



## Hospital's best chance for survival

Just how strong public sentiment is in Garza County for the continued operation of Garza Memorial Hospital here will be determined Satarday when voters decide whether or not to authorize creation of a Garza County Hospital District to operate the hospital.

While a rejection of the hospital district plan of operation does not mean the hospital will not continue to operate as a county hospital, it does mean that its chances for survival will not be as good

That's because its financial base will be smaller and its trustees will not as directly reflect the wishes of the people.

The district has several advantages, the two major ones of which are better and direct tax support and direct election of hospital trustees. Under the present method of county opera-

tion, the county allocates hospital funds as the court sees fit and the court appoints the trustees. Other benefits from the hospital district plan directly follow. The community should rate a bet-

ter chance of attracting new physicians with a hospital itself should have a better chance to tions. secure the professional personnel it needs.

The Dispatch's editorial position is simply that while the hospital district certainly is no cure-all for the ills which today beset most small hospitals, it does offer Garza Memorial Hospital the best chance for survival in an uncertain

This newspaper is convinced that many coun-

residents who sincerely want the hospital to ty continue operating are considering voting against the hospital district either out of fear of creating a new local taxing unit or in the belief that the high caliber of leadership needed on the board of hospital trustees can be secured only through the appointive process.

But we wish to emphasize that those who vote against the hospital district in our opinion will be hurting the hospital's chances of survival because the institution obviously needs a broader tax base. Recently The Dispatch emphasized that it probably will cost the taxpayer more in the long run to retain county hospital operations than to

create the new hospital district. This is because if the county needs additional funds now, its only method of doing so is to increase taxable valuations because the county already is at its maximum tax levy. By boosting property valuations, the county also loads onto the taxpayer increased state taxes as well, behospital on a more stable financial base, and the cause the state levy is based upon county valua-

> The decision on the hospital comes Saturday. We would urge you to be sure to go to the polls and vote your convictions, because to our way of thinking Garza Memorial Hospital is a vital part of our community life which merits careful puble attention -JC






