto God our homage and give expression to our deep gratitude and the great debt which we owe to Him from whom come all our happiness and all our blessings. The year, though still within the shadow of the earth's greatest tragedy, has been measurably prosperous for the people of Texas. We have been spared the pain of pestilence. We have with few exceptions, escaped calamity and disaster. The field has responded, if not bountifully, at least sufficiently, to the labor of the husbandman, and mankind has been reverted for his toll. warded for his toil.

There has been relief from martial conflict throughout our land. We have enjoyed the ties of friendship and our daily occupations, if not free of strife and contentions, evidence the composing influence of justice and right-dealing among men, from which eventually social and economic peace must flow. There is much to rejoice us in the contemplation of our bless ings, and no cloud from which brave men should shrink or cower, obscures

Charlottesville, Va.—Senator Thomas S. Martin of Virginia, the democratic leader in the senate, died here Thursday after an illness of several months. He was 72 years old.

Senator Martin had been confined to his bed since last July, when he was forced to give up active work in the senate after a continuous service of 24 years. While his condition had been critical for more than two weeks, the end came rather unexpectedly.

Senator Martin suffered from a leating heart valve and was moved to a hospital here some weeks ago, when he grew worse.

SENATE HAS ADOPTED MORE RESERVATIONS

EMBODY QUALIFICATION WHICH PRESIDENT SAID WOULD MEAN REJECTION

Washington.—Squarely joining the issue with President Wilson, the senate has adopted a reservation qualifying the obligation of the United State under Art. 10 of the league of nation: covenant.

A solid republican line-up, rein by four democratic votes, put the reactivation across exactly as it come from the foreign relations committee and in virtually the same language which the president declared on his western tour would cut the heart out of the covenant and mean the rejec-tion of the treaty. The vote by which the reservation won was 46 to 33

The fight for reservations having thus been carried to a climus, the republican cloture proposal is derignated to bring final action on the question of ratification within a week. A less sweeping measure, proposing limitation on the reservation debate only, had been put in by the democrats, but rejected when the republican voted to sustain a point of order against it.

The Art, 10 reservation as adopted.

The Art. 10 reservation as adopted by the senate follows:

"The United States assumes no obligation to preserve the territorial in-tegrity or political independence of any other country or to interfere with controversies between nations—whether members of the league or not-under the provisions of Art. 10, or to employ the military or naval forces of the United States under any article of the treaty for any purpose, un-tess in any particular case, the con-gress, which, under the constitution, has the sole power to declare war or authorize the employment of the mili-tary or naval forces of the United States, shall by act or joint resolution, so provide." so provide.

In only two particulars does this lan-guage differ from the proposed reser-vation which the President declared at Cheyenne, Wyo, he would be oblig-ed to regard as a rejection. As read by Mr. Wilson, the phrase "Under the provisions of Art. 10," occurred at a different place, and the final word "provide" was changed to "declare."

Centralia, Wash.,—Four former American soldiers, all overseas service men, were killed, and half a dozen other service men were wounded here when persons believed to be Industrial Workers of the World fired on an Armstice Day parade of former sol-diers, sailors and marines as they marched through the streets of the

At least eight supposed Industrial Workers of the World are in the local jail, guarded from a mob of several hundred former comrades of the men shot down.

Later it was learned that a man hanged by the mob here was Britt Smith, secretary of the I. W. W. local

Nearly all the men who marched

Nearly all the men who marched were members of the American Legion. The parade was held under the auspices of the American Legion. The firing started when the parade passed the corner where the I. W. W. hall is located. Immediately shots came pouring from the roofs of nearby buildings.

COMMITTEE FAVORS VOLUNTARY ENLISTMENTS WITH SINGLE PROMOTION LIST

GAS UNITS MAY BE RETAINED

Provision for Chemical and Tank Sec tions Expected to Be Made, Chairman Kahn Says

Washington.—The house committee on military affairs has definitely determined to fix the size of the regular army at 250,000 combat troops, with a total enlisted person vel of officers and men reaching about 209,000

men reaching about 200 000

The provision will not be reported to the house until the December resision of congress, for the reason that the committee has reached no conclusion on the question of universal military training and several other important policies involved in the samy reorganization bill.

In his statement to the house Mr. Kaha, chairman of the military affairs committee said:

"The committee has reached a preciteally unanimous coole ion as to the size of the regular army of this time. We feel that the legislation ought to contemplate a regular force of 250,00 combat troops. With the necessary auxiliary and staff force it will probably bring the total nearly of officers and men to about \$1000 Enliste men in the regular army we feel should be recruited by voluntary en listments."

The complittee also has agreed, Ifr. Kahn said, to have promotions made from a single list. This is the policy recommended by General Pershing to the joint committees of the senate and

"It is believed by the members of the committee that in the legislation that we will ultimate'y report to the house such branches of the army as a tank section and a chemical werfare section will have to be provided."
