Bears Prepare For Albany After Downning Clyde 15-14

A methodical bunch of Baird Bears figured they had a job to do in Clyde Saturday night, and they did it. The Bears, behind the hard running of Tally Windham and a hard working line outscored the Bulldogs of Clyde High School 15-14 to put a crimp in an otherwise fine homecoming for Clyde school exes. And it was frosting on the cake for Baird since the Bulldogs spoiled the Baird homecoming last year by a one point margin.

The win kept the Bears tied with Albany for the district crown as both teams have a 3-0 record in that department. The Lions from the Shackelford County town, will be in Baird Friday night for the tie breaker. Albany, picked by most everyone but the Bears, to win the state 1-A championship, will bring a large gathering of fans

to boost them on the road to the coveted crown.

In the scoring department, Saturday night, it was Windham vs. Rick Dennis. Windham made all of Baird's 15 points while Dennis made 12 of Clydes 14 points. But the plunging Windham and the fleet footed Dennis had a lot of help. The Baird line opened up the Bulldog line to give Windham and his running mates a lot of daylight, and the downfield blocking was the best of the season. Windham was the games leading ground gainer with 137 yards on 26 carries. Clyde's Dennis made 90 yards on 27 tries.

Clyde scored first in the game and led 6-0 at the half. Dennis scored the Clyde TD on a plunge from the three yard line. The touchdown was set up on a fumble recovery by Buddy Howe and

Tommy Koneczak at the Clyde 35. It took only 14 plays to score and for the remaining nine minutes of the half the Bulldogs held the Bears at bay.

Baird started its first scoring drive from midfield after a quick kick by Dennis was good for only 22 yards.

After one first down, Windham connected with left halfback Wally Harris for 18 yards and Baird's only completed pass of the night.

On the next play, Windham took the ball around his right end and scored untouched from 19 yards out. The clock showed 7:10 left in the third quarter.

Late in the same quarter, Clyde recovered a Baird fumble as the Bears were driving at the Clyde 35.

The Bulldogs then drove via five first downs and 12 plays for their second score of the night, with Dennis going over right guard from three yards out for the marker.

Quarterback Buddy Howe ran a keeper around right end for two extra points and Clyde regained the lead 14-7 with 7:25 left in the fourth quarter.

The longest gainer of that Clyde drive was a 28 yard scamper by halfback Danny Blanks down to the Bear 16.

Baird got a good start on its final score when halfback Eddie Childers returned the ensuing kickoff to his own 47.

Childers, Windham and halfback Wally Harris then blasted out 31 yards on eight carries down to the Bulldog 22, where Windham again found his path around right end and romped in for the score.

The Bears weren't to be satisfied with a tie and circled right end again for the two points and the score stood 15-14 with 3:58 left in the game.

Clyde could not muster a drive on the following kickoff and Baird took over on downs on the Bulldog 35.

After a first down, Harris fumbled and the Bulldogs recovered on their 34 with 48 seconds left in the contest.

After two plays, Clyde was pushed back to the 28. But then Dennis sprinted around right end to the Clyde 40.

Without calling a huddle, Dennis hurriedly got another pitchout and ran desperately to the Baird 35 as the game ended.

Baird Voters Have Two Polling Places For Election Saturday

For the first time in several years, Baird voters will cast their votes in two locations when they vote Saturday on four amendments to the constitution of the State of Texas.

Precinct One voters, all those living on the south side of Fourth Street (Highway 80) to the south city limits will vote at the American Legion Hall. All those living on the north side of Fourth Street to the north city limits will vote in the Precinct Four box at the Baird school cafeteria.

Charles Reeves will be the presiding judge at the Precinct One box and Jon Hardwick will be the presiding judge at the Precinct Four box in the cafeteria.

Indications are that voting on the important amendments will be light. As the deadline for absentee voting passed at 5 p.m. Tuesday only two persons had cast absentee ballots.

Four important changes in the constitution of Texas will likely be decided by a small minority of Texas voters.

Probably the most important amendment to be voted on is Proposition One on the ballot

calling for the repeal of the provision for payment of a poll tax as a requisite for voting. The proposal substitutes a registration requirement for the poll tax. Texas is one of five states still requiring a poll tax.

Proposition No. Two on the ballot calls for changes in the residents requirement and allowance of expenditures of more state funds for needy aged, blind, children and disabled persons. This amendment has the backing of Governor Connally and other Texas leaders.

Proposition No. Three is a so called local amendment which would permit the people of Jefferson County to establish, after approval of a majority of its people, a retirement, disability and death fund for all appointive officers and employees of political subdivisions within the county.

