Frozen Wattles Hamper Herring's Production of Eggs

Many infertile eggs are produced each year because the combs and wattles of the poultry breeding males become frozen during severe winter weather. This is best prevented by dubbing the cockerels at an early age but if this has not been done, there are other means of preventing injury.

If your breeding males were not dubbed, it is wise to apply vaseline to the comb and wattles of each bird in severely cold weather. The covering of vaseline will tend to keep water from adhering to the wattles when the bird drinks.

If freezing of combs and wattles has already occurred and the parts have become swollen, it is better for the bird if the swollen areas are cot off with a pair of scissors. This will minimize the effect of freezing and enable the bird to get back into condition quicker. But be sure only to remove swollen parts. On adult birds, never cut any closer to the attachment to the head than is necessary because of the danger of hemorrhage.