Provision No. Four on the ballot calls for the increasing of the Veterans Land Fund in Texas; the increasing of the maximum loan to veterans under the program from \$7,500 to \$10,000 and for the changing of present regulations on interest differential.

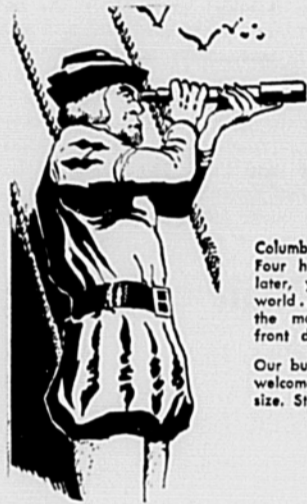

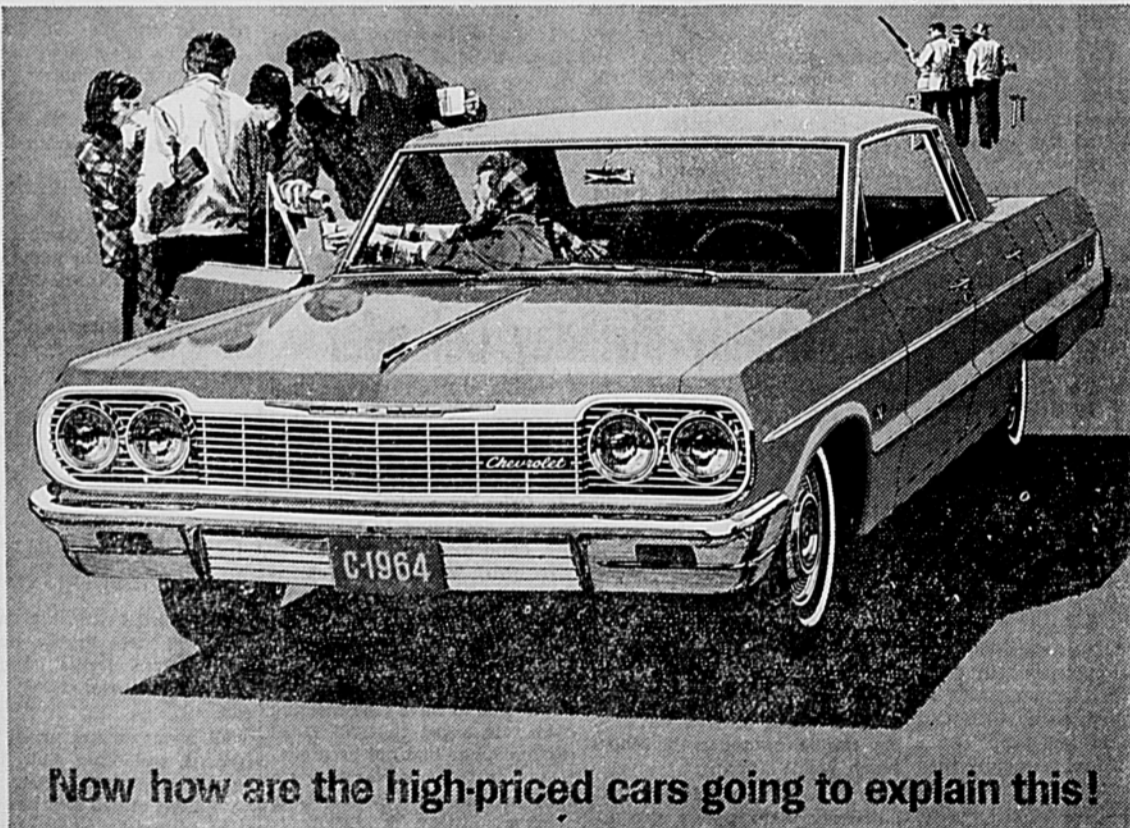

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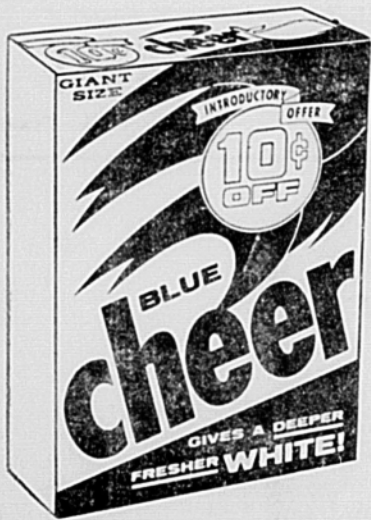
